They are so fast in their action and so friendly that before she realized, they snatched her gold chain, wedding band, not to mention the watch and of course her bangles. She tried to scream and draw attention of the passers-by but to no avail. Their display of arms was enough to scare them off.

The woman cursed her stars and those muggers, turned her rickshaw and went home. She didn't even bother to go to a nearby police station to write up a GD (General Diary).

Mugging innocent people, wrongly called hijacking, now in this country has definitely become a regular 'Dhaka Day by Day ' features. No matter where you are, the main street or alley, meeting these muggers is inevitable and they have their own way of picking you by chance. They preferably choose the most casual manner of approach. Most of the times these things are done at a lightening speed and by expert hands. By the time you come back to your senses and realize what has happened, they will be on their way thanking and waving good-bye.

Well, this is only one of their surprise

swoops on you. Don't be astonished if while you're going by a rickshaw, someone simply snatches your purse and ride away smiling, as if it's only a child's prank. But if you are clever

enough to outwit them by imitation ornaments, then be ware, they would come back the next day, same way (to your office or your child's school) and get you, they'd accuse you of cheating.

If you dare attempt to stop them, the consequences might be tragic, sometimes the courage may cost your preçious life for just a few thousands of bucks. If a young lady is daring enough to scream or call a passer-by, they might slap her hard on the face of scratch her with knives. Anyway in such moments don't bother to call the people around you, for they


prefer to play dumb's or blind's role in such scenes. But of course, their sympathy for you and their courage overflow after you are both emotionally and financially robbed

Domestic issues to influence Clinton's foreign policy'

The foreign policy of the United States took a dramatic turn concentrating on domestic issues after Bill Clinton entered the office of presidency, an American analyst said in the city yesterday, reports UNB.

Clinton's policy is based on domestic issues while Bush's was meant for global security, said Professor M Glen Johnson, director of the American Studies Research Centre in Hyderabad, India while delivering a lecture on "American's Foreign Policies" at the Jattya Press Club.

Focusing on different aspeets of the foreign policy being pursued by the Democrat administration. Johnson said America's prosperity was its main cornerstone as Clinton won the election with the promise to give top priority to domestic problems.

Johnson, who has authored several books on America's foreign policies, listed democratisation, protection of human rights, combating terrorism and drug abuse, and modernisation of the country's military capability as other features of President Clinton's

foreign policy objectives. Hc, however, said the US will reduce its military budget. "It's no longer a duty for the US alone to protect the interest and independence of the Third World countries after the cold war is over," he re-

marked.

Referring to the US policy towards the South Asian nations, Johnson said the US attached less importance to the countries of the region compared to other regions.

The US maintains similar relations with India. Bangladesh and Pakistan, he said, adding that Washington has a balanced policy with India and Pakistan, the two arch-rivals which have fought three wars since 1947.


He told a questioner that the US neither accepts the indian interpretation on the Kashmir issue nor supports the Pakistan stand, saying that India is violating human rights in Kashmir and Pakistan is harbouring terrorists in Punjab and Kashmir.

Johnson blamed Pakistan. Iran and Libya for unleashing state terrorism" but ruled out the possibility of "trade wars" n old forms.

He asserted that the US would always try to protect its interests under any circum-

Referring to "Islamic Fundamentalism". Johnson said the US itself was not concerned about it but Washington worries as other countries like Egypt and Saudi Arabia are concerned.

On the volatile situation in the Balkan peninsula, Johnson said it will take time to mobilise multinational forces to put an end to it.

Youngman held, guns recovered in Khulna


