Of the total grant, the district sports organisations of Dhaka, Chittagong, Rajshahi, Khulna and Mymensingh were given Taka 2.25 lakh each.

Sports organisations of greater district headquarters were given Taka 1.25 lakh each and the sports organisations of newly formed districts were given Taka One lakh each.

Sports Minister also revealed that all the district sports organisations were given Taka fifty thousand each as additional sanction.


The UEFA control and disciplinary committee imposed the fine after Rangers' fans spat and threw coins at supporters of Belgian club Brugge at their away tie on March 3.
