In simple terms, it means a loss of market of 90,000 metric tons of jute goods in the United States, he said but assured that this should, however, give us no cause for concern.

The Jute Minister went on to add that during his visit to the US he had explored alternate uses of jute goods as garbage disposal bags, thermal foam substitute for buildings, packing for nursery plants and reusable shopping bags, etc.

Giving an example, he said New York city alone requires 100,000 metric tons of garbage disposal bags annually.


