

Kim Young Sam takes office today

Star Report

Kim Young Sam, who becomes the first South Korcan president without a military background in 32 years, takes office today.

Sixty-six-year old Kim succeeds Roh Tae Woo, president since 1987.

The new South Korean chief executive, leader of democratic struggles for four decades, secured 42 per cent vote to beat his nearest rival Kim Dae-jung last December in a field of seven candidates.

A nominee of Democratic Liberal Party, formed in 1990 merging two opposition and Roh's ruling parties, Kim has promised social and economic reforms during his presidency

The election and inauguration of President Kim Young Sam to the highest office reflects the long cherished desire of the Korean people to build up the nation in a peaceful and more democratic manner," Ambassador Sung Oh Shin, Seoul's envoy in Dhaka said in an inauguration-eve statement yesterday.

In 1954, at age 26, Kim was elected to the National Assembly. Later he went on to win on eight more occasions to become most often elected legislator in his country.

He said a newspaper might write for or against any person or group, but the way a daily's office was attacked was condemnable.

The authors, led by Dr. Samuel M. Lesko of Boston University School of Medicine, acknowledged they don't know why baldness and heart problems might be related. But they said it is possible increased levels of a male hormone necessary for baldness to develop also may have a role in suppressing "good" HDL cholesterol,

which protects the heart. Outside researchers said balding men may want to

take extra precautions. "Persons who belong to families with an increased risk of premature coronary heart disease are advised to scrupulously control known risk factors such as elevated cholesterol levels, smoking and elevated blood pressure levels, and it also seems prudent for bald men to follow more rigorously similar regimens," said Drs. Peter W F Wilson and William B Kannel of the Framingham Heart Study. They commented in an editorial accompanying the report in JAMA.

you consume." The price of JOB oil, which is a by-product of petroleum and used to be sold for onethird the price of diesel, has been increased significantly in recent years.

"We are paying about Taka 40 crore more on account of purchasing JOB oil and we are the only user of the product," he pointed out.

The Jute Minister attributed the low-level of skills of Bangladeshi workers and management problems as the reasons for the higher production costs in the country's jute mills compared with the mills in India.

The Indian jute mill workers are skilled, the minister noted as they are mostly second or third generation workers while the Bangladeshi workers are low-skilled as most of them are first generation workers and they also have other interests.

"Most of our jute mill workers have strong ties with their village home and, off and on, they go back to their villages to supplement the labour force in paddy fields."

tle also singled out the management problem for the high production costs in the

The management problem arose as immediately after the liberation people were promoted on political grounds rather than based on their efficiency," he said "more than 40 per cent of the officers are below standard and most of them are also not qualified for the job." Steps have already been initiated to reduce the excess workforce, the minister said. We are pursuing a policy wherein we are saying goodbye to the redundant workforce and I also include these

unqualified officers." As of January 31, he added, more than 17,900 officers, employees and workers have gone into voluntary retirement in the 35 jute mills of Bangladesh Jute Mills Corporation (BJMC). "We hope to reduce another 3,000 by

June this year." Saying that "all these problems are surmountable", the Jute Minister noted that the government has initiated a dialogue with the World Bank for restructuring the jute sector. "The primary aim of the jute sector reform programme is to make our industries viable and with a view to achieve that we are negotiating for some mon-

ctary loan programme." Noting that the bank showed their "keenness" to come into the sector during Finance Minister M Saifur Rahman's recent talks with bank officials in Washington, he said a World Bank team was expected to be here soon to "iron out" various unresolved issues. What are the unresolved issues? "To me the first one is

debt restructuring," he said. According to one report, he noted, the total outstanding debt of the jute sector stands at a massive Taka 4,000 crore. *Out of which, Bangladesh Jute Corporation, which is in the process of being dismantled, owes about Taka 1100 crore, the share of BJMC will be around Taka 1800 crore and the rest is with the private

sector jute mills, he said. Immediately after his arrival from Washington, the Finance Minister said in a press briefing that the World Bank had offered 150 million dollars for the jute sector restructuring programme but that the government had asked "for more".

There are other "minor" points of differences with the World Bank relating to excess looms and redundant manpower in the jute mills, said

Brig Hannan Shah. The JUMS study recom-

mendation includes the immediate reduction of 34 per cent of the existing loom capacity through the closure of the 12 worst performing mills and a net retrenchment of 38 per cent (50,700 out of a total of 136,780) of the employees.

The World Bank forecast, he pointed out, was that Bangladesh can only sell about 3.5 lakh tons of jute goods in the world market, but the government calculated it to be around 5 lakh tons and last years export stood at 4.76 lakh

"So, we are right and this year our target is 5.5 lakh tons. which, by the grace of Allah, we will attain because our first six months export is 2.5 lakh tons already."

The Jute Minister said that the government would provide financial assistance for an interim period of two years based on the export performance and was considering waiver of interests to relieve the debt burden of the jute

"The jute mills would be financed as per export performance, that is to say 33 per cent of their total export value would be provided to them as interim financing every year for two years, without any de-

After that, he added, the jute mills would be required to pay back their accumulated debt and principle amount spread over a period of 10

years. The government is considering to write-off all penal interests and 64 per cent of the interest accumulated since 1972. "I feel this will go a long way in stabilising the jute sector," he said.

The government is also contemplating setting up of a 2.5 million dollar revolving fund as part of a Jute Goods Export Support Scheme, he said 'in order to meet the aggressive marketing of our foreign competitors in the world market.

Asked about the effect of frequent wage hikes in the jute sector, the minister agreed that it should be linked to productivity, but added that the new Wages Commission award for the sector should be "in conformity" with other in-

But what will happen if the jute sector does not do as good as the other industries? "We are sanguine that we will do better," he said confidently.

