



LONDON, Aug 22: County Championships leaders Middlesex beat challengers Northamptonshire by 10 wickets with more than a day to spare at Lord's on Saturday, reports Reuter.

The victory on the third day of the four-day match gave Middlesex a commanding 58point lead at the top of the

Middlesex took 13 wickets during the day as Northamptonshire offered only occasional resistance.

Discarded England spinners John Emburey and Phill Tufnell took most of the wickets. Middlesex captain Mike

Oatting was delighted with the result but warned his players against complacency "The winners (of the Lord's match ) were obviously going to

become well-placed to win the title," said Gatting. "But nothing is ever certain

## Primorac's prime showdown

GUANGZHOU, China, Aug 22: Croatia's Zoran Primorac won his first major tournament when he defeated China's Wang Tao by three sets to two, to grab the World Cup table tennis championships here Sunday, reports AFP. A tired Primorac battled
