Hemmings was also severely reprimanded and warned as to his future conduct.

The ex-England bowler, at 44 the oldest player on the county circuit, moved to Sussex after being released by Nottinghamshire at the end of last season.

BRIDGETOWN, Barbados, June 24: Fast bowler Curtly Ambrose has been reprimanded by the West Indies cricket chiefs for misbehaviour during Pakistan's recent tour of the Caribbean, reports Reuter.

The West Indies Cricket Board of Control (WICBC) said in a statement on Wednesday that Ambrose had behaved in an "offensive and unseemly manner" at an official dinner in Barbados before and after the presentation to him of a commemorative medal.

"A letter of apology had subsequently been received from him accepting that his actions had embarrassed the board and deeply regretting the incident," said the WICBC state-

While taking this apology into account, the board has nevertheless written to Ambrose, censuring him in the strongest possible manner and issuing a warning that any recurrence of this behaviour will

be dealt with severely." Ambrose is playing for Northamptonshire in the current English season.



Ecuador, June 24: Argentina and Colombia promised much with a

Already assured of quarterfinal berths before kickoff, group winners Colombia will meet Uruguay and Argentina face the team finishing second in Group B today in Guayaquil

Brazilian referee Mario Rezende surprised players and fans when, just four minutes into the second half, he sent off Argentina's Fernando Redondo and Freddy Rincon of Colombia after they elbowed each other on the ball. Neither had been booked.

Argentina went in front in their first advance on the Colombian goal. Sevilla midfielder Diego Simeone, near the left corner flag, saw Oscar Cordoba well out of his goal and curled a right-footed shot into the net before defender Luis Herrera could get to the

But Colombia hit back within three minutes when Rincon broke through on the left to drive the ball past Segio Goycochea and in at the base of

Colombia controlled onctwos with Carlos Valderrama and Rincon pulling the strings and forwards Victor Aristizabal and Adolto Valencia looking for spaces to break through towards goal.

Argentina played far better than their poor game against Mexico, but their passing was less accurate than the Colombians early on.

Rincon was tracked by Argentine captain Oscar Ruggeri inside the box as he bore down on Goycochea with a good chance of increasing Colombia's lead.

Valderrama, the "Blonde Gullit," set up a chance for Herrera whose shot was blocked by Ruggeri.

Argentine winger Ramon Medina Bello Forced Cordoba into two vital saves, one in each half.

When Redondo won more ball in midfield Argentina came close with several chances and claimed a penalty. not awarded, when defender Alexis Mendoza appeared to deflect a header by Jorge Gorelli with his hand. The match deteriorated af-

SEVILLE, Spain, June 24: Argentina's Diego Maradona has headed home to Buenos Aires, bringing the curtained down on a dismal comeback to flight football, reports

The former Argentine skipper boarded a plane here on Wednesday night, accompanied by his wife Claudia and daughters Dalma and Gianina, but not before delivering a blistering attack on his former

Sevilla, bitterly disappointed with Maradona's performances and his dislike of training, said on Monday they would not be paying the last 1.125 million dollars, slice of his contract.

"Sevilla's officials haven't disappointed me - they are not my Friends," he told sports daily Marca.

"First of all they say one thing, then they stab you in the back ... I've earned every peseta that I've been paid here." "When they say that I wasn't

going to training, just let them ask the club doctor how many times he had to give me injections so that I could play." "How many times did my heart and my head tell me to

play but my legs said the opposite - and yet I'd still play." The 32-year-old return to football here last September after being banned for 15 months because of a cocaine habit. He had failed a drugs

test while playing for Napoli in the Italian calcio. Meanwhile, transfer speculation over Maradona remains unabated and has now moved to Japan.

As an unlikely bid from English First Division club Birmingham City looked doomed on Thursday, after Maradona's agent demanded six million dollars for the move, Japan's fledgling J-League became the next talking point. Maradona has now been

linked with the Urawa Reds. Birmingham's owner, David Sullivan, was willing to put 1.5 million-pounds into an attempt to sign Maradona. The Blues' managing direc

tor, Karren Brady, said "When we first started talking thought that we had a 50-50 chance of signing Maradona. Now its down to 10-90. "If the Japanese want to pay



Becker, aiming for his fourth title here, set out at the start of the year with the aim of grabbing back the world number one spot.

He looked on course with wins in Doha and Milan until a combination of illness and in jury kept him out for nearly two months. Leaving him out of condition and laying the ground for a disastrous run on clay he won only five games in six tournaments

greatest triumph and with grass under his feet, Becker has quickly recovered his zest for the game. Now 25, Becker believes he

played the best tennis of his life Wimbledon in 1986 and it is an ominous sign for his rivals that he believes he is once again close to that level. "I really played like I was
