

Women's team title is Ansars'

Bangladesh Ansars retained the women's team title in the Econo eighteenth national table tennis championships beating hosts Jessore DSA in the final at the Jessore gymnasium yesterday.

Ansars, who beat Bangladesh Biman in last year's final, were given a jolt as Shamima upset national women's champion Zulekha Akhter in the opening match of the best-of-five final. Shamima, cheered on by the home crowd, took the first set 25-23 in a nail-biter. Zulekha immediately bounced back into the game snatching the next set 21-16 to draw level. But Shamima did not lose her cool and wrapped up the best-of-three encounter with a surprisingly easy 21-8 win.

Zobera Rahman Lina, however, eased off the pressure with a facile 21-15, 21-15 victory over Rina and then teaming up with Zulekha, her conqueror in last year's women's singles final, beat Rina and Bachchi 21-13, 21-15 to give Ansars a 2-1 lead.

But Shamima, spurred by her unexpected win over Zulekha, almost levelled the score in the reverse singles against Lina. She pushed her former Biman teammate to her limits before bowing down 19-21, 20-22.

In the boys' team event Bangladesh Ansars made it to the Group A final outlasting Habiganj DSA 3-1 in the semi-final. Ansars will meet Tangail, straight-set winners against Lalmonirhat.

Dhaka and hosts Jessore advanced to the Group B final beating Narail and Rajshahi in their respective semifinal engagements in straight sets.

Forty matches of the boys' singles were also settled yesterday.

Pakistan in dire straits

ST JOHN'S, Antigua, May 3: West Indies established a strong position in the second day of the third Test, which was cut short by 20 overs due to rain here on Sunday, reports AFP.

Already leading 2-0 in the three-Test series, West Indies are in a commanding position to complete a 3-0 whitewash.

When a downpour, the fourth of the day, called play to a halt, Pakistan, replying to a daunting West Indies total of 438, were 85 for three.

The last of these wickets, that of Javed Miandad, went down in what proved to be the last over, from Winston Benjamin.

But left-handed Asif Mujtaba, who had batted solidly for 128 minutes to reach his 50, off 88 balls, with six fours, remained not out. He and Miandad had come together at four for two and put on 81.

The final chunk of play lasted just 20 minutes as the innings had already been interrupted since tea for an hour by rain.

Lying under covers, the pitch freshened up and Benjamin caught Miandad lbw with a ball which came at him sharply.

Basit Ali, who came in to replace Miandad, who made 31, faced only two balls and survived a frantic appeal for lbw off the second, when he had offered no stroke.

The first two Pakistan wickets, those of their openers, had gone down for only four runs. The scoreboard was still blank when Courtney Walsh got one to lift and move away against Rameez Raja, who was caught behind.

In the next over, after Mujtaba had clobbered a square-cut four, Curtly Ambrose brought one in from a good length to win an lbw appeal against Shakeel Ahmed.

who failed to open his account in his maiden Test innings.

Despite the grim situation, Mujtaba batted with complete calm, defending solidly and striking out with pulls and square-cuts at anything short.

Miandad was defensive against the pace bowlers, but sought to attack Carl Hooper, who had got him out in dramatic circumstances in the

innings in the current series, remained not out on 178, from 248 balls, with 19 fours and four sixes. It was his fourth Test century and his previous best score was 134.

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Seymour saves the day for Worcestershire

LONDON, May 3: Adam Seymour kept his head to earn Worcestershire a tie in their English County Championship match against Nottinghamshire at Trent Bridge on Sunday, reports AFP.

His pinpoint throw from the square-leg boundary led to the run-out of Notts paceman Andy Pick as he attempted to scamper the winning single.

It was a frustrating outcome for Notts after they had seemed on course for victory at two stages during their pursuit of a 296-run target.

Ex-England batsman Derek Randall gave them a flying start with 98 and then New Zealander Chris Cairns kept Notts in the hunt with 66 off 92 deliveries, but both fell to seamer Phil Newport, who took six for 63.

