

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

# 100 injured in AL-BNP clash at Sirajganj

SIRAJGANJ, Feb 28: Some 100 people were injured and several houses ransacked in fierce clashes between the ruling BNP and the opposition Awami League supporters in the town since Saturday night, reports UNB.

A militant group swooped on a former leader of the pro-AL Chhatra League while asleep at his residence at dead of night and cut the tendon of his left leg, witnesses and hospital sources said.

The condition of 10 of the injured, including UNB correspondent Akhtaruzzaman Bablu, was stated to be serious. Bablu got his left leg fractured

while covering today's fighting on the Mujib Sarak near Victoria Quarters. All the seriously injured were admitted to Straiganj General Hospital and different clinics.

Responding to a Call Attention Notice on a matter of public importance raised by Awami League member Tofael Ahmed, the Minister said that the case had been handed over to the Criminal Investigation Department (CID) of police while investigations into the earlier bombing incident at the office of the same newspaper would also be conducted by the same department.

Making a supplementary question, the AL member noted that if the perpetrators of the bombing incident had been apprehended, the second incident might not have occurred at all.

# Water crisis raises city dwellers' plight

Water crisis has aggravated in the city with the beginning of Ramadan as schri-hour consumption puts extra-pressure on the limited supply, according to Dhaka Water and Sewerage Authority (WASA)

The WASA was supplying 66 crore 62 lakh and 50 thousand litres of water a day, only half the total demand of more than seven million people of Dhaka and Narayangani, one official

To improve the situation, the WASA has planned to put five more deep tubewells into operation on an urgent basis in a couple of weeks to raise supply in the areas of Mottjheel,

Section-11 and Mirpur Section-12. The five new tubewells are a part of the WASA's third pro-

ject under which more than hundred tubewells are to be installed. WASA has already increased

the frequency of supplying water by its 20 water-carrier. Currently WASA is operating 160 tubewells and two water works - one in Dhaka and another in Narayanganj.

According to official figures, there are 116,879 consumers in Dhaka and 4,803 in Narayanganj, but a huge amount of water is wasted due to Sec Page 12 Col 2

# Health policy to take care of commoners: PM

Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia yesterday called for paying more attention to the needs of the vast majority of the country's rural people and cater to them medical facilities with a missionary zeal, reports BSS.

Addressing a function in observance of "Diabetic Awareness Day", organised by Diabetic Association of Bangladesh at the Ibrahim Memorial Centre here, Begum Zia said the success of our mission to reach the goal of health care to the people depends on our attention to the health sector.

The Prime Minister reiterated the government objective of achieving "health for all" by the year 2000 and said it has been formulating a pro-people health policy to reach medicare facilities to the door step of the common people.

Emphasising the need for creating awareness about diseases, the Prime Minister said the awareness depends on the level of education among women folk. She said with this aim in view the government has introduced compulsory primary education with special emphasis on female education.

She said a mother can play the role of an efficient health worker in the society. Begum Zia called upon the

media to play a pioneering role in educating the people about healthcare. Presided over by the associ-

ation President Alamgir M A Kabir, the function was also addressed by Health Minister Chowdhury Kamal Ibne Yusuf, Social Welfare and Women Affairs Minister Tariqul Islam and Association Secretary General Professor Wahiduddin Ahmed.

Begum Zia said the health infrastructure of the country has been expanded up to union level as the government attached importance to primary health care. She said modern medical service has been made available through introduction of ultra modern technology in the medical field. The Prime Minister praised

the role of Diabetic Association in creating awareness against diabetic disease. She paid tributes to National Professor Dr Mohammad Ibrahim, founder of the association. In this context, Begum Zia

# **Election results** of Khagrachhari JS seat annulled

CHITTAGONG, Feb 28: The first Additional Sessions Judge and Election Tribunal Judge Muhammad Ismail Meah declared null and void the election results of Jatiya Sangsad Scat-298 (Khagrachharl) in a judgement in Election Tribunal Case no 6/92 here today, reports BSS.

The Judge pronounced the judgement upon an allegation brought by Abdul Wadud Bhulyan, a BNP candidate, to the effect that the members of the so called Shanti Bahini di rectly and indirectly influenced the election results of the said Jativa Sangsad seat in favour of one Kalpa Ranjan Chakma of Awami League in utter violation of election rules. Ballot papers of 12 centres were not found during recounting by the tribunal.

The Judge examined eleven witnesses from both sides and then declared the results of the election of the Jatiya Sangsad seat null and void

Advocate Abul Kashem Chowdhury appeared on behalf of Abdul Wadud Bhutyan while advocate Shafiul Islam defended Kalpa Ranjan Chakma.

# US airdrop in eastern Bosnia begins

SARAJEVO, Feb 28: Two US cargo planes began the American airdrop over eastern Bosnia, but some of the leaflets they dropped to announce the aid missed the intended villages, Sunday reports said, according to AP.

One million leaslets were dropped Saturday night to tell residents of besieged villages that the US airdrop of food and medicine would follow.

However, officials in some of the villages said Sunday that no leaslets had been found.

Hadzo Efendic, mayor of the eastern town of Gorazde, told a Ham radio operator in Zagreb, Croatia, that no leaslets landed in his town.

He said some of them fell in the no man's land between the frontlines, about 15 kilometres (10 miles) to the south, according to Nenad Unukic, who conducted the interview.

Newspeople reached in two other eastern enclaves, Zepa and Srebrenica, also could not find the leaflets, Unukic said.

The airdrops aim to help

most Muslims in cold and hunger enclaves cut off from other forms of relief. Some of the drops are also intended for Serbs and Croats. US military officials said the

drops will probably begin in

one to two days. They refused to be specific for fear that the planes might be fired on. US Secretary of State Warren Christopher said Sunday that the airdrops "may last longer than a few days if

we see that it's necessary."

Speaking on NBC television's "Meet the Press" programme he stressed that the Pentagon believes that risks from the operation are minimal, and said that the high-flying planes would be safer than the relief flights that land in

Giant C-130 Hercules turboprop airplanes flew more than 10,000 feet (3,300 metres) above the Bosnian countryside under cover of darkness to minimize the risk posed by Serb anti-aircraft guns and shoulder-fired missiles.

If the leaflets have missed their targets, that would illustrate the difficulty of making accurate drops from such high altitudes. US authorities flew repre-

sentatives of the three warring-Muslims, Croats and Serbs- to Rein- Main Air Base outside Frankfurt, Germany, to inspect the aircraft and their cargo before the drop. This was done to ensure all parties that there were no arms in the shipments.

The cargo planes took off Saturday evening, dropped leaslets at four points and returned to base early Sunday.

On Saturday, radio broadcasts urged people in castern Bosnia to share the relief equally. Ham radio reports also told of increasingly desperate conditions in the enclaves.

More than 100,000 people have died or are missing since Bosnia's Muslims and Croats

Crew members on the US aircraft saw ground fire as they passed over Sarajevo en route to eastern Bosma.

The lead aircraft's pilot, Capt. Jim Smith, said, "I think it was some rocket fire and some artillery. Nothing at all being shot at us."

Capt Pepe Gallegos, of the UN peacekeeping force in Sarajevo, said the capital and most other areas of Bosnia were relatively quiet, except for continued fighting around northwestern Bihac. However, there was an upsurge of shelling and small arms fire in Sarajevo Sunday morning.

As the planes approached the first dropoff point, the aircraft cut its outside lights and switched to infrared inside to avoid detection.

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
