

The declaration of the Seventh Summit of the South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation (SAARC) has been adopted Sunday after a two-day summit of the seven South Asian leaders stressing priority on poverty alleviation, regional trade and cultural cooperation.

The 23-page 63-point Dhaka Declaration was prepared on 25 major issues with agreement on much-talked about South Asian Preferential Trading Arrangement (SAPTA).

The other priority areas identified in the declaration included Integrated Programme of Action (IPA), more business-like and functional approach in the conduct of SAARC meetings, environment, population, shelter, children, youth, women in development, plan of action for disabled persons, science and technology, terrorism, drug trafficking and drug abuse, security of small states, South Asian Development Fund, international economic issues and projection of collective

In the declaration, the seven leaders expressed their deep satisfaction over the posttive outcome of the two-day summit and gratefully accepted the offer of India to host the eight SAARC Summit.

They also expressed their firm conviction that the summit would greatly contribute towards strengthening the policies and cooperative actions of the member states in response to the challenges of the 1990s and beyond in areas where SAARC has a distinct contribution to make.

The SAARC leaders reiterated their determination to strengthen and enrich SAARC as an instrument, endowing it with a clear set of forward looking goals and objectives as well as all the requisite institutional capacities, to work to enrich not only the lives of its own members but also promote peace, progress and stability in South Asia in a larger context.

Rao to sit with Khaleda soon for solution to Ganges issue

Indian Prime Minister P.V. Narasimha Rao said here yesterday that he would soon sit with his Bangladesh counterpart Begum Khaleda Zia with concrete proposals for short and long-term solution to the Ganges water sharing problems, reports BSS.

Briefing newsmen on the outcome of over 30 minutes exclusive talks between the two Prime Ministers, an official said the Indian Premier told Begum Zia that after their meeting on the Ganges water sharing proper directives would be passed on to the concerned officials for the implementation of the meeting's outcome.

The Indian Prime Minister, met the Bangladesh Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia at Hotel Sheraton.

Rao expressed his willingness to remove the irritants between India and Bangladesh saying he would do everything possible to resolve all the existing bilateral problems between the two countries in the spirit of SAARC.

At the meeting Begum Zia made Bangladesh's position clear on the Ganges water sharing and briefed the Indian Premier in details about the affects on Bangladesh and its people due to the unilateral withdrawal of Ganges water by

Begum Zia told her Indian counterpart about the im-

mense sufferings of nearly four crore people of the northern parts of Bangladesh due to the affects of Farraka Barrage.

The Bangladesh Prime Minister said the unflateral with: drawal of the Ganges water by India had affected Bangladesh's agriculture, pisciculture, increased salinity of water and caused desertification.

The official said Begum Zia also invited the Indian Prime Minister to visit the Hardinge Bridge site to see the affects of Farraka barrage.

Prime Ministers of Bangladesh and Pakistan during exclusive talks yesterday agreed on all-round cooperation between the two countries, reports UNB.

The talks at Hotel Sheraton focussed mainly on economic cooperation, but also touched other bilateral issues, including repatriation of stranded Pakistanis, officials said after the meeting which lasted for more than half and hour.

Bangladesh Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia mentioned that there is wide scope of further expanding economic relations between the two countries.

On the repatriation of stranded Pakistanis in Bangladesh, Begum Zia described as a good gesture the rehabilitation of 50 families in Pakistan recently and said the entire process of repatriation of about 2.5 lakh people should be completed

"The ice has broken on the issuc," Pakistani Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif was quoted to have said referring to the recent repatriation of 50 families to Pakistan and hoped that the process will be completed soon.

As the new Chairperson of SAARC, Begum Zia sought cooperation of the Pakistani Prime Minister in strengthening regional cooperation.

She hoped that Pakistan will further prosper under the leadership of Nawaz Sharif.

The leaders of the SAARC states Sunday endorsed the South Asian Preferential Trade Arrangement (SAPTA) at the concluding session of the Seventh SAARC Summit.

SAPTA was signed at the session by the Foreign Minister of the SAARC countries giving way to liberal trade flow within the member coun-Hailing the signing, the

SAARC Heads of state or gov-

ernment expressed their deep

satisfaction over the signing of the 'umbrella agreement' as officials termed it. The leaders also stressed that all necessary steps should be taken to begin the first round of trade negotiations to exchange trade preferences

among member states under the agreement. Chairperson of the SAARC Begum Khaleda Zia said, "the agreement would constitute an important landmark in our cooperation.

She said the benefits of SAPTA must be shared "equally and equitably by all."

The agreement was signed in the concluding session of the Seventh SAARC Summit in the International Conference Centre.

Officials said this was an umbrella agreement and trade among the member countries under its framework would be through-negotiation.

Prior to the signing of the agreement, SAPTA faced differences on procedural stipulations for the implementation of the arrangement among the seven members of the SAARC.

The tangle that obstructed drafting of the paragraph of the trade agreement relates to the question whether the member countries would sign the broad-based umbrella accord on SAPTA along with schedule for negotiating tariff concessions on a product by product basis or to sign them

separately. However, the latter point was not included in the final declaration. Initially, there was a proposal for a 10 per cent tariff concession on imports of specific products from member nations and that no new non-tariff barriers would be introduced for intra-SAARC trade.

The Dhaka Declaration on SAPTA said: The Heads of State or government reaffirmed the need to liberalise trade as early as possible through a step by step approach. They underscored that this should be done in such a manner that all countries in the region could share the benefits of trade expansion equitably.

The signatories to the agreement were: Indian Ext ernal Affairs Minister Dinesh Singh, Bangladesh Foreign Minister A S M Mostafizur Rahman, Shri Lankan Foreign Minister Harold Heerat, State Minister for Foreign Affairs of Pakistan Siddique Khan Kanju, Maldives Foreign Minister Fathullah Jamil, Foreign Minister of Bhutan Dawa Tsering and State Minister for Finance Mahesh Acharya of Nepal.

RAWALPINDI, Apr 11: The widow of Pakistan's former Army Chief General Asif Nawaz who died in January, said today he had been poisoned in a political murder, reports Reuter. Mrs Asif Nawaz made her allegation at a news confer-

ence, but was unable to say exactly how her husband had been killed or by whom. Nawaz, 56, died last January of a heart attack during early morning exercises at his home
