Army intervention feared

Sharif to seek SC opinion on right to impose direct rule

ISLAMABAD, July 2: Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif has decided to resort to the courts again as his power struggle with the President enters the 'third round' amid open defiance of his authority in Pakistan's most important province, officials said today, report AFP, Reuter.

The decision was taken by the cabinet in the larger interest of the country and the nation', Sharif advisor Mushahid Hussain said amid fears here that a fresh confrontation in Punjab province could so damage political authority that the army would inevitably intervene.

The powerful army chiefs held a special meeting Tuesday

to discuss Pakistan's deepening political confusion.

Political sources said the army, which has ruled the country for much of its 45-year history, had given a hint to Sharif not to aggravate the

The corps commanders held their meeting at army headquarters in Islamabad's twin city of Rawalpindi, officials said. No other details were available.

Army Chief of Staff General Abdul Waheed has shuttled between Sharif and his archenemy, President Ghulam Ishaq Khan, in four meetings in a week to try to persuade them to end their confrontation, the sources said.
