MADRID, Feb 12: Irina Privalova of Russia set a world indoor record of 6.92 seconds in the women's 60 metres Thursday at the Jose Maria Cagigal Memorial Meet, reports AP.

The time broke the previous record of 6.96 seconds, set by Merlene Ottey of Jamaica on Feb. 14, 1992.

."It was a fast track," said Privalova, who has already set two other world indoor records this year in the women's 50 metres and 300 metres.

American Gail Devers-Roberts, 1992 Olympic gold medalist at 100 metres, came in second with a time of 7.05 seconds.

Canada's Bruny Sarin won the men's 60 metres in 6.51 seconds, beating out American Andre Cason, who took second in 6.57.

The 24-year-old Cason, running in only his second meet since a calf injury nearly ended his career in last summer's US Olympic trials, could not equal the world record he set here in the same race last year, a flashing 6.41 seconds. Kenya's William Tanui wo.

But the threat of disci plinary action still hangs over Sevilla's manager Carlos

The Sevilla physiotherapist had gone to offer help to Albistegui. But Bilardo was heard urging him to attend instead to the uninjured Maradona, shouting: "Tread on him (Albistegui), tread on him, he's an opposition player."




