### England, Pakistan placed in same group for '96 WC

LONDON, July 9: England and Pakistan, who contested the last World Cup final, have been drawn in the same qualifying group for the 1996 tournaments, reports AFP. South Africa and New

Zealand, the two beaten semi finalists from 1992, are also in Group A with the finalists in the competition to be held in India, Pakistan and Shri Lanka. The group, to be completed

by two associate member countries from next year's ICC Trophy in Kenya, is by far the toughest of the two. In group B there is India, Shri Lanka, Australia, West Indies, Zimbabwe, and the runners up from the ICC Trophy.

But with four countries to qualify for the quarter-finals from each group, none of the favourites should have too many problems.

Apart from deliberately keeping main hosts Pakistan and India away from each other, there was no seeding element behind today's draw in London.

Shri Lanka, who will also host several games, have emerged in India's group along with Australia, West Indies and Zimbabwe.

Test and County Cricket Board spokesman Ken Lawrence said: "Past results in one-day cricket tend to count for very little; so there would not have been much point in any seeding arrangement, especially, with the World Cup nearly three years away."

# Scindia elected

ACI chief LONDON, July 9: Madhav Rao Scindia, president of the Hoard of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI), was today elected chairman of the Asian Cricket Council (ACI) for a period of two years, reports PTI.

India take over from the

United Arab Emirates (UAE). The Asian Cricket Council at its annual meeting here today decided to form a committee to go into the question of setting up permanent secretariat on the lines of the ICC secretariat at Lord's here.

Scindia, who also attended the two-day meeting of the ICC at Lord's said Australia and New Zealand have suggested slight modification in the itinerary of the World Cup to be jointly hosted by India, Pakistan and Shri Lanka.

The suggestion will be considered by the World Cup Committee of Pakistan-India-Shri Lanka and a final decision will be taken soon, he said.

Scindia said the ICC decided to set up advisory committees. One committee will have six members, one from England and West Indies each and one from the southern African region, Australasian region and South Asian region each. Its decisions would be rec-

ommendatory in nature and the final decision will be taken by the chairman of the ICC,

NEW DELHI, July 9: Indian all-rounder Kapil Dev, who is a dozen wickets short of becoming Test cricket's most successful bowler, says breaking the record is secondary on the tour of Shri Lanka, reports

"India winning the series is more important," Kapil, who left with the Indian team for Shri Lanka on Friday, told the Press Trust of India in Madras.

"First we should concentrate on taking the series. The record can be achieved if I keep playing," the 34-year-old all-rounder said. "I don't know when the

record will come but to maintain the team's habit of winning is more important". Kapil has scalped 420 Test

batsmen, 11 short of the great New Zealander Sir Richard Hadlee. Kapil said he would keep playing as long as he was fit

and enjoying his cricket. "I would continue playing as long as my knees can hold my weight," he said. "I will be happy to continue even for the next 20 years.

"But if I am not fit, there is no point in continuing, record or no record. "My first aim is to enjoy



Olympic inspectors which puts Sydney ahead in the bid to stage the Games in the year 2000, reports Reuter. Sydney, long tipped as a frontrunner with Beijing among

the six bidding cities, offered conditions beyond International Olympic Committee (IOC) requirements, according to the But John Balder, a board member of the Sydney Olympic bid team, said that although

gratifying, the importance of the report should not be overstated. "All along we thought we were putting together a pretty good bid in terms of Sydney's excellent location and facilities generally," Valder told reporters.

"But if the IOC assessment team (which wrote the report) have recognised this too, that certainly reinforces the strength of our bid," he added.

However, Valder said the 66page document would be only one of the factors to influence the 91 IOC members when they vote in Monte Carlo on September 23.

"So, pleasing as it is, we shouldn't overstate its importance," he said.


