Bangladesh Bank Deputy Governor A B M Mahabubul Amin Khan stressed the need for recruitment of more skilled manpower in the central bank to infuse dynamism and said Bangladesh Bank would recruit 106 fresh bankers soon to meet skilled manpower shortage.

Agro policy with govt price support demanded

Bangladesh Krishak Samity Monday demanded a comprehensive agricultural policy with government price support and takcover of the wholesale market for ensuring profitable price of farm products, says

The Samity leaders at a press conference called upon the government to procure 10 lakh tons of rice and paddy direct from the farmers at the previous rate of Taka 245 per maund

They also urged the authorities to withdraw the enhanced price of fertilizer and provide subsidy on agricultural input like fartilizer, seed, oil, irrigation equipment and pesticides.

General Secretary of the organisation Nuh-Ul-Alam Lenin read out a statement while its President Fazlul Hag Khandkar and members of the Sec-

retariat Mohammad Shahidullah. Nurur Rahman Selim and Tofazzel Hossain Tapu were present at the press conference at NAP office.

Lenin said the procurement price of paddy was Taka 190 per maund in 1980 which rose to only Taka 210 in 12 years while the rates of inputs skyrocketed.

The price of paddy seed increased by 61 per cent, wheat 73 per cent, Urea 153 per cent, TSP 369 per cent, Patash 452 per cent, fuel for irrigation 331 per cent, mobil 263 per cent and pesticides 1200 per cent since then, he said adding the production cost for every maund of paddy was now Taka 220 per maund.

Though farmers of the country had a bumper harvest of two erore metric tons of paddy this scason, the government procurement larget was fixed at only three lakh tons while it was five lakh tons last year, the peasant leader "The government is with-

drawing subsidy from agricultural tools under pressure from donor countries and agencies in the name of openmarket policy", Lenin said, adding the farmers are victim of "food politics" of successive governments of the country.

He criticised the opposition role as, he said, they did not raise any demand in the interest of growers of foodgrains.

also hold a rally in front of Jativa Press Club on February 4 from where a procession will march to parliament to press its demands.

Role of women's development in social uplift stressed

The development of the women in countries like Bangladesh and Indonesia is necessary to bring half of country's population into the mainstream of national activitics, an international workshop was told Monday, reports BSS.

Jointly organised by Department of Women Affairs, Government of Bangladesh, Centre for Development Research, Bangladesh (CDRB) and the embassy of Indonesia in Dhaka, the workshop listened to calls from leading women government figures from both the countries for cooperation in areas to promote the women folk.

State Minister for Women Affairs Sarwari Rahman was chief guest on the occasion while the workshop was ad dressed by visiting Indonesian Assistant Minister for Education in the office of Minister of State for Role of Women Ms Sjamstah Achmad, Dr Srihartati, P Pandi, Deputy Chief for Programme Development, National Family Planning Coordination Board, Indonesia, Dr Mohammad Yunus, Managing Director of the Grameen Bank, Dr Mtzanur Rahman Shelley, Director of the CDRB, Professor Mahmuda Islam of Dhaka University,

of the Indonesian Ambassador in Bangladesh and Roft Ahmed Chowdhury, Director of Department of Women Affairs.

Sarwari Rahman in his speech said development was a total process which could be completed only with the participation of the women who constituted half of humanity.

The democratic government led by Begum Khaleda Zia, she said, approached the issue of women in development for this holistic and integrated viewpoint.

Late President Ziaur Rahman initiated several steps towards that direction and the present government was following the policy with all sincerity for promotion of women in all fields, she said.

The minister listed the steps taken so far in this di rection and said Bangladesh had still a long way to go before achieving complete integration of women in development.

She referred to the common features of Bangladesh and Indonesian women like both being the Asia-Pacific regton and bound by Islam and said two countries could cooperate effectively in the development of women

Sjamstah Achmad in her speech detailed the back ground of the conditions of the women folk in her country over the years and said the Indonesian women were grad-

ually coming forward in different fields to accomplish the task expected from them by the nation.

Although the principle of equality of men and women was deeply ingrained in the Indonesian state principles and the 1945 constitution, it was not until 1978 when the role of the women in nation building were distinctly recognised in the country, she said

Dr Mohammad Yunus said 92 per cent of 1.4 million borrowers of the Grameen Bank were women and this showed how the women folk in a country like Bangladesh was becoming conscious of their credit facilities.

Dr Mizanur Rahman Shelley said the CDRB in cooperation with the embassy of Indonesia held a seminar in August, 1991 on "Rural development in Indopesia and south south cooperation" because of mantfold commonalities between the two countries.

The current workshop involving the women of two countries would also render valuable contribution towards development of women in both countries, he said.

Dr Shelley presided over the opening session. Ambassadors and diplomats from different countries including Indonesian Ambassa dor Air/Vice Marshal (retd) S Iswadi were present.
