Smarting from the humiliation of an eight-nil drubbing at the hands of hosts Japan, the Bangladesh footballers take on South Asian neighbours Shri Lanka in their second match of the 1994 World Cup Asian Zone Group F qualifying first leg at Yokohama's Mitsuzawa Stadium today. The kick-off is at 11:00 am Bangladesh time.

IN the other match of the day. Thatland will meet the United Arab Emirates at Tokyo's National Stadium.

The Shri Lankans have played two matches in the fiveteam robin league. They lost the first encounter to the UAE, who represented Asia in the 1990 World Cup finals in Italy, by four goals to nil. In their second match the Lankans lost to Thailand by a solitary goal.

Of course there was not one among the patriots optimistic enough to expect the Bangladesh team to win against the formidable Japanese who are in the midst of a big soccer awakening, harbouring hopes of hosting the 2000 World Cup. Yet, the huge margin of defeat stunned even the most ardent supporters of the game back

Depressed Bangladesh Football Federation(BFF) officials last night were not too keen to talk about the dismal performance of coach Kazi Salahuddin's boys.

Joint Secretary Shah Abul Kashem, while giving his shocked reactions to The Daily Star last night, tried to proffer the apology that despite the result "It is the best team we have in the country under the best coach".

He tried to argue that the team hadn't had enough practice matches to prepare for the tournament, a point made by coach Salahuddin himself while talking to newsmen in Dhaka on the eve of the team's departure for Tokyo.

However, many local football followers felt there could hardly oe any plausible excuse for the pathetic performance put up by our players on the field against the Japanese. Some experts, preferring anonymity, told The Daily Star that perhaps coach Salahuddin's ultra-defensive approach, employing a 3-5-2 formation, only helped to aggravate Bangladesh's plight by giving too much space to the marauding Japanese forwards inside the Bangladesh half of the pitch. This might explain why the Bangladesh defenders gave in to the constant, unrelenting pressure, trying vainly to ward off the Japanese attackers who scored at will.

However, after Sunday's opening debacle, coach Salahuddin promised a much improved showing against their neighbours in today's game. Local fans are waiting eagerly to see if those words were really spoken with any conviction.

But if those words prove hollow at the end of the day it will only go to underline the fact that while everyone else has been making strides, some by leaps and bounds, our football has not only been stagnating but, in fact, sliding towards a deeper abyss.

Sydney's bid gets a boost

Baird, who is New South Wales State Transport Minister, said Sydney's bid has been endorsed by the United States, Japan, Switzerland, Kuwait, India, Zimbabwe, Portugal, Algeria, Austria, Poland, Malaysia, Egypt, New Zealanc and Finland.

The NSW Chamber of Commerce had written to Chambers of Commerce worldwide and diplomatic missions in Sydney seeking

support, Baird said. "The response has been overwhelming, messages of support have come from all points of the world," he said, adding. The responses speak following terms of Sydney's natural beauty, Sydney as an economic nerve centre in the Asia-Pacific region, its capacity for handling overseas visitors

and impressive infrastructure." He said that many countries, "particularly those in southeast Asia and the Pacific. see an Olympics in Sydney being a boost for tourism and

business in their own country." Baird said the letters from business groups and diplomats was yet another indication that Sydney would be a popular choice as venue for the

Olympics. Sydney is competing with Beijing, Manchester, Istanbul and Berlin for the right to host

the summer Games. The International Olympic Committee will make its decision in September.


