DUBAI, May 23: More than 700,000 Muslims from around the world including 100,000 Iranians have gathered in Saudi Arabia for the annual pilgrimage to Islam's holiest city, reports Reuter.

Thousands more were arriving each day by air, land and sea for the pilgrimage to Makka, birthplace of the Prophet Mohammad, Saudi press reports said. Every Muslim who can afford to is obliged to perform the ptlgrimage, or Hajj, once in a lifetime.

The Hajj reaches its climax on May 30, ninth day of the holy month of Zil-Hajj, when a million white-robed pilgrims gather at the Mount Arafat, site of Mohammad's last sermon 14 centuries ago, and three monuments representing satan are stoned.

The following day Muslims celebrate the start of their most sacred festival, Eid ul-Azha, when animals are slaughtered to commemorate God's test of Abraham, who was about to sacrifice his son Issac but was permitted to kill a ram instead.

The Saudi Minister of Pilgrimage Affairs and Endowments, Abdul-Wahhab Abdul-Wasie, said the kingdom expects the same number of pilgrims as last year when up to two million people, almost half of them Saudis, performed the Hajj.

He said the number of pilgrims last year was 40 per cent higher than in 1991 when the Gulf-War over Irag's occupation of Kuwait led many airlines to cancel flights to Saudi Arabia.

Abdul-Wahhab said in a newspaper interview on Saturday that Saudi Arabia was taking all steps to ensure a

trouble-free Hajj. "The kingdom is sparing no money or effort to help pilgrims perform their pilgrimage in security and safety," he said.

the two busses were wounded. Of the injured, three persons - identified as Anwar, 30. Bachchu Mia, 45, and Abdul Kader, 42, were admitted to the Hospital for the disabled in the capital. Abdul Halim, 25, and Ali Ahmad, 45, were admitted to the DMCH while 11 others to the Narayanganj Hospital.

3 killed in Pabna bus plunge

PABNA, May 23: At least three people were killed and 20 others injured when a mini bus sell into a roadside ditch at Chandina in Ullapara thana of Sirajganj district today, reports UNB.

Police sources said the accident occurred as the Bograbound over-loaded mini bus from Nagarbari skidded off the road while overtaking a bullock cart at about 11 am.

The victims were identified as Abul Khair (42) of Puran Basundia and Khitish Chandra Ray (50) of Bera thana. The body of another young man killed could not be immediately identified.

Of the injured, 12 people were admitted to Purnimagati Health Complex with serious wounds.

Amjad Hossain Khan, presented a keynote paper.

Abdulha-al-Noman said the government of Begum Khaleda Zia was fully aware of the problem and she would do everything possible to get a due share of the Ganges waters for the Bangladeshi people.

Noman said that getting a due share of the Ganges river waters was a political commitment of the present government and it would strive to achieve it.

The Environment Minister pointed out that due to unilateral withdrawal of the Ganges water the ecological balance in Bangladesh was being threatened. It was also creating other problems.

BM Abbas called for building a Ganges barrage for the survival of Bangladesh. "If you donot build the Ganges barrage your future will be doomed," he added.

Prof Yeazuddin Ahmed said Bangladesh would have to solve its own problem. He called for building a national movement to solve the Farakka problem.


Mahbub Anam criticised a section of political parties and said they were making issues out of non-issues instead of paying any heed to national problems such as Farakka.

What should not have been debatable was to provide English translations of the main addresses, including those by the Prime Minister and the Vice Chancellor, printed inside the colourful brochure.

This would have made a major difference to nearly two dozen foreign diplomats who

BCL (M-I) demands VC's resignation The pro-Awami League

He urged all his comrades as well as police to cease the battle. The 'white flag' was honoured immediately with the BCL activists returning to the Jagannath Hall.

Activists of the Ganotantrik Chhatra Oikya, a left-leaning students' alliance of eight organisations, also marched towards the convocation venue with a black flag but retreated as police intercepted them at the TSC.

Several motor vehicles, including the car of Social Science Faculty Dean Prof Anwarullah Chowdhury, were damaged by the unruly youths.

They said they killed two Palestinians in error in a joint operation a week ago in which two Israeli vegetable merchants and two Arabs were shot dead.
