

Pottery with an Eye for Details

Going for a song ! That was my impression when I saw the fine handiwork of the potters at the Ekushey Mela, stretching from the TSC to the Bangla Academy. This was despite the fact that I had visited the Ekushey Mela earlier. This time, however, I was cool enough to compare the quality and the prices of the commodities, with those found near Shishu Park and the fairly pricey shops like "Aarong" and "Shetuli."

At Nitai Pal's shop, one found wall-hangings of bullocks and men, struggling with logs of wood. The swirls of the "dhoti" of the men, the logs and the bullocks were admirable for their realistic details. Done in clay, they were painted over with black and gold, while the prices of the items ranged from Tk 10 to Tk 20. "I accept whatever I can get," the owner commented.

There were statues of a monkey man, with his pet animal on his shoulder. His "dugdugi", jacket with pockets, a satchel at the side, "lungi", and beard, had all been carefully chiselled, with an eye for details. They were painted bronze and black, and cost Tk 20 to Tk 25.

I found statues of a gypsy bangle-seller, with a thick plait, and a figure of a delectable goddess. She was depicted as carrying a basket on her head, holding on protectively to her young son in a "dhoti". These 10-inch statues, which bore bangles, necklace, and armlets, were painted in bronze and black, and their prices ranged from Tk 15 to Tk 20, depending upon the bargaining power of the customers.

Similarly, there were statues of branches, bearing parrots, which could be used as decorations by themselves, or even vases. They were in bronze, black and gold, and their prices ranged from Tk 20 to Tk 30.

A pair of eagles, at the same shop, had its wings outspread, while its mate perched by the side, with its wings folded. This was done in gold, bronze and black. The ingenuity of the potters was such that the statues could serve as both ashtrays and as decoration pieces.

There were vases and "kolshis" in beige and white, which were carefully done. There were others of the same pattern and size, touched with gold, green and black colours. Their symmetrical formations were delightful. The combination of the white rings and the grassy bush patterns on the "kolshis" were done admirably. Their prices varied from Tk 12 to Tk 15.

At the shop, were also bronze coloured ashtrays and the flower pots, which were done with geometrical designs, with their respective prices ranging from Tk 4 to Tk 10 or Tk 12.

At Priyatosh Pal's shop, one found fascinating table-lamps, about 3 feet high, designed with intertwining heart shapes, floral and animal motifs - ranging from elephants to horses and lions - with the base bearing intertwining leal patterns; and it was priced Tk 200.

There was a statue at the same shop, which depicted a mother feeding her child. The piece, complete with locket, careful folds of a draped "sart", combed hair, and aquiline factal features was placed on a dais, with its neat edging. This cost Tk 50.

The statue of a horse, at the same shop, was depicted with its saddle, curling tail, mane, bridle, hoofs, and ripples of muscles. A fairly large elephant, at the same place, cost Tk 100, and the animal was shown as bearing a bell at the neck, with its ears, legs and trunks, all done

A hen, with its four chicks, at that stall, was complete with its curling tail feathers. Its wings, legs, beaks and eyes, as well as the little chicks, appeared quite impressive, and was undoubtedly the result of painstaking work. It cost Tk 110.

A vase, which was in a fish pattern, costing Tk 50, had a base of waves. It was decorated with flashing fins and tail and scales, with its mouth open. This had been done with the confidence of a master potter.

While the other two stalls had their origin at Savar and Manikganj, respectively, "Choice Pottery", a shop with fixed prices, had its kiln at Rayerbazar. The salesmen, there, were two young brothers, Shujon Das and Sunil Das.

There, one found a statue of a courting couple - with the lady with her bosoms bared, while the paramour at her knees, appeared like some "zamindar" or princeling, going by the details of the depiction. This was an unglazed work, costing Tk 60. There were statues of the comedian Gopal Bhar, which appeared more like the laughing Buddha, with its pot belly, selling at the same rate. The women and animal figures, their prices ranging from Tk 20 to Tk 40, were also fairly sophisticated.

The stall also sold ashtrays and vascs with leaf and fish patterns, found in burnt-sienna and yellow-ochre glaze, for Tk 30. Miniature vases in jade colour were for Tk 10 and Tk 15. Meanwhile, the minute picture frames with

heart patterns, in jade glaze, were for Tk 15. Coming away from the pottery shops of the Ekushey Mela, I learnt where my friends got their essential decoration pieces for their

homes at reasonable prices.

Shahabuddin's art exhibition begins

A 17-day solo art exhibition of Shahabuddin began Friday at Shilpangan, a contemporary art gallery in the city, reports

Most of his works, including Advance, "Chitro Yes" and 'Victory', based on libera tion war and inner human feelings, were all a swirl of varied colours. The deep red stood for anger, blue for sor row and torment, and the white signifying peace as well as blank spaces in life.

Born in Dhaka in 1950, Shahabuddin held a number of solo exhibitions at home and abroad, and received many national and international awards for his outstanding contribution in painting.


Ashoke Kumar Roy, advisory committee member of Sandhani's central committee. presented the key-note paper on "Blood and Physical Fitness"
