Use of neem seeds and leaves in controlling crop pests could substantially reduce the nation's continued dependence on imported synthetic pesticides and at the same time save the environment.

According to a preliminary analysis Bangladesh could produce 3000 tons of neem oil and 11,000 tons of neem cake annually from the estimated half a million neem trees grown in unmanaged condition throughout the country.

Talking to BSS reputed Entomologist Dr Manjur Chowdhury said 3000 tons neem oil could provide adequate crop protection for 3.05 million hectres of rice or around 30 per cent of the total rice acreage in Bangladesh. An additional of 0.61 million hectres could be protected by using neem cake.

He said while neem largely being ignored in its native home in Bangladesh, scientists in other countries vigorously working to develop economically and technically feasible methods to extract natural pesticides from neem seeds and leaves.

Neem is an ever green tree that starts producing peanutsized fruits in 4-5 years and may live for 200 years. When

fully grown the trees attain heights 20-25 feet with a spread of 15-33 feet. Mature trees produce 65-110 pounds of fruits annually.

Recent scientific studies have established the effectiveness of neem as an excellent pest control agent which is being used in medicine and plant protection in the sub-continent traditionally.

Dr. Chowdhury said the developed nations were more interested in neem as neem products, non-poisonous to man and other warm blooded animals, have diverse deleterious effect on pest insects, do not pollute the environment and have no side effects on natural enemies of pests.

He said neem pesticides could effectively be used in controlling mosquito menace in the urban areas without disturbing the environment.

Unlike the lethally toxic actions of most synthetic pesticides, active ingredients of neem seeds and leaves repel or inhibit the feeding activities of the pest insects, scientific studies said.

Scientists have also found that neem contains some com-

plex chemicals which causes a profoundly devastating effect on the insects development process from larval condition as well as their reproductive processes and activities.

In laboratory and field trials conducted so far, neem extract showed adverse effect on at least over 100 pest species including several important rice pests like leashoppers, brown planthopper, gall midge and leaf folder.

Several independent studies also showed that application of neem cake actually increases crop yield by inhibiting a denitrifying soil bacteria complex and ensuring more efficient use of nitrogen fertilizers by rice plants.

Dr Chowdhury said researchers have developed various methods for extraction of pesticidal chemicals from neem seeds and leaves and one of these requires only a few simple equipment such as a milling facility and a mechanical stirrer. This technique can easily be adopted for a small scale pesticide production factory, he

He said manufacture of pes-'ticides from neem in small scale

production facilities could gen erate a range of employment opportunities for the rura unemployed and under-em-

Neem is fast growing tree of semi-arid areas. It is highly drought resistant and improves the soil condition. It is valued for its hard and durable timber. An oil compound extracted from its seeds used in face powder, hair lotion, soap and tooth paste.

It is evergreen and planted as an avenue tree particularly in areas where there is scanty of hardly any rainfall in Saudi Arabia now a big plantation of 'neem' trees, planted at the suggestion of late President Ziaur Rahman is a pleasing greenery to the 'hajis' in the midst of the vast desert.

TATA pleads for more liberal economic policy

TATA Engineering and Locomotive Company's Resident Director Sarosh Jahangir Gandhy has stressed the need for a more liberal economic policy in Bangladesh to attract foreign investment and joint venture initiatives.

Sarosh Ghandy along with five other members of a six member delegation arrived in the capital Saturday to explore the possibilities of new joint venture entrepreneurship in Bangladesh.

NITA, a joint venture company of TATA and NITOL Groups, has been assembling commercial vehicles since January last year.

Since then, NITA produced over 500 buses and trucks and it is now expecting to achieve a production level of 1000 vehicles per annum soon.

Chairman of NITOL Group said NITA was now trying to manufacture some of the spares of the vehicles. But for this, the government should come forward with helping hand, he

Referring to the TATA's willingness to transfer technology for such progressive manufacturing, he said the commercial banks would have to finance such projects for the interest of the country.

Speth new UNDP administrator

UNITED NATIONS, June 16: The General Assembly on Tuesday endorsed James Speth, former President of the Washington-based World Resources Institute, as administrator of the UN Development Programme (UNDP), which organises technical assistance projects throughout the third world, says Reuter.

He will succeed William Draper, 65, also of the United States, who steps down on July 15 after seven years at the helm of UNDP.

Speth, 51, headed an environmental task force as part of President Bill Clinton's democratic transition team. From 1977 to 1981 he served as a member and later Chairman of President Jimmy Carter's Council on Environmental Quality.

World expenditure on arms falls

STOCKHOLM, June 16: World expenditure on arms last year "fell by 15 per cent compared to 1991, a faster rate of fall than at any point since it peaked in 1987," a report said today, reports AFP.

The main reason "Was the halving of defence spending in one year" by the successor states of the Soviet Union, said the annual report of the Stockholm International Peace Research Institute (SIPRI).

"Russia and Ukraine together account for 80-90 per cent Commonwealth of Independent States expenditure on defence," the report said. There is probably no room for any further reduction: Expenditure levels have proba-

bly stabilised," it added. The SIPRI said that the "Military burden" -the proposition of gross national product spent on armaments-"Has fallen slightly from around 10 per cent in the former USSR (Soviet Union) to around 6-7 per cent in what is now Russia."

NATO military expenditure "Actually rose during 1992 to about 493 billion dollars in 1991 prices", SIPRI said.

The United States accounted for about 60 per cent of the total. European NATO members "Accounted for 182 billion dollars roughly the same level as in 1985 and a fall of 2.9 per cent from the previous year.

Kuwait wants to raise oil output to 2m BPD

KUWAIT, June 16: Kuwait will try to raise oil output to two million barrels per day (BPD) in the third quarter but it is not in its interests to flood the oil market, Finance Minister Nasser Abdulla Al-Rodhan said on Tuesday, says Reuter.

It is not in our interests to flood the market with our production capacity, Rodhan told reporters.

"There is a responsibility toward such decisions." Rodhan, acting Oil Minister until Oil Minister Ali Ahmed al-Baghli returns from Europe, said Kuwait would try to gently raise output to two million BPD.

Number of bankruptcies in Japan drops

TOKYO, June 16: The number of bankruptcies in Japan dropped 3.9 per cent from a year earlier to 1,113 failures in May, the first decline in 32 months, credit research company Teikoku Data Bank Ltd said Tuesday, reports AFP.

The figure, which measures bankruptcies involving liabilities of at least 10 million yen (95,000 dollar), was also down 3.6 per cent from April.

But liabilities increased 15.7 per cent from a year earlier to 661 billion yen in May, almost double the April figure of 338 billion yen and the number of big corporate failures with liabilities of at least one billion yen

rose eight per cent to 94 cases, the highest level so far this

We can see signs of a gradual recovery from a serious slump," a Teikoku official said "But it's still too early to declare that the slump is over because liabilities are still very high."

The agency forecast that bankruptcies might even resume rising in June from the year-earlier month.

In May, bankruptcies in the manufacturing sector fell 5.2 per cent to 182 cases, while those in the wholesale sector declined 11.9 per cent to 223
