Englishmen reach Calcutta, tired

CALCUTTA, Jan 26: England's weary cricketers arrived in Calcutta with the dawn on Tuesday after a gruelling overnight train journey from Bhubaneswar, nearly 500 kms and 10 hours away down India's east coast, reports Reuter.

The journey was the latest obstacle in a crowded itinerary thrown into uncertainty by Hindu-Muslim riots and a domestic Indian Airlines strike.

It was hardly the ideal preparation for the first Test against India, which opens on Friday, and did little to help the recovery of players suffering from a viral infection. England's Test team is

likely to be dictated as much by physiotherapist Dave Robers as the four tour selectors. Phill DeFreitas remains the

biggest doubt with his groin injury but four other bowlers also have problems. Off-spinner John Emburey is suffering from gastro-enteri-
