Some dignity was retained by a record 10th-wicket stand by New Zealand when bowlers Willy Watson and Danny Morrison on 32 runs provided moments of entertainment. For both, Watson 21 and Morrison 20, it was their best ever one day turns at bat.

The day's bowling highlight was provided by Tony Dodemaide who was recalled to the Australian side following the Test series. He ended the day with figures of 20 for four, including taking a wicket with his first ball of the match.

Dodemaide was named man-of-the-match, saying later he had been "pretty keen to do

The defeat is sweet revenge for Australia who last year were virtually knocked out of the World Cup when New Zealand beat them easily in the opening game.

For New Zealand it was a case of the same tune again. In the Test series New Zealand was thrashed by Australia in the first Test, fought back to draw in the second and won the third.

Australian captain Allan Border said after the match it was a "fantastic way" to start the one-day series.

We gambled a little bit with our opening pair but Mark Waugh was just around the corner from something big and he started well today," he told Television New Zealand.

Border said Waugh was placed high up in the order in case New Zealand spinner Dipak Patel started early.

"His instructions were to go after him, he was given licence to play it the way he wanted."

New Zealand captain Martin Crowe admitted 259 was a big score to get, but it was achievable if openers Mark Greatbatch and Rod Latham had got good starts. In the event Greatbatch was out for a duck, Latham one.

"We didn't get the start and never looked like it."

Crowc won the toss and put Australia into bat. Australia's opening combination quickly found delight in the wicket and the attack, and Crowe was foreed in short order to work

through all his bowlers in a vain attempt to get a breakthrough.

New Zealand finally had their first success in the 23rd Waugh, having reached a


classy 60, chipped Watson straight to Crowe at mid on. Waugh had batted 75 min

New Zealand's run chase virtually ended by the second over, and was an impossibility by the fourth.

Mery Hughes opened the bowling and with his third ball got Mark Greatbatch, caught Jones for nought, and New Zcaland were 0-1

SYDNEY, Mar 19: The Asian Football Confederation, will propose to the sport's ruling body, FIFA, that the Occania champion compete in the Asian qualifying rounds of FIFA tournament, starting with the 1996 Atlanta Olympics, a leading official said here

Velappan. "Asia has been fighting for some time to get three places in the World Cup finals and the inclusion of the Oceania winner will strengthen that

The Asian confederation at present has 36 countries affilfated with another six from the Oceania region waiting in the wings. "We feel it is illogical and

unfair for the Occania winner to have to travel so far to quality," said Velappan. *Oceania is closer to Asia and we believe we should ex-

tend our ecoperation in the

Maradona in trouble again

ROME, Mar 19: Argentine soccer star Diego Maradona and his former manager could be indicated for drug trafficking, a newspaper reported Thursday, reports AP.

The Rome daily L Repubblica said prosecutor Maria Cordova asked for the indictment of Maradona and Guillermo Coppola for an alleged shipment of 3 kilograms (6.6 pounds) of cocaine from Argentina to Italy in 1991.

At the time the idolised captain of Argentina's national team played in the Italian League with Napoli.

Cordova could not be reached Thursday. Her of fice said the prosecutor was ill and wouldn't be available until Monday. Maradona's lawyer, Vincenzo Maria Siniscalchi, said the accusation was groundless.

Rome judges will decide on May 17 whether the two men will stand trial, said court sources cited by the Italian news agency ANSA.

The prosecutor's request for an indictment was partly based on statements by an Italian friend of Maradona, Pietro Pugliese, La Repubblica said.


Pugliese reportedly told the magistrate that on a request by Coppola, at the time Maradona's manager, he picked up a parcel of cocaine at Rome's airport. Pugliese was quoted as say ing that Maradona paid him an undisclosed amount for the favour.

Maradona, considered one of the best players in soccer history, is playing in Spain with Seville after refusing to rejoin his Italian team Napoli. He returned to action last fall after serving a 15-month international suspension for cocaine use.






