HC dismisses writ regarding sub-judges' promotion

By Staff Correspondent The High Court division of

the Supreme Court Monday rejected the writ challenging the government decision on the promotion of sub-judges, on the ground that the petitioners are not aggrieved.

In summarily rejecting the writ, the court, comprising Justice Md Abdul Jalil and Justice Md Fazlul Karim, held that the petitioners were not aggrieved either in person or as a member of the bar.

The writ, by 12 members of different bars from around the country, was filed in November last seeking a rule to declare as illegal the government decision to ignore a Full Court decision relating to the promotion of sub-ordinate judges.

Representing the petitioners, Barrister Amir-ul Islam, however, told newsmen that the petitioners would appeal against the ruling in the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court.

Hannan Shah threatens legal action

Jute Minister ASM Hannan Shah yesterday said stern legal action will be taken if production in any of the mills is hampered due to any strike, reports BSS.

He said this in a statement issued in Dhaka and called upon the workers and employees to maintain peaceful atmosphere and sustain smooth production in all mills and factories.

He said the government is not bound to pay wages and salaries to the workers and employees for keeping mills and factories closed. Workers will be responsible for closure of the mills and thereby hampering the normal production and retarding the economic growth of the country.

Meanwhile, the jute minister held a discussion with the leaders of the Patkal Sramik Karmachari Oikya Parishad (SKOP) Sunday at the BJMC headquarter here.

He urged the leaders to accept the minimum wage of Taka 950 which would amount to a total of Taka 2088 including other allowances.

The minister said further enhancement of wages could be linked with the productivity and income of the individual jute mills. The leaders of the workers declined the offer.

The minister, however, proposed a further meeting with the labour leaders with a view to resolving the issue keeping the national interest above any sectarian interest.

The minister regretted that unfortunately the labour leaders did not turn up for discussion Monday. The agitating labour leaders avoided the proposed meeting.

The minister, in his statement, further said that the labour leaders were more interested in organising the strike which would enable them to realise subscriptions for personal gains.

He apprehended that Bangladesh might lose its export market to its competitors in case the present pace of production was retarded. He said that the demand for Bangladeshi jute goods are on increase in the European market. He mentioned that on May 5 last, in one day, the Adamjee Jute Mills alone produced 237.59 tonnes of jute goods. The present average production of the mills is 200 tonnes daily.

UNHCR chief due tomorrow

United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees Sadako Ogata arrives in Dhaka tomorrow to sign a Memorandum of Understanding with Bangladesh spelling out a formula to expedite repatriation of the Myanmar refugees, reports UNB.

Of the 2.65 lakh Rohingya Muslims who entered Bangladesh from Arakan province of Myanmar in 1991, only some 24,000 had returned to their homes in one year since May last under a bilateral agree-

Under the agreement signed between Dhaka and Yangon in April last year UNHCR officials are only al lowed in Bangladesh territory to supervise the repatriation of the refugees.

During the four-day visit, taking place at the invitation of Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia, Ms Ogata will visit some refugee camps and discuss with officials matters relating to the problem.

The MOU "to determine the character of voluntary return of the refugees" will be signed tomorrow afternoon, the day Ogata arrives.

Talks with govt fail

72-hr SKOP strike from today

The planned 72-hour labour strike begins across the country at 6 this morning as the final round of the threeday talks with the government to avert the strike yesterday

The Labour and Manpower Minister Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan, who led the government side in yesterday's dialogue, told reporters, "the proposed shutdown would have a devastating effect on the economy which the country cannot bear."

"We requested the labour leaders to postpone the programme and continue negotiations on the labour issues, but they did not heed our request," the minister told waiting reporters after his 35minute discussions with the SKOP leaders at the Bureau of Manpower Employment and Training in the afternoon.

SKOP coordinator Dr Wajedul Islam, commenting on yesterday's bilateral talks, said "We are compelled to go ahead with the strike since we found the government not sincere and reluctant to settle the is-

"The government's rigidity prevented progress in the talks. We could have been flexible had the government changed its stance," another SKOP leader Abdus Salam Khan commented.

The Sramik Karmachari Oikya Parisad (SKOP), an umbrella body of 18 trade union federations, and five other federations in the jute-textilecotton-sugar-BSEC sector simultaneously called for the three-day strike demanding the implementation of the separate Memoranda of Understanding (MOUs) the Sec Page 12 Col 2

Rohingya girl killed in police firing

COX'S BAZAR, May 10: A minor girl was shot dead and at least 20 people injured when police opened fire to quell a group of angry stonethrowing refugees at a Rohingya camp here today.

Hasina Begum, 11, was killed when a police bullet hit her. Another 20 people also received bullet injuries at the Damdamia refugee Camp-1 in Teknaf at about 11 am.

One police inspector and several other security personnel were also injured in the clash, officials said.

Seriously injured police inspector Abu Taher(38) and four Rohingya refugees of the camp - Abdur Rahim, 35, Abu Fayez, 42, Abu Sama, 25 and Tofael Ahmed were admitted to the Teknaf Hospital, hospital sources said.

According to witnesses, police fired 33 rounds of shots to control the mob.

They said the clash between the police and the refugees started when some Ansars intervened during a clash between two groups of Rohingyas See Page 12 Col 8
