

Ottey, putting behind a succession of disappointments at major championships, ran her best race at the age of 32 as she shattered her own women's indoor record by 0.37 seconds.

The Jamaican ran away on her own, after Russian rival Irina Privalova pulled out of the meeting with a fever, to clock 21.87 seconds and become the first woman under the 22-second barrier.





count towards 1994 World Cup qualifying. The Russians remained undefeated, 2-0-0, in qualifying play, while the Americans are 1-0-2.


The Russians were denied goals twice in the second half when two of their six shots went wide left.

Malmo, Sweden, last Tuesday. Loader took the record from Frenchman Franck Esposito the previous Saturday with a time of 1.54.58.

In three remarkable performances, Loader has sliced 0.37 of a second from the record in just over a week.

Olympic bronze medalist Espesito had to be satisfied

with third place in 1.54.97 behind Russian Denis Pankratov, whose 1.54.46 was a European record.

Britain's Mark Foster joined Loader in the recordbooks when he swam a world shortcourse best of 23.72 seconds for the men's 50 metres butterfly, the last event of the opening day of the two-day

The previous best of 23.80 was set by Swede Jan Karlsson in the semifinals of the European Sprint Championships in Espoo, Finland, last November.

Foster, who won the European sprint title after Karlsson was disqualified in the final, finished way ahead of nearest challengers Dirk Vandenhirtz of Germany (24.41) and Avlo Khnykin of Ukraine (24.55). Loader and Foster reacted