Replying to another question, the Jute Minister said that negotiations are underway with Japan and other countries to identify diversified use of jute, mainly in paper-pulp production.

"There are encouraging signs and once we can go into this it will be a big boost to jute production in our coun-

Asked if the jute growers are facing any problems, the minister identified two areas. They are not getting good varicty seeds, he noted, and they are not getting the money in time for the products sold because of the credit line being blocked "somewhere". "I an afraid quality-wise jute is declining because of invasion of foreign seeds which is very inin quality," he cauferior tioned.

However, the Jute Minister is optimistic about the future of jute in a world where a pollution-free environment and conserving the forests is high on the agenda.

"Jute being a natural fibre is accepted by all and jute is also a better substitute for paper-pulp than wood."

The Court asked the Counselor of the petitioner whether the disqualification of citizenship order made by the government was under the Bangladesh Citizenship Temporary Order [Po-149 of 1972) or under the Bangladesh Citizenship Act of 1951 as both were in force.

The government disqualified Azam for becoming a citizen under Article 3 of the Temporary Order, Barrister Yusuf pointed out. The said Article delegates the power to the government, he noted, to remove doubt only about the three conditions required to be deemed to be a citizen.

"The conduct of the petitioner makes it clear that he placed Jamaat-e-Islami at the disposal of the Pakistan authorities" and it is "not true" that he was kept in Pakistan against his will and that he went to Saudi Arabia to perform Hajj, read Barrister Yusul from the verdict of Justice Sarkar.

He added that conduct is not covered under the Temporary Order.

"Had it not been pinned down on Article 3, it could have gone either way," observed the Court, while noting that collaboration with the enemy can be a ground for disqualification under Section 16 (b) of the Bangladesh Citizenship Act of 1951.

"The allegations makes it sound like it would come directly under Section 16 (b).

the Court added. Barrister Yusuf replied that the government "never applied that law" and only disqualified the petitioner under the Temporary Order "for collatgral purposes with malafide exercise of power".

"He was declared not to be a citizen in an impugned notification." The Counsel for the petitioner went on to note that Golam Azam was included in a number of voters lists since he came back in 1978.

"No non-citizen can become a voter, the US ambassador may be powerful but he cannot become a voter," the Court

Barrister Yusuf noted that conduct is not under question under Article 3 of the Temporary Order.

But 'the Court noted "these observations are very strong", while referring to the com-

ments of Justice Sarkar about the conduct of the petitioner. At this point the Attorney

General noted that as he was busy with the upazila Writ petition when the first hearing started and that he could not gather many of original documents. As such, he added, the Judge did not consider the earlier documents saying that they would not be useful in the

Those documents were based on other documents but now I have the original documents," the Attorney General told the Court. He noted that the conduct of the petitioner during and immediately after Liberation was an important

But Barrister Yusuf pointed out that the power of Article 3 of the Temporary Order was very limited and was only confined to removing doubt in respect to Article 2.

Noting that the government was "very clear" about the conduct of the petitioner, the Court wondered why the government used Article 3 and not the Citizenship Act of However, the Court ob-

served "as a prudent man he (Azam) should have kept silent as it was a very hot period", while referring to the period immediately before and after Liberation.

Saying that "there comes the crucial part", Barrister Yusuf asserted that the petitioner was a citizen on the commencement day (March 26, 1971) of the Temporary Order. As Azam fulfilled all three conditions required to be deemed to be a citizen on the commencement date, he said and noted that the disqualification came in April 18,

The Court reminded the Counsel for the petitioner that the "Attorney General is saying through implication the petitioner has renounced his citizenship" as per Article 2 (b) of the Temporary Order, "if he fails on conduct he will certainly stick to renunciation."

Barrister Yusuf asked if the government could exercise power under Article 3 with retrospective effect.

Justice Sarkar, he said, ruled that Po-149 of 1972 would prevail upon the Citizenship Act of 1951.

At this point, the hearing was adjourned at 4:10 pm for the day and will resume at 2 pm today.

As the Deputy Speaker disallowed further discussion on the issue the opposition Awami members staged the brief walkout.

some schemes was initiated. Most of the other donors. signed agreements with Bangladesh in the later part of last year for which the implementation process could not take off in time. Except the IDA, the other donors reimburse the cost after the expenditure is made for the scheme.

"The project implementation utilising the committed fund of the donors has been started", said an official admitting that the process was very slow during the first three months of 1992-93 fiscal year.

Other donors, who have signed agreements to finance the project are: Australia, CIDA (Canada), EEC, Germany, Netherlands, NORAD (Norway) SIDA (Sweden) and ODA (UK). The concerned sources

said that the implementation of 50 out of 61 schemes of the project has been started However, some major schemes including setting up of a condom manufacturing factory are yet to be initiated.

Meanwhile, a mission of the donors for the project is expected to reach Dhaka today (Thursday) to review its progress.

Mulroney resigns as party leader

OTTAWA, Feb 24: Canadian Prime Minister Brian Mulroney resigned today as leader of the Conservative Party but will continue as Prime Minister until a successor is picked to lead the party into this year's elections. "After almost 10 years as party leader and 8-1/2 as Prime Minister, it is appropriate now for me to step aside," he said in a letter to the party, reports Reuter.

Clinton may announce airdrop to Bosnia soon

WASHINGTON, Feb 24: President Bill Clinton was expected to announce an emergency airdrop of relief supplies to besieged villages in Bosnia soon, possibly after meeting later today with British Prime Minister John Major, the White House said. Spokeswoman Dec Dee Myers said the President would unveil his plan "soon" and she would not rule out an announcement following his meeting with Major. The United States is seeking the support of Britain and other key allies for plans to airdrop food and other relief supplies to eneir-
