

STUTTGART, Germany, Aug 23: The International Amateur Athletic Federation ba-German

sprinter Katrin Krabbe for two years effective Sunday for bringing the sport into disrepute, track sources said, reports AP.

Krabbe, winner of the 100 and 200 at the 1991 World Championships, was suspended for four years after failing an out-of-competition drug test last year.

in contradiction of IAAF sanctions, the German federation DLV reduced the suspension to one year. The DLV said it had no provisions for out-ofcompetition testing in its won rules and that German courts don't accept a four-year ban.

In May, the IAAF Council said Krabbe would remain suspended until it decided whether the case needed to go to arbitration.

The German federation has been pushing the IAAF Council to make a final decision or take the case to arbitration.

To avoid arbitration, the council decided to suspend Krabbe for two years for bringing the sport into disrepute, but not on doping charges. No arbitrating can be called in case an athletes is suspended on disrepute charges, said the sources, who spoke on the condition of anonymity.

The ban means Krabbe will not be able to compete at the 1995 World Championships in Goteborg, Sweden, just as she missed the worlds that ended Sunday in Stuttgart.

Thorsten Heuser, Krabbe's legal adviser, said he would put pressure on the German federation to request arbitration. But Heuser spoke before it became clear that Krabbe was being banned on disrepute charges, not for doping. German tract sources have

said that the IAAF council feels it would lose its case before an arbitration panel. Krabbe already won an ear-

lier doping case that went to arbitration. The IAAF two-year ban also covers two other German

sprinters Grit Breuer and

Manuela Derr.

The sources said Krabbe and the two other sprinters had admitted taking clenbuterol, and had made hostile statements directed at the IAAF providing the reason to ban them for bringing the sport into disrepute.

Krabbe admitted taking, asthma medicine which contained clenbuterol, but said she didn't know it was illegal. The IAAF considers clenbuterol a banned substance.

When the German federation banned Krabbe for a year, it said she was guilty of "medication abuse."

The German ban was to have expired on Aug 14, when the World Championships began in

Stuttgart. The IAAF Council at the beginning of the championships

rejected a German federation proposal to introduce a more flexible suspension scale that it feels it could defend in German courts. German courts are believed to hold four-year bans for too long for professional athletes who make their living from the sport.

Three other doping cases were on the agenda of the council, but no decision was immediately known.

John Ngugi, the five-time world cross-country champion from Kenya, was banned for four years after refusing to submit to an out-of-competition test earlier this year. The Kenyans are pressing for an arbitration hearing in the case.


Iris Biba, a German 10,000metre runner, is contesting a drug ban on grounds of "exceptional circumstances."

# STUTTGART NOTEBOOK

STUTTGART, Germany, Aug 23: "Who needs Carl?" was the question after the US sprint relay team equalled the world record without Carl Lewis. The Canadians can now say "Who needs Ben?."

The Canadian relay team set a national record without Ben Johnson Sunday to clinch the bronze medal in the 400-metre relay, reports AP.

Robert Esmie, Glenroy Gilbert, Bruny Surin and Atlee Mahorn ran the relay in 37.83 improving on the old mark of 38.43 set by the Canadian team set in 1982, at high altitude. Johnson was the leadoff man on that team

Johnson was banned for life earlier this year after he was caught a second time for drug use. Meanwhile, Johnson started his belated soccer career with a team in Canada this weekend.

CHEERS FOR THE CROWD: The Fourth World Championships drew the biggest crowd since the event was inaugurated in 1983.

In all, 584,450 fans saw nine days of competition, according to Rainer Voegele, vice-president of the organizing committee. This represented 69 per cent of the 737,800 tickets available.

The previous attendance record was 581,000, in Tokyo in 1991.

SUNNY CHAMPIONSHIPS: The World Championships hit it lucky with the weather.

While many parts in Europe are suffering through one of the worst summers in a long time, the sun was out virtually the entire 9-day competition.

