Major to visit India with 17 businessmen

LONDON, Jan 19: Prime Minister John Major will be accompanied by 17 top British businessmen when he visits India for meetings with government and business loaders next week, government officials said. Major, who leaves for the visit on Saturday, will meet India's leaders on Monday and be a guest at republic day celebrations on Tuesday. He will travel to Bombay on Wednesday before returning home via Oman, reports Reuter.

Gulf conflict won't affect oil price

CARACAS, Jan 19: The current conflict in the Gulf between the United States and Iraq will not affect oil supplies or prices, Alirio Parra, President of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC), said Monday. Speaking to the AP at Miraflores presidential palace, Parra said only a development in the conflict that affected the production of oil would alter prices, reports AP.

Kuwait, neutral zone declared as risk areas

LONDON, Jan 19: London insurers on Monday declared Kuwait and a neutral zone between the Emirate and Iraq as war - risk areas following the military confrontation between Baghdad and allied forces. The war risk rating committee of insurers in the British capital said premiums on maritime cargo shipped to or from Kuwait and the neutral zone would be determined by the insurer, reports

Dollar slips, gold rises in NY

NEW YORK, Jan 19: The US dollar fell against other major currencies Monday as international talk swirled around possible interest rate changes. Gold prices rose. On the New York Commodity Exchange, gold bullion for current delivery settled at 328.00 dollar up one dollar a troy ounce from Friday Republic National Bank quoted gold at a late bid price of 329.10 dollar up 70 cent an ounce from Friday reports AP.

Mexico to sell off state-owned companies

MEXICO CITY, Jan 19 The Treasury Department said it plans to sell off 37 state-owned companies this year, including two television channels, a theater company and the newspaper El Nacional. The moves, announced Monday, will nearly complete a government selloff of hundreds of stateowned companies - ranging from banks to airlines to small manufacturing concerns- under the administrations of Miguel de la Madrid and Carlos Salinas de Gortari, reports AP.

Ivory Coast PM defends privatisation

ABIDJAN, Jan 19: Ivory Coast Prime Minister Alassane Quattara began a vigorous desence of his privatisation plans in parliament on Monday as the ruling party warned against a sell- out to foreign interests. The backcloth to what promised to be a lengthy and perhaps acrimonious debate is the increasingly open contest between the Prime Minister and the president (speaker) of the national assembly, Henrikonan Bedie, Ivorian political sources said, reports Reuter.

Cuba's bid to

develop oil sector HAVANA, Jan 19: Oil starved Cuba, which is seeking to develop its domestic oil deposits, next month will offer 11 onshore and offshore blocks for exploration and development by foreign oil companies. It will be the first international tender of this kind held by the communist ruled Caribbean island, which has been suffering severe of shortages since the collapse of its preferential trade links with the former Soviet Union, reports Reuter.

Romanian recession to

end soon: PM BUCHAREST, Jan 19: Romanian Prime Minister Nicolae Vacaroiu on Monday rejected criticism that his left-wing government was stalling on reforms and said that the country's three-yearlong recession could end within six months. "The latest developments confirm our hope that we will be able to stop the economy from shrinking in the first half of 1993," Vacarotu told a news conference, reports Reuter.

EC decides to reappraise trans-Atlantic farm deal

BRUSSELS, Jan 19: The European Community decided Monday to reappraise a transatlantic farm deal in a move that could scuttle the pact with the United States and delay a world trade agreement by several more months, reports AP.

Despite British calls not to tamper with the EC-US deal, the 12-nation trade bloc referred the issue back to a special investigating committee. which will now check whether it is compatible with current EC rules.

"Several delegations had a considerable number of doubts," said Danish Farm Minister, Laurits Toernaes, who presided Monday's meet-

Last Nov 20, following months of haggling, the United States and the EC Commission tentatively, agreed to slash farm subsidies as a vital part of world trade deal, but France has led opposition claiming the pact would cut too far in farmers income.

EC Commission negotiators have maintained the transatlantic deal remained within cuts already agreed by the France and farm organizations have countered this.

If the new study disclaims the EC negotiators it would question the whole deal again. dealing a devastating blow to the world trade talks, officials

The EC-US deal had been hailed as a breakthrough in the Uruguay Round world trade talks between 108 nations, sponsored by the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade. But the deal has failed to garner the necessary back ing by the 12 member states.

French Farm Minister Jean Pierre Soisson said the study by the EC's Special Agriculture Committee "could take weeks. even months." France faces an election in March and accepting a suspect agriculture agreement would cost them dearly at the polls. Soisson said Ireland, Belgium, Italy and Luxembourg were fully backing the French demands for renegotiation.

Toernaes said the examining committee had no deadline lacing it.

The delay can only add to the problems facing a GATT deal, after the United States trade bloc, but studies by last week gave its strongest

indication yet that it expects talks to drag on well into the Clinton administration.

Britain said that questioning the EC US deal would boost the United States in demand ing more concessions in other sectors of the world trade

"It is very important for the EC not to appear to be rescinding on the deal," Farm Minister John Gummer said. "It would add to the US ability to demand further conces sions.

But Soisson said a reappraisal would be useful, especially since President Clinton will come into office this week, offering the perspective of a better deal.

A Uruguay Round accord would be the most ambitious and complex trade agreement ever and reduce overall import tariffs by at least one third. It also would cut protection in sensitive sectors like agriculture and textiles, and liberalize trade in the booming services sector.

It is hoped such a package will pump billions of dollars into the sluggish world economy and create millions of ex-

ASEAN pins hopes on Indian central Clinton's pledge for continued growth

SINGAPORE, Jan 19: As US President-elect Bill Clinton prepares for office, South East Asia's political and business leaders say they are pinning hopes for the region's continued economic expansion on the American leader's pledge to revive the US economy, reports AFP.

