Star-studded Sylhet DSA would find it an uphill task to stage the set for a revanche as the last year's

runners up were bowled out for a paltry 192 against former champions Bangladesh Biman on the first day of the second semifinal of the 19th Gold Leaf national cricket championship at the Dhaka Stadium vesterday.

Sylhet lost to Chittagong who have already fortified themselves in a position from where they can either retain or renounce the title with a very comfortable victory against Dhaka University in the first semifinal on Monday - in last year's national final.

Things would have been far more worse for Sylhet had Gazi Ashraf Hossain Lipu, the former national skipper who had recently inspired Abahani Krira Chakra to win the 1992-93 Navana Premier Division cricket league title, not scored a sedate half-century. His 53, followed by a typical 42 from national cricketer Aminul Islam Bulbul came as what might turn as the saving grace in the long run.

Earlier, sent in to bat, Sylhet made a heavy weather as Biman paceman Mizanur Rahman Babul clean bowled opener Liton for one, with the score on two.



Holford still worried

Indies team des-pite their three-day thrashing of Pakistan in the first Test, reports Reuter.

West Indies wen on Sunday by 204 runs with two days to spare but Holford said he was worried by the side's inconsistent batting.

"There were to many inconsistencies in the middle order batting during the tour of Australia in particular. The batsmen came good at different times but there has not been a consistent run by any one player and that is a worry, he said on Monday.

Holford added he had been surprised by the swift end to the game but was disturbed by his side's collapse in the second innings when they slumped from 333 for three to 382 all out.

However, Holford, a former Test leg-spinner, said he believed it would be very difficult for Pakistan to win the three-Test series from being 1-0

first innings total and the bowlers' failure to contain West Indics' batsmen in the second innings also contributed to their downfall.

The second Test starts in Barbados on Friday.

Bird, Bucknor not impressed

PORT OF SPAIN, Apr 20 : The pitch used for the first Test between the West Indies and Pakistan is to be criticised by the umptres, reports AFP.

England's Dickie Bird and Jamaica's Steve Bucknor who gave a world record 17 lbw decisions during the match at the Queen's Park Oval, won by the home side by 204 runs - will criticise the wicket in their report.

Pakistan manager Mudassar Nazar agreed that the pitch was of very poor quality but he would not blame the surface for his side's defeat.

Maradona & co suspended

MADRID, Apr 20: Argentinian stars Diego Maradona and Diego Simeone of Seville have been suspended by the Spanish Football Federation here on Monday for failing to appear at a disciplinary hearing, reports AFP.

They were due to be questioned over fighting which broke out among players following a league match between Cadiz and Seville on March 21.

Club trainer Carlos Bilardo. his assistant Miguel Angel Lemme and club president Luis Cuervas were also suspended for failing to appear.

The players will not be allowed to play and the trainers not sit on the bench until the suspension is lifted.

All five have been ordered to appear before a new hearing next Wednesday.

MADRID, Apr 20: Argentinian star Diego Maradona has accused the Spanish football authorities of victimising after he was randomly tested for drugs after Sevilla's match against Real Oviedo on April 4, reports AFP.

Maradona, who passed the test, was suspended from international football for one year after testing positive for cocaine in Italy in 1991.

The Argentinian refused to believe, however, that his selection was coincidental.

"I thought the mafia only existed in Italy," he said here