Blue skies reigned and temperates hovered around 25 degrees Celcius (77F) on average and reached 32 C (90F) on Sunday.

Stuttgart Mayor Manfred Rommel called the good weather "a heavenly reward for quality work."

IF IT'S 37.77 IT MUST BE STUTTGART: Colin Jackson's hectic weekend ended with a silver medal. He should have gotten a gold for effort.

Jackson led off the 400-metre relay for Britain Sunday on only two hours of sleep. Jackson won the 110 metres hurdles gold medal late

Friday. From Stuttgart, he flew to a Saturday wedding of a friend in Worcester, England. The Welshman then returned home to Cardiff for a short

Sunday morning, he drove to London to catch a plane for

Stuttgart, just in time for the relay final.

Jackson ran the first leg and relaxed as he watched his teammates help set a new European record in 37.77.

"It's all been great fun. I wouldn't have missed it. Another medal for the team - and a European record to go with it."

# IAAF fears legal bickering

admitted on Monday they could face a battle in the civil court over a decision to impose a new two-year ban on

German sprinter Katrin Krabbe for admitting to taking drugs, reports Reuter. The International Amateur

Athletic Federation (IAAF) announced it was banning Krabbe and teammates Grit Breuer and Manuela Derr, who have already been suspended for the past year, for two further years from Monday.

sport's governing body did not analyse the specific legal implications of imposing the new ban when it made its decision at a short council meeting on Sunday.

Asked if he feared Krabbe might resort to the civil court to fight the ban, Ljunqvist said: "That could be the situation .... The council did not get legal advice on the two years. The two years came up in the conversation.

"Council believed that people involved in this kind of matter should be seriously punished". The IAAF was unable to enforce its minimum four-year

ban under its doping rules because of a legal loophole and acted under its rules of unsportsmanlike behaviour. The three former East

Germans, who admitted to taking the drug clenbuterol after positive tests on Krabbe and Breauer in July last year, had brought the sport into disrepute by doping, it said.

But the decision to impose But IAAF doping panel chief such a large ban is sure to Arne Ljungqvist admitted the bring the body further legal problems. The German Athletics Federation (DLV) said immediately it would not accept the ruling and would call the IAAF arbitration panel into action.

"We will call the arbitration panel into action immediately. This is a strange decision. It does not meet with German or international law," DLV general secretary Jan Kern said.

would not get past a German Last September the DLV recommended a four-year ban on Krabbe, the 1991 world 100 and 200 metres champion, Breuer, who won 400 metres silver at the last World

Championships, and Derr. But in March a German arbitration panel, cut the bans on Krabbe and Breuer to one year and Derr's suspension to eight months because the DLV was found to have no legal clause in its rules allowing it to ban athletes as a result of out-of-com-

pctition test. The DLV, which had to follow German law to avoid action in the civil courts, was only able to act against the athletes under its rules of unsportsmanlike

conduct. The IAAF accepted the legal loophole and also resorted to its own rules for unsportsmanlike behaviour.

Ljungqvist said the IAAF had commissioned a report on the German legal problems which was discussed at the meeting.

# Record breakers ring the bell

STUTTGART, Aug 23: The Americans sent the world 4X400 metres relay record tumbling on Sunday but the breakthrough the team wanted to talk about involved money and power not time on a stop watch, reports Reuter.

"I had a great time," said anchorman Michael Johnson after the US quarter slashed the world record to two minutes 54.29 seconds in the concluding race of the fourth World Athletics Championships.

"But I still think athletes should have a say on whether there are going to be World Championships every two years "If there are, we should at least get some money".

The International Amateur Athletic Federation (IAAF) has steadfastly refused to pay athletes to compete in the champi-

Instead, gold medalists collect a Mercedes car worth 30,000 dollars.

Johnson said the situation had to change before the next championships in Gothenburg, Sweden, in 1995.