The day's remaining results were rather less dramatic, Glamorgan leading the way with a 274-run thrashing of Sussex.

Former England medium-pace Steve Watkins picked up three wickets in seven balls as Sussex tumbled to 110 all out after Glamorgan had declared at their overnight score of 362 for five.

Northamptonshire also collapsed when set to make 369 in 90 overs, suffering a 197-run mauling at the hands of Warwickshire at Edgbaston.

Neil Smith's superb all-round performance was the key. He hit an unbeaten 51 off 46 balls to enable Warwick to declare at 263 for five and then claimed five for 81 Northants slipped to 171 all out.

They lost seven wickets for 38 in the space of 12 overs Smith claiming four of them in 15 deliveries.

New Warwickshire captain Dermot Reeve also impressed with the bat, cracking an undefeated 87.

Leicestershire suffered an even worse slump against Surrey, conceding eight wickets for 43 runs in 22 overs to go down by 89 run sat Leicester.

The home side, needing 306 to win, looked in a strong position when they went into tea at 170 for two, with Tim Boon (91) going well.

But Surrey seamers Martin Bicknell, Joey Benjamin and Tony Murphy swept them to victory with 41 balls to spare as Leicestershire collapsed to 216 all out.

Meanwhile, Mark Ramprakash's classy 75 smoothed the way for Middlesex's four-wicket victory over Gloucestershire at Bristol.

Enraged fans rage storm

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras, May 3: Thousands of angry fans clashed with riot police Sunday after Mexico routed Honduras 4-1 in a qualifying game for the 1994 World Cup. Police said at least two people were injured, reports AP.

Fans blocked the teams from leaving National Stadium after the game, in which Honduras were eliminated. There were 40,000 spectators at the game, and some threw objects at the players as they headed for their dressing rooms.

The crowd repeatedly repelled more than 100 riot police with metal shields, as well as soldiers with automatic rifles, who tried to disperse the disturbance. Some set banners, shirts and handkerchiefs ablaze and hurled them at police. Others hurled objects onto the field and used sticks and bars to destroy stadium gates.

Police identified the wounded as Santiago Mejia and Gonzalo Valerio. Both were treated by the Red Cross and both were hospitalized. Valerio, who took blows to the head, was removed from the stadium on a stretcher.

Jorge Abudoj, treasurer of the Autonomous National Football Federation of Honduras, ordered all six entrances to the stadium closed and the lights turned off.

Local radio and television stations broadcast appeals for fans to return home. Abudoj called the incident "lamentable."

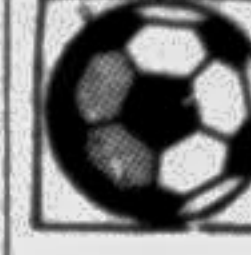
"These events should not happen during a friendly game between two countries," he said. Thousands of fans continued to roam the streets near the stadium after night fell, although crowds gradually thinned. Some overturned a radio station's mobile unit.

Danilo Ben of the Dominican Republic, FIFA's match commissioner, said he didn't expect the incident to lead to sanctions against Honduras "because the problems with the people arose after the game, which occurred normally."

Mexico can advance to the World Cup finals with a win or a tie against Canada on Sunday at Toronto. The second-place team in the group advances to a playoff series against teams from Oceania and South America.

Alberto Garcia Aspe scored in the second minute and Luis Flores scored in the final minute of the first half for Mexico, which got a second-half goal from Luis Garcia (49th minute) and an own goal by Richardson Smith (89th). Juan Alberto Flores scored in the 67th minute for Honduras.

Teamwork, talent Swiss secret

GENEVA, May 3: Switzerland's first World Cup berth since 1966 has moved within easy reach thanks to a crop of exceptional talent paired with veteran players in a strong-willed team, reports AP.

