Quite expectedly, the Dhaka Metropolis Football Association (DMFA) gave in to the clubs' demand by deciding yesterday that the controversial interclub players' transfers for this year's Premier Division and First Division football leagues would now be held from April 21 to 25.

The executive members of the DMFA, headed by its chief M Azizul Huq. Secretary incharge of the Youth and Sports Ministry, exchanged views with the representatives of the Senior Division clubs including Abahani Krira Chakra and Mohammedan Sporting Club, the two soccer giants of the country and wisely resolved the impasse vis-a-vis transfers before things got any worse.

The transfers, which began on March 15, had been postponed by the DMFA president last Tuesday following the joint petition of 17 clubs.

Fifteen other clubs supported the Big Two's stand because Abahani and Mohammedans had even threatened to boycott the league unless their demands were met.

According to the fresh schedule, - the original proposal of Abahani and Mohammedans - the five-day transfer formalities will be conducted from 4:00 pm to 8:00 pm

The meeting also formed a five-member preparatory committee for holding the DMFA Cup football championship scheduled to start on May Day. Veteran footballer and a

member of the Bangladesh Football Federation Nabi Chowdhury was made the convener of the committee.

The other committee members are DMFA Secretary Kazi Mishu, Prof Shah Alam Chowdhury, Azharuzzman Sohrab and Shabbir Hossain.

Acting general secretary of Mohammedan Sporting Anwarul Hug Helal and Shah Alam Chowdhury, a DMFA joint secretary, represented Mohammedans and Abahani respectively in the meeting yesterday.

Representatives of Brothers Union, Shadharan Bima and Bangladesh Road Transport Corporation were conspicuous by their absence.



ATLANTA, Mar 17: Opponents of Berlin's Olympic bid have threatened violent disruption when

the IOC meets in Monte Carlo in September to select the host city for the 2000 Games, reports Reuter. "We have received a number

of letters threatening violence in Monte Carlo, but it is not unusual to receive such letters," Francois Carrard, director general of the International Olympic Committee (IOC) told Reuters on Tuesday.

He was speaking less than 24 hours after suspected left wing opponents of the Berlin bid went on the rampage in the German capital.

. However Carrard was confident that Monaco's security services would be more than equal to the task of containing any demonstrations when the IOC votes on September 23.

"Monte Carlo is one of the safest places in the world. There might be demonstrations but I'm sure Monaco is one of the best places to control them," he said.
