From Page 1 Col 7 ners charge that these figures are all wild guesses because the profit statements do not reflect the cost of raw materials, interest repayment and depreciation factors, among

other things. The spinners also feel that the report's conversion cost of raw materials is also not correct. They point out that the conversion rate for 40-count yarn has been put at Taka 6.34 for a pound which include wages, power and depreciation. But the same study also estimates the conversion rate of 32-count yarn at Taka 14.75 per pound.

Textile experts also question the ministry's outlay figures in a proposed plan to set up 146 spinning mills, 510 weaving units, and 327 dyeing finishing units to meet the country's fabric requirement.

The ministry says the execution of this plan would need about Taka 6065 crore. It also envisages that each weaving unit having 200 looms would require Taka three crore, a dyeing-printing unit producing 70 crore meters of cloth would require Taka five crore. But experts say that each weaving unit of such capacity would need at least Taka 12 crore while a dyeing-printing unit would require about Taka 11 crore. Both these figures are considerably higher than the ones projected in the report.

The spinners also sharply ommendations for free import of yarn on the plea that it is cheaper than local yarn. They say that the neighbouring countries, which are the main exporters of yarn to Bangladesh, support their spinners by providing duty rebates on cotton imports. Moreover, the country has to buy cotton at about 40 per cent higher prices than India and

The country's spinning mills owners apprehend that if restrictions on yarn import are lifted, it would ruin the local spinning sector. They also suggest that the government should instead provide duty relief to the spinning sector and check the siphoning off of varn from the knitting industries to make the spinning units viable.

The three-day Eid ul-Azha, commemorating Prophet Abraham's offering of his son to God, was marked by the slaughter of sheep as sacrifice for the world's 1 billion Muslims, particularly more than 1.5 million in Mecca for the annual pilgrimage to Islam's holiest shrines.

Hundreds of prisoners were released on the occasion, and in Bahrain the ruling Emir, Sheik Isa bin Salman Al Khalifa, issued an amnesty allowing the return of an unspecified number extles who fled to escape various charges.

Although the Eid ul-Azha is officially three days, normal life stops for the entire week in much of the Muslim world. Rulers in the oil-rich Gulf
