Haitian PM resigns

PORT-AU-PRINCE, June 9: Haitis interim Premier Marc Bazin resigned Tuesday after the army withdrew its support for him, a day after the political parties that had backed his government walked out, reports

Bazin, 63 and already shunned by the international community except the Vatican, stepped down after his first legislative backing crumbled, and then the army's blessing his last pillar of support - was withdrawn.

"Yesterday, I found myself unable to swear in a new government," said Bazin, who has come under increasing international pressure to make way for the reinstatement of ousted President Jean-Bertrand Aristide.

Aristide, a populist priest turned politician, was Haitis first democratically elected president, and was ousted by the army in a September 1991 coup. While he enjoys massive support from Haitis poor majority, he is no favourite of the country's tiny business elite or conservative army.

In Managua, Aristide left a meeting of the Organization of American States Washington, though his Ambassador to the OAS said the trip had been planned beforehand and was not linked to Bazin's resignation.

OAS Secretary General Joao Baena Soares said the resignation was "a new opportunity" to resolve the political crisis that has gripped Haiti since Aristide was sent packing.

The resignation came as a bitter pill for Bazin, a former World Bank official who led a centrist coalition to a December 1990 defeat in the presidential race against Aristide.

MOSCOW, June 9: Russian President Boris Yeltsin sent a telegram to the Russian parliament today inviting Deputies to join a special Kremlin assembly drafting a new constitution, re-

ports Reuter. A statement by the presidential office, issued by Itar-Tass news agency, suggested that all Deputies were being invited to participate in what would mark a major reorganisation of the assembly. A spokesman was not immediately available to clarify.

Expanding the meeting by an additional 1,033 Deputies a majority of them hostile to Yeltsin's policies, would not seem to increase the President's chances of success.

The constitutional assembly consists of government officials, political parties, tread unionsits and parliamentary Deputies.

Objects emitting ultraviolet light detected in sky

WASHINGTON, June 9: A satellite of the US National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) has detected about 400 objects in the sky that emit extreme ultravio-

let light, reports Xinhua. The Extreme Ultra violent Explorer (EUVE) has found helium on Mars, showed volcanic debris above Jupiter, produced a new map of the sky and helped astronomers understand interstellar gas.

Findings by the 214-milliondollar craft, launched by rocket a year ago, were presented at the American Astronomical Society's annual meeting, the Associated Press reported Tuesday.

EUVE the first spacecraft to make a comprehensive search for objects that emit the invisible extreme ultraviolet light, also has found two exploding stars, called Supernovas.

She was not an angel

WINCHESTER (England): A sex offender escaped a jail sentence on Tuesday after a judge said the eight-year old girl he abused was "not entirely an angel", reports Reuter.

In a case that enraged the girl's family, Karl Gambrill, 21, was given two years probation rather than a jail sentence because the judge said he believed the child to have been sexually experienced.

"The law in this country protects little girls because they do not know what is right and what is wrong. ... However, I have been provided with information which leads me to think she was not entirely an angel herself, said Judge Ian Starforth Hill. Cambrill, pleaded guilty to attempting unlawful sexual inter-

course with the eight-year -old girl, whom he assaulted while baby-sitting for her family. The sentence infuriated the girl's mother. "How can you say that a man was led on by an eight-year-old girl? You get more for a motoring offence nowadays than you do for abusing a

child," she told reporters outside the court in southern England. The attack took place when Gambrill was 18 years old. "You were only 18 at the time as opposed to being a man which enables me to pass a lenient sentence," the judge told

It can land him fresh controversy

LONDON: British heir to the throne Prince Charles, who as monarch would pledge to uphold and depend the church of England, is to become patron of a university centre promoting Muslim studies, reports Reuter.

Oxford University said on Tuesday the 44-year-old Prince had agreed to become patron of its Oxford Centre for Islamic Studies whose aim is to promote understanding and tolerance between the West and the Islamic world. The decision, seen by some as acknowledging Britain's religiously, diverse society, could land the Prince in fresh controversy as the coronation oath requires the monarch to give exclusive support to the established church of England.

The university said his patronage was "an endorsement of the aims of the centre," the Press Association news agency said it was "an unspoken plea for religious tolerance" by the Prince. The link with Islam could revive a debate about the prince's suitability for the Crown and whether to reform the old system

of an established church headed by a royal "supreme governor." Opponents of the system say it is out of step with an ecumenical, multi-ethnic society in which only an estimated two per cent of people are practising Anglicans.

(600 miles) northwest of Buenos Aires. Diluted amnesty for Kurdish guerillas

ANKARA, June 9: Turkey announced a diluted amnesty for Kurdish guerillas on Tuesday despite a surge in vio lence which has killed 330 people in the past 16 days, reports Reuter.

A government decree said that with immediate effect people who left 'armed bands' of their own would not be prosecuted unless they had commit ted acts of violence.

An earlier government draft provided for reduced sentences for all Kurdish guerillas who gave themselves up, regardless of their military activities, but this clause was stripped out of the version published on Tuesday.