If Clinton can revive the US economy that will be beneficial for the world economy . . . and if he can do so by measures such as increasing investments, that will ease domestic protectionist pressure," said Thai government spokesman Abhisit Vejjajiva.

A regional diplomat noted that the six-members of the Association of South East Asian Nations (ASEAN) "no longer catch a cold everytime Washington sneezes," after having successfully diversified markets for their burgeoning industrial exports.

But, as the United States' fourth largest trading partner, after surpassing Germany recently, access to the US market and a sympathetic ear in Washington are crucial to ASEAN.

The 25-year-old ASEAN groups Brunei, Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines, Singapore and Thailand. Malaysia's gross domestic product grew by 8.7 per cent in 1991, Thailand's 7.5 per cent and Indonesia's 6.5 per cent, placing them in the ranks of the world's most dynamic economies.

Malaysia, whose ties with the Bush administration were hurt by Washington's refusal to endorse a proposal for a grouping of East Asia's fastest growing economies and differences over US policy in the Gulf and Yugoslavia, appears cager for a fresh start with Clinton.

Malaysian officials say Japan, whose support is crucial if Mahathir's East Asian economic caucus is to take off, has been reluctant to enforce the proposal for fear of upsetting the outgoing Bush administration.

bank eases credit to industry, agriculture

BOMBAY, Jan 19: India's Central Bank on Monday unveiled a package of measures to help stimulate the economy by casing credit to industry and the agriculture sector, reports Reuter.

The Reserve Bank of India (RBI), which at the weekend predicted the economy would grow by 4.0 per cent in the 1992/93 financial year ending March, said it would inject 10 billion rupee (385 million dollar) through two state development banks. It also relaxed borrowing

limits for projects and cased credit controls for farmers.

Ciba Geigy's new plant inaugurated

manufacturing plant of Ciba-Geigy was inaugurated at Tongi Monday.

Environment, Forests, Fisherics and Livestock Minister Abdullah-al-Noman, the chief guest along with Hans Beat Gurtler, head of the animal health division of Ciba, Switzerland, inaugurated the animal health production unit of Ciba-Geigy (Bangladesh) Limited.

The Minister said that the present government has framed a concrete policy towards developing the livestock sector.

Besides employing additional veterinarians at the thana level the government is also making available low interest credits for dairy and poultry farming. The import of cattle and

poultry feed, high breed animals, as well as vitamin and mineral feed supplements are now being allowed, he added.

Karnaphuli Paper Mills face closure for want of water CHANDRAGONA (Rangam-

ati), Jan 19: Pro-duction in the Karnaphuli Paper Mills (KPM) may face setback within a week due to scarcity of water, officials said, reports UNB.

The KPM, the largest industrial unit of BCCI and manned by 6,200 employees and officers, consumes 10,000 tons of water on an average in every operational hour. "Water is the most essential

ingredient used for manufacturing paper and keeping machines cool and operative, said Managing Director of the mills, AKM Ishaque.

He also said, four of the six water-lifting pumps have become inoperative due to abnormal fall in water-level both underground and in the Karnaphuli river.

The authorities said they are arranging floating waterpumps on barges as a temporary measure to meet the emergency requirement.

The mill, the largest manufacturing plant in Asia, produces 100 metric tons of paper every day and 30,000 metrie tons per annum. It produced 31,638 metric tons of paper in the last financial year exceeding the production target, official sources said.

The water level in the down-stream of Karnaphuli has sharply fallen beyond the suction level as a result of abnormal fall of water in the Karnaphuli reservoir and less discharge of water by Karnaphuli Hydro Station, according to the sources.

The production of the mill should continue at any cost as it disburses Taka 1.5 crore every month against salary and allowances, the sources added.

BFIDC resumes timber extraction

Another report adds: Bangladesh Forest Industries Development Corporation (BFIDC) has resumed the extraction of timbers after an impasse of about four years, mainly due to insurgency in the hill tracts.

BCCI case

Witness accuses Clifford's partner of involvement

NEW YORK, Jan 19: The first witness in the BCCI bank fraud case against former US Secretary of Defence Clark Chifford alleged on Monday that Clifford's partner was involved in the scandal-ridden company's illegal operation of a US bank, reports Reuter.

Khalid Sharih, a former New York representative of the Bank of Credit and Commerce international, also testified that Clifford's partner Robert Altman attended several BCCI conferences at which the bank's founder, Agha Hasan Abedi, said BCCI and its US banks "were one family."

Clifford and Altman were indicted by a New York state grand jury for allegedly taking bribes in exchange for helping BCCI hide its illegal ownership of US banks. Both men are also charged in a related federal case pending in Washington. BCCI owned Washington,

DC's biggest bank holding company, first American Bankshares Inc. as well as the Independence bank of Encino, California and the National Bank of Georgia.

BCCI, based in Luxembourg

and the Caymean Islands, at

one time had more than 20 billion dollar in assets and branches in about 70 nations. It was closed by world banking regulators in July 1991 and agreed to plead guilty to state and federal fraud charges later that year Sharih, who has terminal

cancer, is testifying ahead of the trial. His statements are being videotaped, and if he is unable to appear at trial, his testimony will be played for the jurors. He now lives in Karachi, Pakistan Altman's New York trial is

scheduled to begin on February 15. Clifford, 86, is suffering from severe heart problems, and it is expected his case will be separated from Altman's and he may never stand trial.

During Monday's testimony Sharih said he had been a close aide to Abedi and he learned from Abedi that BCCI had acquired first American bankshares, which owned a chain of more than 280 branches in Washington, DC, and six US states, including first American bank of New York of Fabry.
