So I cannot even dream of availing of the benefit of private tuition. What I have to do each day is to get the most out of a class during the college hours. 

> Then what is the remedy for this situation? For this private coaching should be stopped and totally objective types of questions should be introduced. > Private coaching imparted by the teachers are not only contributing to the ultimate division among two opposing student groups, the rich and the poor. It is in a way barring the individ ual growth of a student's mind. Because students who avail private tuitions often become highly dependant on them. What is more, it is also creating a sharp division among teachers too. Not that teachers from all subjects have a potential 'private practice'. Only teachers from some of the science subjects, some from selected commerce subjects and a few good teachers of English have large slices. For others, the picture is quite gloomy. And obviously, one cannot expect too much from a discontent teacher. So, sooner or later something has to be done to salvage the poor students from this crisis.

Prospect of US investment in Bangladesh bright'

President of the American Bangladesh Economic Forum Dr Forrest e Cookson yesterday stated that the prospects of American investment in Bangladesh were getting brighter as the buying capacity of the common people of the country had increased drastically over the last few years.

He was inaugurating as chief guest the launching ceremony of an alternative type of full cream milk powder "Gold Crown" organised jointly by the manufacturer of the product, Protein Technologies International, USA and its agent in Bangladesh Anwar and Brothers Group.

Dr Cookson observed that inflation and financial deficit had decreased significantly in Bangladesh. 'Taka has also become a strong currency," he said and added that in this context the launching of "Gold Crown" was appropriate as the buying capacity of the people had also increased

Country free from latherism

"Don't swallow so many tantalising Chinese delicacies regularly, which can make you suffer from Chinese restaurant disease syndrome," a nutrition scientist said Wednesday.

Prof Kamaluddin Ahmed, Chairman, Bangladesh National Nutrition Council (BNNC) told a seminar that "Tasting salt which is much used in cooking Chinese dishes, can cause a latherism-like syndrome, if consumed regularly."

He did not elaborate the tasting salt issue but said that the country was now free from latherism as the people gave up cating Khasari.

People in the North Bengal had been affected with the disease on a large scale that cripples legs and hands but after detecting harmful ingredients in Khasari, the people also stopped eating it.

Professor Ahmed was delivering the MO Ghani Memorial Lecture on "Development of Biochemistry and Nutrition in Bangladesh," at the auditorium of the Institute of Food Science and Technology at the BCSIR.

He mainly described his personal experience in different research works without mentioning the current nutrition situation in the country and the possible measures to improve it.

Dr MO Ghant was the Vice-Chancellor of Dhaka University and contributed a lot to the development of science and technology in the country. He had served the government in different capacities and after retirement he was elected the Member of Parliament in 1979 as an independent candidate.
