### HK Sixes beckons Bangladesh

Bangladesh is likely to take part in the world invitation six-a-side cricket tourna-

ment to be held from next October 1 to 3 in Hong Kong, according to an official of the Bangladesh Cricket Control Board (BCCB) yesterday Jhenidah replaced Jessore

The official, who preferred not to be named, said that the president of the Hong Kong Cricket Association Hatim Ebrahim had handed over the invitation letter to the BCCB vice-president. Raisuddin Ahmed during the ICC meeting

in London last week. The Hong Kong Cricket Association arranged the first ever Hong Kong Sixes meet last October when a team from Pakistan led by Javed Miandad won the championship beating arch-rivals India.






