STUTTGART, Aug 20: Briton Sally Gunnell set the first world record of the World Athletics Champion-

ships on Thursday and Merlene Ottey finally got the gold medal which has eluded her throughout her career, reports Reuter. In the first of two gripping

women's races, Olympic champion Gunnell stormed to victory in 52.74 seconds in the 400 metres hurdles, slicing one-fifth of a second off the previous, record, as she lunged for the finish line to edge cut American Sandra Farmer-Patrick.

Ottey, the 33-year old Jamaican who lost the 100 metres title by one-thousandth of a second, just held on to win the 200 metres gold as American Gwen Torrence closed fast the last few strides.

Ukrainian Sergei Bubka became the only athlete to take world titles in a single event at all four championships held when he cleared six metres to win the pole vault And there was a stirring win

O' Brien on course

STUTTGART, Germany, Aug 20: Dan O'Brien extended his lead in the decathlon Friday as he closed in on a second consecutive World Championship title, reports AP. The American world record-

holder clocked 14.08 seconds in the 110-metre hurdles and threw the shot 47.92 metres (157-3), giving him 6,389 points after seven events of the two day competition.

O'Brien, who led by four points after the first day, boosted his lead over Paul Meier of Germany to 118 points. Meter, who clocked 14.63 in the hurdles and threw the shot 45.72 metres (150) had 6,271 points.

Eduard Hamalainen of Belarus climbed into third place, with 6,270 points. He set a world record decathlon time of 13.57 seconds in the hurdles bettering his own previous mark of 13.65 and threw the shot 49.26 metres (161-7).

Morceli makes a point

STUTTGART, Aug 20: After

weeks of defying World Championship organisers with a boycott threat, it took defending champion Noureddine Morcel only three minutes Thursday to reimpose his authority in the 1,500, reports AP. The brilliant Algerian took the lead in his qualifying heat

with just under a lap to go to outrun his challengers and an ugly crash that could have jeopardized his chances of reaching the semifinals. "I want to be a champion here because all the great ath-

Ottey's jinx on gold was in grave danger of continuing as the Jamaican reached for the self-destruct button in the last 10 metres of her race.

Clearly ahead throughout and apparently in total control, she seemed to stop running as the sprinters neared the line and Olympic champion Torrence closed fast and almost caught her.

nings total of 380 all out. Derbyshire fast-bowler Malcolm, ignored by the selectors this summer despite having played in 24 previous Tests, finally supplied the pace needed to give England a chance for their first five-day win over Australia since 1986.

Fraser, playing in his first Test since aggravating a hip injury 2.5 years ago, fooled the Australians with swinging deliveries on a firm pitch thought to be ideal for batsmen.

Only opener Mark Taylor was able to pass the half-century mark a feat achieved by four England batamen on Thursday.

Earlier, Paul Retffel took two wickets as England's tail-enders, resuming on an overnight total of 353 for seven, were dismissed in less than an hour.

When Australia came to bat, it was Malcolm who struck first. On the bowler's ninth delivery, Michael Slater tried to hook

a boundary, but instead looped the ball off the top edge to Graham Gooch for a simple catch at short leg. Out for four, Australia stood at nine for one. The same combination saw

off David Boon. But not before the Tasmania batsman sliced a six off Malcolm over third man. But with the score on 30,

Boon was out for 13 when he hit an inside edge off his pad to give Gooch another easy grab. With Australia at 42 for two at lunch, England called on

Playing in place of the injured Martin Bicknell, the Middlesex paceman took a wicket on his 17th delivery when be fooled Mark Waugh with a ball that broke back from off stump. Waugh, who scored 10, could only edge the chesthigh bounce into the gloves of wicket keeper Alec Stewart to leave Australia at 53 for three.

Australia retaliated with the left-handed duo of Taylor and captain Allan Border, who built a partnership of 79 before Malcolm captured wicket No. 3. Taylor, who reached 50

when he hit a cover drive for four off Steve Watkin, was out for 70 when he backed up on a Malcolm delivery and sliced it to Nasser Hussain at gully. Fraser added to Australia's



Shri Lanka, Aug 20: Jonty Rhodes, one of South Africa's most valuable batting assets, laid to rest any concern over his

form with a solid 50 as the tourists drew their three-day game against a Shri Lankan Board XI here Friday, reports Rhodes, who had scored just 10 runs in the two innings he

has had in the current tour, found his form in the nick of time to give a boost to the batting line-up ahead of Sunday's first one-day international in central Kandy. Having bowled out the Board XI 42 runs behind their first

innings score of 333 for 9 declared, the South Africans reached 156 for 4 in their second innings when the umpires called off the match five overs from the end. Vice-captain Hansie Cronje

was unbeaten on 38 after sharing a 70-run fourth-wicket stand with Rhodes.

Cronje's 103-minute innings contained a six off left-arm spinner Don Anurasiri and three boundaries.

It was evident that South Africa not only wanted more batting practice but also a timely knock from the right-

handed Rhodes. In fact cricket manager Mike Procter promoted the 24 yearold batsman over two others in the batting order to provide him with another opportunity to come good before the major

batting. We are delighted at the way he played today," said skipper Kepler Wessels. Rhodes was eventually out

shortly after reaching his half-

century when he tried to sweep Anurashri but was caught at forward short-leg by Dulip Samaraweera. He had four boundaries in his 106-ball knock. Speedster Fanie de Villiers captured three more wickets as Shri Lanka lost their last five


