Sharif invites Benazir to discuss polls

ISLAMABAD, July 5: Pakistani Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif said on Monday he was not afraid to hold mid-term elections and urged opposition leader Benazir Bhutto to meet him to discuss her demand for

"We are not running away from elections," Sharif told Reuters a day after Bhutto sent him a letter urging him to put aside their enmity and join forces to end a political crisis and hold off martial law.

"A democratically elected government should not be hesitant about going to the people, but we have a mandate for five years and how will elections solve this crisis?" he said in an interview.

Bhutto demanded that Sharif call elections to resolve a crisis she said had intensified since last Thursday when

powerful Chief of Army Staff General Abdul Waheed spoke out. Waheed advised Sharif that he should end his paralysing six-month-old deadlock with President Ghulam Ishaq Khan or dissolve the National Assembly.

"We are ready to talk", Sharif said, adding that Bhutto appeared to have reservations about meeting him.

"All these issues could be discussed in a one-to-one meeting with Benazir Bhutto," Sharif said.

Bhutto has long been at loggerheads with Sharif, who succeeded her after she was dismissed as Prime Minister in 1990, and several previous attempts at reconciliation - including talks last month have been fractured by bitter disagreement.



UN arms experts pull out of Iraq

BAGHDAD, July 5: A team of UN arms experts pulled out of Iraq today after failing to persuade Iraq to let them install monitoring cameras at missile test sites, reports Reuter. The experts, led by senior

inspector Nikita Smidovich of Russia, left Baghdad for Cyprus. The UN Security Council has warned iraq of unspecified scrious consequences if it does not permit the cameras.

"So the camera installation team is departing," said Smidovich, who had been in Iraq since June 4. "Iraq has to assess the de-

cision of the Security Council which qualifies the position of Iraq as a breach of Security Council Resolution 687, the ceasefire and 707," he added. The decision to pull the in-

spectors out has cast a shadow over talks between Iraq and the United Nations in New York this week on the conditions for Iraq resuming oil sales. US Secretary of State

News Analysis SROs: Saifur's options

Låst week Finance Minister Saifur Rahman announced that Statutory Regulatory Orders (SROs) shall not be issued unless there is an emergency. Nor prices of utilities will be increased.

Pointing out that the Minister has not ruled out tax and utility price increases altogether, analysts project that the Finance Ministry may face an emergency early next year irrespective of whether or not nature is adverse. In his budget statement

the Finance Minister informed Parliament that administrative measures had led to receipt of an additional Tk 310 erore on VAT land to a minor extent, Income Tax) account during 1992-93 Minister Rahman expects

that there will be a repeat of this experience in 1993-94 and he will be receiving Taka 388 crore through improvement in VAT administration At the same time, Satfur Rahman has raised the turnover limit for VAT exemption from Taka 5 lakh to Tk 7.5 lakh.

Analysts point out that the unexpected increase in VAT collections in 1992-93 occurred through a major drive to expand the VAT net by foreing registration of businesses which do not qualify as cottage industry but have turnover in excess of Taka 5 lakh. The increase in turnover limit from Taka 5 lakh to Taka 7.5 lakh has, in one stroke, eroded the VAT tax base significantly. To make up for this a new set of VAT payers will have to be identified. This has very low probability of success.

Consequently, there will be a shortfall in revenue receipt There is also an apprehension that the shortfall will be ampli fied by shortfall in receipt of customs duty projected at Tk 3070 crore - Tk 235 crore higher than the 1992-93 receipt.

This revenue crunch will constitute the 'emergency' that will require Saifur Rahman to raise taxes through SROs and, perhaps, to raise utility prices.
