'No uplift can be realised without participation of empowered women'

Gender discrimination in the way households distribute resources among its members lead to higher female mortality rates, according to a paper presented at a seminar yesterday at a local hotel in Dhaka.

The seminar titled Identifying Sex Bias in the Allocation of Households Resources, focussed on the various types of discrimination against females in most households in Bangladesh.

The panel included A M Zahiruddin Khan, Minister for Planning who was also the chief guest, Dr. Jonathan Morduch, Professor of Department of Economics of Harvard University, USA, Asif Ahmad, a graduate of Harvard University and Dr. Mizanur Rahman Shelley, Chairman of Centre for Development Researched, Bangladesh (CDRB) chaired the

in his inaugural speech, Planning Minister Zahiruddin Khan retterated the vital role played by women in the development process. "No aspect of development, political, eco nomic or socio-cultural can be effectively realised without the participation of empowered women," he said.

All sectors of human life and activities including education, environment, industry, population activities and nutrition are only complete when both men and women participate, he added. Zahtruddin pointed out that although more and more women are participating in the development process there have been very few studies that throw light into the situation of women in Bangladesh.

This was the first time that analysis of gender inequality had been made at the national

In the context of national planning and policy making the study would be very insightful, said the Planning Minister.

He further emphasized the need for education of women and programmes to enhance earning opportunities and credit availability for women in order to eliminate sex bias.

Varsity, weapons can't co-exist: Prof Yunus

Prof Mohammad Yunus of Grameen Bank yesterday called upon the Dhaka University students to cleanse the campus of arms and terrorism and turn it into an invincible fortress of democracy to remould national politics, reports UNB.

"Politics of the country will get the scope of being re-oriented towards poverty alleviation if the university is freed from arms and violence," he told the students at an orientation programme of freshers at TSC auditorium last morning.

"If you want your own welfare as well as welfare of the people, eliminate terrorism for ever from the campus and establish democracy at the university. Presided over by Vice

Chancellor Prof Emajuddin Ahmed, the function was also addressed by university Registrar Abu Jayed Sikder. The renowned economist ad-

vised them to create an atmosphere to instil confidence in the mind of people about the future. "What can we expect, how can we dream for the future of the country, if law is paralysed and democracy falls flat on its face on the campus of country's highest seat of learn-

He identified arms and terrorism as the root problem of the varsity and said establishing rule of law in the country would be easier if rule of law could first be established at

Dhaka University. Prof Yunus said the university campus should be a place absolutely free of fears, where everyone can move without fear. But it has now become a dreaded and "very risky zone"

broad daylight "Democracy and terrorism cannot go together. University and automatic weapons cannot co-exist - university is the seat for logic and free exercise of knowledge, not a place for occupying chars to the strength of arms and lathi," said Prof Yunus, adding "it is impossible to ensure democracy in the country till arms stay here".

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

BMDA to plant 12 lakh saplings this season
