The Prime Minister said terrorism and democracy can not go together. She said parliament has passed the antiterrorism bill because the government attaches top priority to checking terrorism.



From Page 1 Col 7 revenue due to the non-sale of gas and NGL products," the official, refusing to give his name, says quoting a May 1992 World Bank report.

The Kailashtila Molecular Sieve Turbo Expander Plant will start producing gas and NGL from February next year, but all these will remain unused until the Ashuganj plant is ready for processing.

A stalemate is there as the Colt Engineering Corporation of Canada, the company awarded the contract to supply and install the plant, has been refusing to sign the contract initialled November 11, 1992, citing reasons unacceptable to the government of Bangladesh.

The World Bank last month threatened that it would stop funding future gas projects if the project's implementation was delayed any further.

The 37.5-million-dollar plant was to be procured under the Second Gas Development Project (SGDP) funded by the IDA, the World Bank's soft-lending window. But the government decided to pay for the plant after the closing date of the IDA credit against it expired. The World Bank also refused to endorse the terms of the contract after a second evaluation of bids with the financial proposals

The Petrobangla and its infrastructure consultants, the Pencol Engineering Consultants, took about two years to decide on the contract, for which tender was first floated July 1990, leading to the lapse of the credit. According to the Energy Minister, the IDA credit would now be diverted to a component of the proposed Third Gas

Under the present circumstances, the Petrobangla officials speak of three options available for the government. The options are 1) floating a

Development Project.

re-tender through international competitive bidding, 2) approaching the IDA to include the project under the Gas Infrastructure Development Project (GIDP) and 3) considering the recent proposal from the second lowest bidder, the M/S Larsen & Toubro Ltd of India, to negotiate the price

for undertaking the job. Adopting the first option, the officials say, will lead to a delay in completion of the plant by one-and-a-half to two years, resulting in a loss of 78 to 104 million US dollars.

Accepting the second option will mean a delay of 1 3/4 to two years in completion. In this case, the loss stands at from 91 to 104 million US dollars. This option will also require a re-tender on agreement by IDA.

Going for third option will save at least six months time needed to finalise the award of the contract under a re-tender, they say, thus reducing the estimated loss to 52 million US dollars.

Meanwhile, a section in the government is still trying to give the contract to the Colt Engineering Corporation that did not sign the initialled contract by the extended deadline, January 15, raising new

However, Colt continues to-

remain intransigent. The company told the Project Implementation Unit (PIU) of the Petrobangla January 13 that it could continue discussions on the contract provided the PIU agreed to the draft, suggested by Colt, and also amended the wording of the bank guarantee for performance bond and advance payment guarantee in such a way that client (Petrobangla/GOB) could not encash them unconditionally.

The PIU ordered encashment of the bid bond November 26 as Colt did not respond to queries whether it was ready to sign the contract by November 30 as agreed. Later the date was extended upto December 15. The deadline was extended again upto January 15 which too, was not honoured by Colt.

On December 16, the Canadian company sent a draft letter of credit (L/C) with amendments. On December 22, the firm's Finance Director faxed to PIU to say that Colt agreed to the wording of the L/C as amended by

But, 15 days later, on January 7, 1993, Colt disclaimed its agreement to the

amended draft of L/C saying

that the Finance Director was not authorised to make this agreement. It also stated that it was not willing to discuss the project any further and requested return of the bid bond money already encashed by Petrobangla.

Even after expiry of the twice-renewed deadline, according to authoritative Energy Ministry sources; the Government is still expecting a positive outcome of Colt's taking the job.

The obvious question that is being raised is: Why is the government bent on giving the contract with so much concession to a company refusing it? What are the compulsions? Some even go to the extent

of asking: Can Colt do the job? If not, what recourse does the Government of Bangladesh take? Forseiting five per cent warranty bond after spending 37.5 million US dollars?

Has anybody ever verified whether Colt has ever worked as a turn-key contractor or a general contractor for a similar

And what happens if Colt walks off after getting third phase payment (about 25 million US dollars)?

Who was verified the technical and financial capability of Colt's doing the job?

Allegations have it that Colt's yearly turnover is less than 30 million US dollars. And that is why the company is demanding changes in payment terms. In normal cases, Colt should

have received export credit guarantee from Canada. Than it would not need any added confirmation that it is now asking for, to the L/C. Why is it not getting EXIM bank guarantee from Canada?

All these are very valid questions considering the impact of the delay in procuring the plant on the future donorfunded gas projects. Commenting on the situa-

tion, a senior official of the ERD that coordinates the government's external aid mobilising efforts said: "Suspension of the power sector credit should have been an eyeopener for the government (now that this project threatens a similar event).'

From Page 1 Col 7 nomic integration of the region is the only option for South Asia to withstand the threats of market restriction emerging from the growing trend of forming regional trade blocs across the world.

The scenario of intra-regional trade in SARRC has been constantly pathetic- only three per cent of the total trade turnover of South Asia compared to nearly 40 per cent in case of ASEAN.

Moreover, lack of co-operation has led to competition among SAARC members for a common product in the inter national market, providing buyers with the chance to dictate prices. Such competition has resulted decline in the prices of commodities like tea and fute.

The Calcutta meet called for a halt to the intra-regional competition and instead strongly recommended forma tion of commodity-wise consortia for exporting agro-based traditional produce-tea, jute, coffee, sugar. As the meeting agreed to

steer South Asia into a regional economic bloc, the chamber representatives of poorer na tions within the SAARC called for special preferences.

Latifur Rahman of MCCI recommended that there should be some mechanism in the framework of economic co-operation for smaller and weaker nations like Nepal, Bhutan and Bangladesh so that initial trade liberalization does not generate controversies.

Imbalance in intra-regional trade is widespread. India and Pakistan having superior infrastructure and technology are enjoying increasingly favourable balance in trade with the rest of South Asia. India's export to Bangladesh

grew by 211 per cent in a decade from 52.2 million US dollars in 1980-81 to 162.4 million in 1991-92. Dhaka's export to New Delhi, on the other hand, shrank by 2 per cent during the period from 24.8 million to 24.3 million. The MCCI President re-

portedly cautioned the meeting that trade liberalization without arrangement of safety net for weaker members would aggravate inequalities.