English coach Roy Hodgson, who took over the Swiss squad 18 months ago from former West German international Uli Stielike, is credited with sharpening the team's tactical and mental toughness and has ended infighting.

Long overshadowed by Switzerland's skiers, the soccer team took a two-point lead in its World Cup qualifying group Saturday by beating Italy in a major competition for the first time in 39 years.

The 1-0 win, secured in the second half after the referee sent off Italian midfielder Dino Baggio for a feet-first tackle, virtually clinched Switzerland's berth in next year's 24-nation World Cup finals in the United States.

"It's magnificent," Hodgson said. "An evening like this makes it all worthwhile."

Logically, Switzerland can get by with one draw in two remaining qualifiers, away games against Scotland and Portugal, assuming they beat

visiting Estonia in the last group game. Italy and Portugal are contenders for the group's other qualifying spot.

"America, we're coming," the mass-circulation Swiss newspaper Sonntagsblick headlined Sunday.

Swiss striker Stephane Chapuisat, 23, was shut out by Italy's tough defence and defender Marc Hottiger scored the decisive goal in the 55th minute.

A member of UEFA Cup finalist Borussia Dortmund of Germany and co-leader in the Bundesliga's scoring race, Chapuisat symbolizes a new Swiss soccer generation with international class.

FC Kaiserslautern, another first-division German club, have signed midfielder Cirico Sforza, 23, who had one of his best games against Italy.

Hodgson also brought back defensive anchor Alain Geiger and free-kick specialist Georges Bregy, both in their mid 30s, as national team regulars.

Hodgson, 46, has spent most of his soccer career as a coach. He led Swedish team Malmo FF to three league titles in the 1980s.

In Switzerland, he built the Swiss team on the belief that disciplined teamwork and clever playing tactics make a squad stronger than the sum of its parts.

"The goal must be to improve the collective potential," he says.

His drills focus on strengthening the team's mental and physical ability to sustain "pressing" — denying opponents the space to build moves toward the goal — for an entire 90 minutes, as shown by top squads like Italy, Germany and the Netherlands.

Switzerland have gained respect by staying undefeated in

10 games, including seven in World Cup qualifying.

"We've seen an improved image," Hodgson said in a telephone interview. "But we must never forget that we are not, and never will be, Brazil, Italy or Germany."

Hodgson has said he will quit if Switzerland fail to reach the World Cup, but recently he renewed his contract for another three years.

He admitted the Swiss had some lucky breaks against Italy, which dominated Saturday's game until Baggio was sent off. The expulsion was severe, though in line with toughened fair-play rules.

"I think the expulsion won us the match," Chapuisat said.

Arrigo Sacchi lost his first game since taking over Italy in November 1991.

N Korea settle for a draw

SINGAPORE, May 3: Second round qualifiers North Korea went through a meaningless game for them, playing at half pace to draw 2-2 against Qatar in the Asia Group C pre-World Cup football tournament here Sunday, reports AFP.

The half time score was 1-1. The North Koreans, who were the only unbeaten team in the five-nation playoff and with maximum points from all their previous matches, fielded their reserves and showed no urgency in scoring at all.

They had already qualified for the second round play off earlier when Qatar lost of Singapore 1-0 on Friday in their second defeat. Qatar lost to Korea 1-0 in the first round playoff in Doha Qatar, earlier this month.

North Korea will now play in the second round, which will be contested by the top six teams in the six Asian groups. The other qualifiers will be decided later.

The top two teams in the second round playoff will represent Asia in the World Cup finals to be played in Atlanta next year.

In an earlier match Singapore edged Indonesia 2-1. Singapore finished third. The other team in this group was Vietnam, which finished at the bottom.

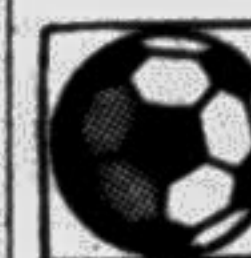
