# Budget to wait until another session

## Dhaka urges Yangon to accept UNHCR role in repatriation

CHITTAGONG, May 8: Bangladesh has proposed involving the UNHCR in the repatriation of the Rohingya refugees inside Myanmar terri-

tory to expedite the process. The fresh proposal was placed before Lt. General Khin Nyunt, Secretary-1 of the SLORC (State Law and Order Restoration Council) of Myanmar when a Bangladesh delegation met him on May 6 after the 14th round of repatriation talks in Yangon. The
