

# Premadasa assassinated

COLOMBO, May 2: Tens of thousands of people, some weeping openly and beating their chests, mourned the assassination Saturday of President Ranasinghe Premadasa by visiting his home and walking past his body as it lay

in state today, report AP, AFP, A suicide bomber assassinated President Premadasa Saturday, plunging the Indian Ocean nation - long hit by in-

surrections - into a new crisis. Prime Minister Dingiri Wiietunga was sworn in as Shri Lanka's interim President. The ruling United National Party today nominated him to succeed Premadasa in election later this month.

No one claimed responsibility but Colombo blamed the Tamil Tigers for the attack.

Premadasa's widow, Hema, and his 23-year-old daughter, Dulanjalee, who had just returned from London, broke into tears, threw their arms around each other and buried their faces in a flag on the cof-

As they were helped away, the 25,000 people waiting in lines outside the building continued to walk past the coffin guarded by four soldiers holding golden swords and bowing their heads.

Some of the mourners in this Buddhist country worshipped the coffin in a traditional way by falling to their knees, folding their hands in prayer and dropping their heads to the floor.

In a nearby government building, Cabinet ministers held their second emergency meeting since the assassination of Premadasa.

At least 16 people besides the president and the assassin were killed and 60 others were injured in the blast that occurred while Premadasa was leading a May Day parade through Colombo.

The assassin who had explosives taped to his body triggered the blast as the president was talking to his governing party activists. The explosion badly disfigured Premadasa's body.

"One of his hands was missing and there were wounds all over his body," said Dudley Wickremasinghe, a local photographer, who saw the body in a hospital morgue. Part of Premadasa's face had badly disfigured. Premadasa, who rose to his

country's highest office from the slums of the nation of 17 million people, had gained popularity with his anti-poverty programmes, including free homes and food stamps to poor people. Police said initial eyewit


ness accounts suggested that a man strapped with explosives rammed his cycle into the United National Party (UNP) rally that Premadasa was leading through Colombo's commercial district.

Premadasa, in his usual style, was personally supervising arrangements at the pro-

# Bosnian Serbs sign peace plan conditionally

VOULIAGMENI, Greece, May 2: Bosnian Serb leader Radovan Karadzie, threatened with Western military intervention and by his Yugoslav patrons, on Sunday signed a plan to end a year of ethnic warfare, reports AP.

However, the agreement must be ratified by the Bosnian Serbs' self-styled parliament, which rejected the plan last week for the second time. Speaker Mometlo Krajisnik on Sunday said the plan was still unacceptable, and that Karadzic signed only under "tremendous pressure and threats of bombing."

The assembly plans to meet on Wednesday.

However, international mediators felt obstacles had been overcome. European Community representative Lord Owen, who crafted the

plan with UN envoy Cyrus Vance, said Karadzic's signature is a commitment.'

"This is a happy day in the Balkans," Owen said after the session in Vouliagmeni, a resort 20 kilometres (12 miles) south of Athens.

Premadasa in the neighbouring Maldives and in Bangladesh, and two days in the Himalayan kingdom of Nepal, a fellow member of the South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation (SAARC). Immediately after the killing, Indian Minister of State for External Affairs R L Bhatia had described Premadasa's death as 'a great tragedy' while Pakistan President Ghulam Ishaq Khan and caretaker Prime Minister Balkh Sher Mazari expressed their horror in a joint statement.

The statement described Premadasa as 'a great world statesman' and called the bombing a 'dastardly act of terrorism.

'Shri Lanka has lost a patriot, the South Asian region a statesman and Nepal a friend, Nepal's King Birendra said in Kathmandu. Maldivian President Ma-

## Body to probe irregularities during Sharif's rule Information and

ISLAMABAD, May 2: Pakistan's caretaker government today set up a three member ministerial committee to probe alleged irregularities during the 29-month rule of deposed Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif, an official statement

said, reports AFP. Headed by Labour Minister Zahid Sarfraz, the panel includes Commerce Minister Ihsan Ul Haq Piracha and advisor Roedad Khan.

The committee, formed at the first full-fledged meeting of the caretaker cabinet chaired by Prime Minister Balkh Sher Mazari, is to complete its inquiry within one month, the statement said.

Broadcasting Minister Kausar Niazi told reporters cases would be sent to the courts after the inquiry.

Niazi said no one would be barred from contesting the upcoming elections nor victimized in any way as a result of the probe.

President Chulam Ishaq Khan, who sacked Sharif on April 18 for alleged corruption and mismanagement and also the National dissolved Assembly, has set new elections for July 14. The President's drastic ac-

tion followed a power tussle

over Sharif's plan to slash the

President's constitutional

powers, which include the authority to dissolve the national assembly.

Mazari stressed during the meeting that the 'main objective' of his government was to hold fair and free elections within the stipulated time, the minister said

The Prime Minister directed his cabinet members to declare their assets within 15 days so that they could also face accountability when they leave the government, Niazi

Sharif has said his government's record is clean and has challenged his successors to prove otherwise. See Page 12 Col 8

## Heavy rainfall submerges city areas

The 150-crore taka storm sewerage project has apparently failed as major city roads went under water after a heavy shower on Sunday.

The Japan-financed project aimed at ameliorating the capttal's water- logging, was completed at least three months ago, according to earlier reports, but on Sunday roads in Shantinagar, Motijheel, Green Road, Shajahanpur, Rayer Bazar and some other parts went under knee-deep water.

Under the project, three and half kilometers of canals were re-excavated and an 800 metre long concrete drain and a pump house constructed

## Govt proposes date for talks with Shantibahini From Staff Correspondent

CHITTAGONG, May 2: The government today proposed to hold the third round of peace talks with the Shantibahini leaders on May 22 at the Khagrachhari Circuit House in an effort to find a political solution to the staggering Chittagong Hill Tracts (CHT)

According to highly placed sources, a letter issued by the government proposing the date for the third round of dialogue, has been despatched today through a courier to the leaders of the Parbattya Chattagram Jana Sanghati Samity (PCJSS), the parent organisation of the tribal rebels stationed across the border. The letter was routed through

Hangshadoz Chakma, leader of the liaison committee which is brokering the peace negotiation, sources said.

The date for the third round of talks will be finalised if the leaders of PCJSS agree to the proposal, sources added. Meanwhile,

Communications Minister Col Oli Ahmed, who is heading the nine-member Parliamentary Committee for holding the talks with the Shantibahini, left for India today at 12-30 pm. The minister is also scheduled to visit the camps housing the tribal refugees in Tripura state of India along with other members of the Parliamentary Committee ac-See Page 12 Col 7

#### The United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (HNHCR) is likely to provide Bangladesh with fresh assistance to the tune of about 17 million US dollars for this year to help tackle the Rohingya refugee problems, reports

The UNHCR's local office sources yesterday said that out of the total amount, 3.3 million US dollars would be exclusively spent for the welfare of the local people in the region who have been affected by influx of
