Copper prices hit five year low on LME

LONDON, Apr 13: Copper prices, hit by a wave of selling, plunged to their lowest for almost five years on the London Metal Exchange (LME), reports Reuter.

Base metal dealers said technical pressure at around 2,130 per tonne proved too strong to resist, and when the metal went bellow this level selling emerged from all quar-

Prices for forward delivery of the LME's flagship threemonth contract collapsed to 2.090 a tonne, down 52 from Monday night's close and its lowest since June 1988, and more than 300 below early-1993 highs of around 2,400 dollar.

Commodity analysts said copper was finally starting to come to terms with so-called market fundamentals after having being buoyed for long periods by unforeseen concerns about supply.

Malaysia takes steps to save rubber trees from blights

KUALA LUMPUR, Apr 13: Passengers arriving in Malaysia by plane must trudge across a killer welcome mat, reports Reuter.

The large rubber mat is treated with chemicals that disinfect shoes from an obscure blight that threatens millions of rubber trees.

Fifteen minutes in an ultraviolet chamber zaps the South American fungus off incoming baggage.

Together with other countries in South East Asia, the world's largest rubber producing region. Malaysia is trying to keep the dreaded South American leaf blight, rampant in Brazil, at bay

Malaysia's Hussain Serat, director of the Kuala Lumpur based ASEAN Plant Quarantine Centre and Training Institute. said fighting off the fungus was vital to keep Malaysia in glowing economic health.

The task grows tougher as airlines lay on more direct flight between South East Asia and Latin America, he said

Malaysia, Thailand and Indonesia chalk up more than 70 per cent of the live million tonnes of rubber the world produces in a year.

Prof Ahmed said the 13 ethnic groups of the hill tracts region are the integral parts of the nation and by virtue of their own competence and initiatives they can take part in the mainstream nation building activities.

Prof Ahmed said that our hill tracts region was the most resourceful part of the country that constitutes one tenth of its total area.
