4066 registered trade unions in country

By Staff Correspondent There are 4066 registered trade unions in the country while there are five separate trade unions at the Bangladesh Power Development Board.

This was disclosed yesterday in Parliament by Labour and Manpower Minister Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan in a written reply to separate questions from Awami League Member Md Shamsul Huq and Jamaat e-Islami member Sheikh Ansar

In a supplementary, Iluq wanted to know if any law was being violated by having five trade unions in a single organisation as the Industrial Relations Ordinance of 1969 stipulates that a union can only be formed with the participation of at least 30 per cent of the employees. In which case, he added, a maximum of three separate trade unions can be registered from any organisation.

On behalf of the Labour Minister, Work Minister Rafiqui Islam Mian assured the House that if any law was violated necessary steps would be taken.

Doha keen to help uplift activities of Dhaka

DOHA (Qatar), Feb 16: Qatar has expressed its readiness to cooperate fully to the development activities of Bangladesh, reports BSS.

The assurance came as Foreign Minister A S M Mostafizur Rahman, now in a visit to Doha, met the Emir of Qatar Sheikh Khalifa Bin Hamad Al-Thani yesterday and handed over a letter to him from Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia.

Assistance helps continuation of poverty instead of alleviation

Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman Tuesday said foreign aid has proved to be perpetualing poverty in the country instead of reducing it in a sustainable manner, says AP.

"Aid and assistance have virtually contributed to continuation of poverty instead alleviation ... we have to rethink whether we need aid or not," he told a workshop on "Banking With the Poor" at a local hotel this morning.

Development Co-operation of Australia (DCA), Swanirvar Bangladesh, an NGO, and Janata Bank have jointly organised the day-long workshop to deliberate on a recent research findings on the prospect of banking with the poor commercially in Bangladesh. DCA sponsored the research in some eight

ties could be a lasting solution to the staggering poverty in the country. "Sooner we can get rid of aid addiction the

The minister repeatedly stressed on bringing about a "tranquil and hospitable" environment in the country which, according to him, would lead greater investment and other economic activities delivering employment. "And with employment, poverty gets automatically reduced," he

He appealed to all political parties to remove their political divisiveness from the economic arena for the greater interest of the country.

The Finance Minister was also critical of targeted poverty alieviation programmes being taken up by the NGOs which, he viewed, have failed to contain the declining curve of

poverty over the years. "I do not believe that any sort of targeted programme

could ever reduce poverty at least sustainably, it can only deliver short term outcome,

Referring to the prevailing slow pace of credit disbursement, Rahman said the country faces tremendous problem with credit delivery in both urban and rural sectors. There is no crisis with the credit it self but only with delivery," he

He accused the bankers for their lack of drive to provide

loans to the rural sectors. Addressing the function, Executive Director of the Foundation for Development Co-operation of Australia Dr John D Conroy said he found in the recent research that poors are credit worthy and bank-

Finance Secretary Nasimuddin Ahmed said any type of subsidy in credit would undermine the creativeness of the poor whom he termed as potential loanees.
