LONDON, May 30: The grandson of Britain's wartime leader Winston Churchill whi pped up a political storm on Saturday with claims that a 'relentless flow' of Asian immi gration threatened the British way of life, reports Reuter.

The Conservative politician and namesake of the wartime Prime Minister said in a speech on Friday the doors should be shut on immigrants from the Indian Subcontinent.

It was one of the most controverstal speeches since may crick Conservative Enoch Powell predicted in 1968 that a bloodbath would result from mass immigration. The address caused a public outcry.

Home Secretary (Interior Minister) Michael Howard Sharply dismissed Churchill's comments on Saturday. "I condemn any intervention which could have the effect of damaging race relations," he told British Broadcasting Corporation radio.

Opposition Labour MP Keith Vaz urged Prime Minister John Major to condemn Churchill's provocative, ill-conceived and foolish statement. Black Conscrvative MP Niranjan Deva said he was 'shocked and disappointed by Churchill's com-

Deva said he admired Churchill's grandfather who had fought against Nazism so that the British way of life could be protected and to do that he had the support of many hundreds of thousands of Indian troops who fought in both world wars.

In his speech, Churchill said We must call a halt to the relentless flow of immigrants to this country, especially from the Indian Subcontinent. He also claimed northern cities such as Leeds and Bradford were more

most immigration stopped some years ago and that fewer than 150 people a week arrived now in Britain from the Indian Subcontinent, mostly to join their families.

Churchill, also speaking to the BBC on Saturday, denied the north of England.

### BIDS employees to stop work from tomorrow

Development Studies (BIDS) is facing a crisis over the appointment of its new Director General (DG).

of the institution, a statutory body, have decided to stop work from tomorrow, June 1, unless the government rescinds the appointment of Dr Latifur Reza as the new DG.

All the seminars previously scheduled by the BIDS for next month have also been cancelled.

The appointment of Dr Latifur Reza, a teacher of the Economics Department of the Dhaka University, was made on May 22. Planning Minister Zahiruddin Khan, ex-officio chairman of the board of trustees of the BIDS, announced the appointment following a 'controversial' meeting of the board on that day.

According to the research institution's charter, a 14member board of trustees comprising representatives from the Planning, Finance and Education ministries, the Bangladesh Bank, the

University Grants Commission. Bangladesh Rura Development Board (BRDB), the BIDS and a nominee of the President is the appointing authority of the top executive of the organisation. Almost all the staff members, both researchers and employees, re jected the appointment immediately after the announcement was made by the Planning Minister.

The staff, in a general meet ing held last Thursday, rejected both the eligibility of Dr Reza and the manner of his appointment.

In the meeting some top researchers felt that the appointment was "a result of bureaucratic interference and coterie manipulation of a vested

quarter." They alleged that contrary to conventions, the BIDS representatives in the trustee board was not consulted about

the appointment.

Dr Reza's opponents believe that the appointment would af fect the credibility of the BIDS a national-level autonomous research organisation with repu-

tation at home and abroad. "We won't accept Dr Reza, a man with no proven research capacity or personnel management skill, as the top executive of the BIDS, especially when eligible candidates like Abu Abdullah and Wahiduddin Mahmud were there," three influential BIDS economists said while talking to this correspondent Saturday after-

Wahiduddin Mahmud is a professor of the Economics Department of the Dhaka University and Abu Abdullah is the President's nominee in the trustee board.

Replying to a question, the economists requesting anonymity, said yesterday that their planned work suspension would affect the government's relations with some international agencies like the Asian Development Bank (ADB), World Bank (WB), United Nations Development Programme than 50 per cent immigrant.


The committee, comprising Kamaluddin Chowdhury of the Planning Commission, Kholiquzzaman of the BIDS, Wahiuddin Mahmud and Shamsul Hoque of the University Grants Commission, had unanimously nominated Abu Abdullah as the next DG.

Kholiquzzaman told this correspondent that the committee, however, could not quite place the name before the board because the meeting was abruptly cancelled by its chairman, the Planning Minister only 24 hours before it was scheduled to meet on March 3.

Meanwhile, Kamaluddin Chowdhury, convener of the committee, retired from service and Harun-ur-Rashid, Secretary of the Planning Ministry, replaced him. Reportedly, the Planning Secretary disagreed with the nomination of Abu Abdullah.

Incidentally, former DG Mahbub Hossain, on the eve of his departure from the bids, also proposed the name of Abu Abdullah for the post. But the Planning Minister reportedly ignored the recommendation and appointed M R Khan as the acting DG. MR Khan faced a vote of no-confidence of the researchers two months ago because he reportedly "fatled to mobilise a single new research contract with the donors."

The chairman of the board, at its meeting May 22, set up a fresh selection committee to deliberate for half an hour on the nomination and, following the committee's failure to reach a consensus, the Planning Minister announced the name of Dr. Latifur Reza as the new DG.

#### City cattle markets look for buyers

Visiting some cattle markets, this correspondent found the number of buyers smaller than expected, although loudspeakers were being used to attract buyers.

The DCC received Tk 23.11 lakh for the Navabazar market while the bidding was about Tk 20 lakh for each of the other markets.

Until yesterday the prices of cattle did not exceed last year's record. The price of a small bull varied between Taka 4,000 to Tk 5,000 while medium sized one was available for Tk 7,000. At the Gabtali market, a

record Tk 1.5 lakh was demanded for a big bull. Sellers expected trading to

pick up Tuesday, the day before the Eid. The 17 city markets are lo-

cated at Banani Chairmanbari. Gabtali, Mohammadpur Saheed Park, Kamalapur-Mugdapara, Jagannath Saha Balurmath. Azampur Primary School Dhupkhola, Shaheed Faruk Sarak, Jigatola-Hazaribagh, Dhakeshwari, Nayabazar, Golapbagh, Kawran Bazar, Dhanmondi Club Ground Dayagani Truck Stand Rahmatgani Sporting Club Maidan, and the Postagola Cremation ground.

Dhaka City Corporation has not permitted setting up of any cattle markets at Fulbaria and Dholaikhal area - two traditional sites - this year, in view of the heavy traffic jams these markets create.
