





Russian Andrei Chesnokov gave Boris Becker a lesson in clay court tennis on

Thursday when he dumped the third-seeded German out of the 1.75 million dollars Italian Open, reports Reuter.

But Becker showed continued signs of improvement in the clay court game and later described the tournament as his best event on the slow surface this year.

Chesnokov, who was asked to enter the tournament only last Sunday after Andre Agassi's late withdrawal, won a

2-1/2-hour epic 6-2, 3-6, 7-6. He displayed the form which took him to the final in Hamburg against Michael Stich last week and his quarter-final against sixth seed Michael Chang today will be his 10th match in 11 days.

Becker, who had plastered over the cracks in his game with convincing wins in the first two rounds, blamed an errant forehand and an inspired opponent for his defeat.

"He's an excellent player on this surface and he kept the ball deep on all the important points," Becker said.

"I moved well and played good volleys but I don't remember when I played fore-

hands like that, ever. The three-times Wimbledon champion had two break points in each of the seventh and 11th games in the final set, but smashed forehands

long or wide each time. "Right now I feel disappointed with the result but ater I'll realise that this was my best clay-court tournament

this year," he said. Becker was leading the first set 2-1 when England and Lazio soccer star Paul Gascoigne arrived in his VIP box to a raucous reception. The match was held up for almost a minute until the cheering and booing from rival fans died

Becker lost the next five games in a row to surrender the set 6-2.

"It didn't affect me - that sort of thing has happened before when famous actors and celebrities have arrived," he

SHANGHAI, May 14: China's sports officials are so eager to host the 2000 Olympic Games that they built a special "fivestar" toilet for the International Olympic Committee chief when he visited Shanghai this week, reports Reuter.

"Everything was built to match the requirements of a five-star hotel," said city official Huang Yucjin, proudly gesturing to the extravagant facili ties in the VIP section of Shanghai's Hongkoum on Friday.

IOC president Juan Antonio Samaranch was the guest of honour at Sunday's opening ceremony for the first East Asian Games, which China hopes will boost its chances of securing the 2000 Olympics for Beijing.

The stadium's VIP suite was equipped with a special elevator, huge overstuffed easy chairs and great swathes of red carpet at a total cost of 88,000 US dollars.

Officials are proudest of the new his-and-hers washrooms, echoing chambers of black and pink marble that feature the latest American-made toilet fixtures, electric hand-dayers and obsequious suited atten

"They are very comfortable. And they both have hot and cold running water," said Wang

Zongyu, a stadium official. Officials were unclear whether Samaranch had actually made use of the top-class toilets, but said the IOC chief had enjoyed the dignitaries' waiting room, where he had a chat with Chinese President Jiang Zemin on Sunday.

"Samaranch and his party said they were very satisfied,

Wang said. The nine-day East Asian Games, due to end on May 18, have given China a chance to push its pro-Olympic propaganda to new heights before the venue is chosen in September.

Maehara turns table on Li again

SHANGHAI, May 14: Japan's 16-year-old swimming sensation Hitomi Machara stunned home fans today for the second time this week with a convincing win over 200m individual medley Olympic champion and world record holder Lin Li of China, reports AFP.

Japan took two golds on the night, with China running out easy winners in the other four events at the East Asian

Machara, hose earlier win over Lin in the 400m medley was unexpected enough, was given little chance before Friday's rematch, with the Chinese star looking to regain some lost pride over her specialist distance.

However, in a carbon copy repeat of Monday's race, the tiny Japanese surged ahead in the third breaststroke leg and then widened the gap still further in the freestyle to touch home in 2:14.22.

Lin clocked 2:16.72 - more than five seconds off her world record pace - while Lu Bin of China took the bronze in 2:16.80.

"I am very surprised at the result today," Machara said, brushing aside suggestions that her win made her the top individual medley swimmer in Asia." The result may make it look that way, but I am still a novice", she said.

Lin repeated her claim that she had simply been out of form for the Games in Shanghai and warned that things would change at the Asian Games in Hiroshima next year.

"I am very confident of reversing the result in Japan," she said.


