Speaking to Burkhard Glaetzner, who came economic lives." from Leipzig, and who had begun his music lesson at the age of seven, beginning with the flute, and next progressing to the oboe, one realised that conventional classical western musicians like him felt the eastern and western music should not be combined. Burkhard said, "I think that they should be kept strictly apart because both streams of music are of such high standards that they cannot be combined and this apallies to the efforts of R. Shankar and Y. Menuhin, who have played together."

The oboe teacher and player added,"I do have some idea of eastern music, but as you know in the eastern part of Germany, we are not exposed to the 'ragaas' of the east, as is the cases in say USA, UK, Australia and Western Europe."

Dwelling on the rating of performances and composition of western music, Burkhard commented." In all the countries of Europe, there are good composers and players. It is difficult to decide which are the best. Every country has its own favourites and history of music. Bach, Beethoven, Mozart and Chopin are played more often in Germany than elsewhere. Rameau is perhaps very popular in France.In Italy it is Anton di Waldi, who might be the hot favourite. Different composers are preferred perhaps in USA, and I cannot speak of the standard there, as I have not been there myself. Similarly. I believe that Russians have a high standard of performance, such is the case in Japan, Korea and China, which my group has toured earlier. It is not fair to compare and contrast. However, the training in Russia, is definitely comparatively intense and admirable."

Asked how many hours one must practice, and how much of time the students should dedicate to music, Burkhard replied," You must practise for as many hours as you can every day. For wind instruments it must be about four hours, while for the piano it must be eight hours. The time cevoted to music also varies according to the aptitude and ability of the student. Being a musician is not an easy task. Normally students at school have heavy schedules of other studies and they must divide their time as they feel best, as music is not the only profession to be pursued in life."

Wolfgang Weber, who played the violoncello, was encouraged by an uncle, who gave him a cello when he was 14. Dwelling on the problems that he faces, Wolfgang said," I get my monthly salary, and that is enough. I find some students more attentive than the others, and I must take it at that."

Discussing the possible variation and gradation of compositions and performances of western music, he remarked," I will not say that this or that country is foremost in music. I only know that whoever wishes to excel in the musical profession must dedicate his entire life to music."

Dwelling on possible discontentment with the unification of Germany, he said, "I have never been impressed by consumerism and luxury items that the unification may offer."

Giving his impression of Dhaka, Wofgang said that he enjoyed his few hours at Sadarghat and the shopping areas. He also found the city marvellously clean, when compared with its neighbouring city, Calcutta. Dwelling on Neo-Nazis which is now spreading fast in Germany, he felt that it was "dangerous and despicable." He and his wife Victoria have five children.

The notes of the players that varied from tender ones to ones of high passion, which were pristine and non-pareil. One learnt quite a bit about the German mastery over western music by the performance, and pined for more.
