Together they made a new and marvellous creature, charged with power, intelligence and

creative energy. In the annals of anthropology his arrival is celebrated by change in name, from Homo erectus - the Man who stands erect - to 'Homo sapiens'— the Man of Wisdom.

"Will for life is will for form. Death, in its most visible and immediate expression, is the disintegration of form. The first thing man did upon discovering that he was mortal was to erect tomb. Art began with the consciousness of death,' says Octavio Paz, indeed, the graveyard of the Neanderthals breaks through the silence of centuries showing the glint of gold amid the death's

shades and the echo of love. The potteries, the style of art, mythology, religion, all that survived the millennia at the graveyard of the Neanderthals, out of the timeless misty dark, stare into the twentieth century- the reflections of our ancestors; their consciousness of the ultimate destiny and the rituals inextricably connected with death. The Neanderthals died out about thirty five thousand years ago, but some of their genes, with hereditary information, probably exist in the human population today.

The mausoleum, since ancient times, has been both an homage to the death and a defiance to death: the body decays, turns to dust, but the monument remains. Even Islam that took pride in being non-ritual and material could not resist the splendor of Taj Mahal. Nowadays, though such grand monuments are not visible on the graveyard, still majority of the people bury their deads, while funeral is

universal. "Now the new year reviving the old desires, from the thoughtful soul to solitude retires" - 'here the drum beats, dance here'! The 'echo of love', nowadays, turns into the anxiety of 'heaven or hell'! And the Muslims of our country is of no exception.

Though death is an unavoidable phenomenon of our passing days, surprisingly we have very few occasions to perform the inex

haustible rituals con nected with death. Ironically, the death of my grand-father exposed to me, one of the miscries of mankind in a sarcastic way. Muslims in Bangladesh used to offer sweets to the poor for the blessings of almighty Allah so that the deceased gets rid of ins sin and thereby gains a ticket to the heaven. The permament street beggars eagerly stick around beyond the boundary Azimpur gravevard for the 'tobaraks' that would be distributed after the luneral and which, more often, become the only sustenance for the day. It is a familiar scene and is readily expected by

Me and my friend were in charge of distributing sweets to those beggars, who seemed to us, for that time being, an easy access to heaven. But, that was not so easy! All of a sudden the 'hungry mouths' became an 'angry mob': They're going for 'burning and looting' tonight; I could almost hear the screaming as the flery avalanche struck, it must have been like being trapped in a furnace, the furnace of appetite. The fury, frantic indignation; the depth of pain and height of passion evaporate in the air: they no more want to be the "ticket seller" for the heaven; at least for once they could spit on to the trickery of mankind.

The "sweets" were all scattered on the street, making a mockery of our craving for heaven. The disdainful dances of the "living fossils" beyond the graveyard and the collective groan across the ages from within, together with the "brave music" drums up :

"But bright Cecilia raised the wonder higher; When to her organ vocal breath was given. An Angel heard, and straight appeared, Mistaking Earth for Heaven." - John Dryden

Temperature may rise

Under the influence of the active monsoon and a trailing land depression moderate rain or showers accompanied by temporary gusty wind may occur at most places over Chittagong, Barisal and Dhaka divisions and at many places over Khulna and Rajshahi divisions during the next 24 hours commencing 6 am today.

Land depression formed over Bangladesh has moved away northeast wards across Sylhet region yesterday (Saturday). The Met office forecasts, day temperature is likely to rise by one to two degree Celsius over the country

The country's highest temperature yesterday of 32.5 de gree Celsius was recorded in Rajshahi and the lowest 23.3 was recorded in Rangpur. The country experienced rainfall at most of the places.

Rainfalls recorded in daytime yesterday were: Teknaf 205 mm, Rangamati 79mm, Chittagong 73mm, Sandwip 64mm, Cox's Bazar 56mm, Sylhet 52mm, and other places below 50mm. The sun sets today (Sunday) at 6.49 pm and rises tomor-

Because at least 8 to 10 weeks' time is needed to receive money for the aided project after the completion of the works, the figure for February has been inadequately shown as of April-93.


