ISLAMABAD, July 18: Pakistan President Ghulam Ishaq Khan announced his resignation Sunday, a short time after his political rival Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif also stepped down, ending a fourmonth long crisis, reports AFP.

The President said he would proceed on four months' leave. He made the announcement after giving the oath of office to former senior World Bank vice president Moeen Gureshi, who steps in as caretaker Prime Minister.

"In order to uphold the national interest and in the firm belief that it shall help resolve the political crisis, I have decided to voluntarily resign my

He said he had hoped the Supreme Court's verdict restoring his government after Ishaq Khan dissolved it three months ago would be respected, but what actually happened was a 'bitter story', adding that 'conspirators' were after his government.

"My heart is full of secrets. If I reveal all, a multitude of people will take to the streets in expression of anger," Sharif said in a hard-hitting speech.

He said an 'artificial crisis' was created to cause difficulties and 'punish the poor for their love of Nawaz Sharif.'

## Myanmar agrees to reopen transit

From Staff Correspondent CHITTGONG, July 18: Myanmar has agreed to soon reestablish transit links with Bangladesh in an effort to develop bilateral relation, official sources said.

Myanmar unilaterally suspended transit facilities with Bangladesh after two alleged drug traffickers - Boz Zahir Ahmed and Lal Meah - were arrested by Bangladesh border guards on July 1 while allegedly trafficking heroin into Bangladesh. Both of them were caught by the BDR from the Naaf river which demarcates the frontier between the two coun-

The two were put in jail and are to face trial, officials here informed. Myanmar border guards

identified the two as Myanmar nationals and pressed for their quick release but Bangladesh refused to return them without trial, according to officials.

The agreement for a restoration of transit links came in a flag meeting held by the border guard officials at the company commander-level at the Teknaf frontier town on Saturday, officials added.

# Japanese polls: Record low for SDP

# LDP's 38-yr monopoly ends

TOKYO, July 18: Japan's ruling Liberal Ismocratic Party (LDP) lost its parliamentary majority in today's election, winning 223 seats in the 511seat Lower House, final returns by the Japan Broadcasting Corp (NHK) showed, reports AFP.

But the LDP, in power for 38 years, managed to achieve its pre-election goal of winning at least 220 seats, putting it in a position to form a coalition with a single opposition party.

NHK showed non-communist opposition parties and independents certain of gaining at least 273 seats.

The main opposition Social Democratic Party (SDP) was assured of winning 70 seats, a record low, while Shinsetto, 'the Japan Reneweal Party' set up by former Finance Minister Tsutomu Hata last month, was assured of 55 seats.

The Buddhist- backed Kometto was certain of 51 seats, while the Japan New Party, formed last year by another disaffected LDP member, was assured of 35.

The centrist Democratic Socialist Party (DSP) was certain to win 15 seats followed by 13 for the Sakigake, or 'Pioneer Party' - another LDP splinter group formed last month. The centrist Shaminren (United Social Democratic Party) was certain of four seats.