"I would hate to have to miss that," Johnson said. "But if that's what it takes to get what needs to be done in this sport, that's what I'll do.

"I think as soon as the athletes realise that if we come together and do what Noureddine (Morceli) was trying to do as a group, then we will have a lot more power."

Morceli, the world 1,500 metres record holder, had threat ened to boycott the championships unless he was paid prize-money. He relented last week and successfully defended his title on Sunday.

"What Morceli was trying to do was to get some rights," said Butch Reynolds, who has been locked in a protracted battle with the IAAF after testing positive for a banned steroid in

"I hope I made a statement that all athletes deserve rights," said the American, who has been awarded 27.3 million dollars, in damages by a US court for his 2-1/2 year doping suspension.

"It feels great after 2-1/2 years to come back and break a world record," he said. "That should stand 20 years from

The US team comprised lead-off Andrew Valmon, Olympic champion Quincy Watts, world record holder Reynolds and world champions Johnson.

"I knew as soon as I handed the stick to Michael, it was over," said Reynolds, who clocked 43.23 for his leg.

Johnson ran the fastest 400 metres relay split ever, clocking 42.94 seconds.

### Carbajal's father dead

PHOENIX, Aug 23: Manuel Carbajal, the father of pro boxing champion Michael Carbajal, has died after suffering an apparent heart attack at his home here. He was 61, reports AP.

Family members said the elder Carbajal apparently died in his sleep. He was discovered dead Saturday morning when his wife, Mary, tried to wake

"It was very unexpected," said Danny Carbajal, adding that his father had appeared to be in good health.

He said paramedics transported his father to Maricopa Medical Centre and the exact time of death will be determined by the county Medical Examiner's office.

Manuel Carbajal, who was an amateur boxer in the 1950s, has been credited by Michael as being an inspiration for his

Michael Carbajal, a silver medalist at the 1988 Summer Olympics, now holds both the WBC and IBF light flyweight championships and has 29-0 record as a pro with 17 knock-

#### Painful pull-out for US baseballers

MANAGUA, Aug 23: The US baseball team withdrew from the World Baseball Championship qualifying tournament on Sunday after two players were injured when a man shattered a window of the team's bus Saturday night, reports AP.

The motive for the attack was not immediately clear, but authorities said it may have been a robbery and appeared to be unrelated to the taking of about 70 hostages by rival rebel

The team's bus was attacked as it was getting ready to leave Managua stadium after being defeated 6-1 by Nicaragua's team. The single assailant fled after he smashed the window with a rock, and has not been arrested.

Two players were cut by flying glass but not seriously injured, said team spokesman Mike Lantz.

"The team called us this morning and told us they would no longer be playing because' they feared for their security," said a tournament spokeswoman Rosario Montenegro to the Associated Press.

ates 4X400 metres men's relay team rounded off a dazzling World

Championships on Sunday by shattering the world record they set at last year's Olypics, reports AP.

The strongest quarter of onelappers, the Americans have ever sent out, took almost oneand-a-half seconds off their Barcelona time, clocking two minutes 54.29 seconds to a deafening roar of applause from an ecstatic Stuttgart crowd.

Individual 400 metres gold winner Michael Johnson ran a storming final leg, unofficially timed in 42.9 seconds, the fastest single lap ever recorded as the US team set the fifth world record of the week.

World record holder Butch Reynolds, who ran the third leg, said: "As soon as I handed the baton to Michael I knew it was over. I think this record will stand for 20 years."

 Algeria's Noureddine Morceli, who arrived at the last minute in Germany after threatening to boycott the championships, raced to a comfortable victory in the Blue Riband event, the men's 1,500 metres. But there was controversy in

the men's 10,000 metres. Defending champion Moses Tanui lost a shoe on the last lap

and was beaten in the sprint by young Ethiopian Haile Gebresilasie, who had appeared to touch the Kenyan's shoes. Double gold medalist Gail Devers was involved in another dramatic photo-finish, this time
