Boon leads Aussie charge



LEEDS, England, July 22: David Boon's third century of the series put Australia well on the road to re

taining the Ashes as they amassed 307 for three on the opening day of the fourth Test against England today, reports Reuter. England's novice four-man

seam attack failed to extract any real venom from the muchfeared Headingley pitch as each of the Australian batsmen scored runs with ease.

Boon was unbeaten on 102 at the close and captain Allan Border on 38 not out.

Australia, already 2-0 up in the six-match series, will be certain of retaining the Ashes even should they manage only a

Opener Michael Slater set the tone from the outset after Border won the toss and decided to bat.

He and Mark Taylor put on 86 for the first wicket before the left-hander was trapped lbw for 27 by Test debutant Martin Bicknell, drafted in by England in place of off-spinner Peter

Slater continued undaunted, stylishly reaching his third halfcentury of the series as Australia moved to 103 for one by lunch.

Slater reached his half-century from only 75 deliveries and went on to make 67 before falling to Mark Illot shortly after lunch, bowled when attempting to clip a good length ball through mid-wicket.

That left Australia still well placed on 110 for two and runs continued to come a pace as Mark Waugh joined the in-form Boon, his country's most consistent batsman over the past three years.

Boon was especially severe on Illot, punishing him for four boundaries in quick succession Headingley, where there has

been a result in every Test since England's draw against West indies in 1980, appeared to have lost its venom following the relaying of the piccn on the instructions of the Test and Country Cricket Board.