The decree did not mention the Kurdistan Workers Party (PKK) by name but said it applied to the emergency rule region in the southeast where a Kurdish revolt has smouldered for nine years.

It was published before the Turkish government heard that the head of the PKK, Abdullah Ocalan, had announced the PKK was resuming all out war against Turkey.

At a news conference in eastern Lebanon, Ocalan said the guerillas considered that the unflateral ceasefire they do ' . ' in March had failed

Chronology of the world's oldest imperial institution TOKYO, June 9: Following is a chronology of the Japanese Imperial Institution, headed by the Emperor or "Tenno" (heavenly sovereign) and regarded as the world's oldest hereditary monar-

Pre-ancient times - to this day, the palace maintains the imperial family descended from the legendary Emperor Jimmu, the first in a line of 125 monarches (including some women) that stretches down to the current incumbent, Akihito. Jimmu is said to have ruled some 2,700 years ago

Early ancient period reliable documents date the imperial family back to Empress Suiko, who ruled from AD 593-628 as a Shamaness. It was then or soon afterwards that Japanese rulers adopted the Chinese writing system and its in-

stitutions of government and monarchy. The title of "Tenno" came into use at this time through Chinese influence. Rulers assumed the chilef role of high priest or priestess of the indigenous religion Shinto in keeping with their new divine status.

Ancient period — the imperial institution, based in Kyoto in western Japan, went into decline in the early Hetan period (794-1185), and would not regain prestige until the late 19th century. Bureaucrats took over the job of governing, while a clan known as the Fujiwara estab lished itself as hereditary regents ruling in the Emperor's name

Shogun (warlord) period - the first military government, the Kamakura shogunate, was founded in 1185 and marked the start of hundreds of years of warlord rule. The Emperor remained head of state but only in name

By the 15th century, the country had fallen into civil war as warlords jostled for supremacy The imperial palace was destroyed and the imperial family fell on hard economic times that were to last about 70 years.

have been broken during this unstable period Male heirs may have been adopted in order to preserve the line.

was forced to open up to trade. Japanese reformists, anxious to ensure the country did not fall like China under the control of western powers, looked to the Emperor as the basis for a modern state.

Modernisation period — after winning a civil war, reformists swept away the shogunate and restored imperial rule at the beginning of the Meiji period (1868-1912). Emperor Meiji, then 14, was moved to Tokyo and paraded around the country. Until then, few ordinary Japanese



outside Kyoto had been aware that an imperial family existed. After the reformists polished their concept of

a monarchy, borrowing from Europe's royal houses, they made the Emperor head of state. chief of the armed forces and high priest of the new state Shinto.

He was designated a living god and by 1910. courtiers had devised volumes of religious court rituals, a curious mixture of ancient and western traditions, designed to keep the Emperor as busy as he was in ancient times.

When militarists seized power in 1932, they pushed the cult of Emperor worship to new heights and mobilised the country behind their goal of conquering Asia in the name of then Emperor Hirohito. In 1941, Japan attacked the US fleet at Pearl Harbour, sparking the Pacific war. After the United States dropped two atomic bombs on Japan. Hirohito overruled military generals and ordered peace.

Post-war period Japan was allowed to keep its imperial institution after 1945 but only after radical changes, under the 1947 US-drafted constitution, the Emperor became a symbol of the state with no political power.

Hirohito swapped his military uniform for a suit and made himself visible to the people by touring the country. Despite this apparent open ness, however, little is known about the imperial family, whose lives are controlled by conservative courtiers determined to retain an aura of mystique

Hirohito's heir, now Emperor Akihito, broke some ground along with imperial precedent in 1959 by wedding commoner Michiko Shoda, the daughter of a wealthy industrialist.

Naruhito is expected to attempt a further opening of the cloistered palace after Wednesday, when he weds ex-diplomat Masako Owada, the first career woman to enter the palace.

Lankan Muslim party withdraws from peace body

COLOMBO, June 9: A Shri ankan Muslim party said on Tuesday it was withdrawing from a peace committee seeking a solution to the islands 10year-ethnic war, reports Reuter. The Shri Lanka Muslim

Congress (SLMC) will not attend the parliamentary select committee scheduled for the 10th of this month," its leader, Mohammed Ashraff, said in a statement. Ashraff said his party objected to a draft report presented by the committee in March.

He said the SLMC had presented proposals on devolving power equitably between the Sinhalese Tamil and Muslim communities in the northeast. "Unfortunately the draft re-

port ... did not include any special mechanism which would erase the fears of the Muslim community of the northeast," the statement said.

It said no one had looked at the problem of settling refugees driven from the north by the Tamil rebels. The liberation Tigers of Tamtl Eelam often attack Muslim civilians in the northeast to drive them away.

Ashraff said the SLMC would return to the committee if the ruling United National Party government and the main opposition Shri Lankan Freedom Party presented their own proposals for ending the conflict.
