NEW DELHI, Aug 24 : India's ruling Congress (I) party today put off a parliamentary debate and vote on controversial legal amendments designed to separate religion and politics in the face of stiff opposition, reports

The postponement, announced in the Lower House by Home Minister Shankarrao Chavan, came in the wake of threats by Hindu-revivalist and centrist opposition parties who said they would not support the the twin amendments.

The fate of the bills, which needed a two-thirds majority support in Parliament to be-

Decade action plan for girl child

The Bangladesh Decade Action Plan for the Girl Child 1991-2000 was formally launched in Dhaka yesterday, reports BSS.

The overall goal of the action plan is to coordinate and strengthen social, legal, educational, health and nutritional programmes and measures aimed at survival, development and protection of the girl child in Bangladesh.

The action plan has been adopted on the basis of the spirit and premises of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child as well as those of the SAARC Summit Declaration. The formulation of the plan follows the commitment of Bangladesh to achieving the goals and objectives of the SAARC Decade Plan of Action for the Girl Child 1991-2000, prepared in pursuance of the directives of the SAARC Summit in Male

(November 1990) and subsequently endorsed by the SAARC Summit in Colombo (December 1991).

An official document released on the occasion says, the action plan is the reflection of the commitment of Bangladesh towards improving the conditions of the girl child and raising the status of women.

The plan seeks to establish pragmatic efforts focussed on the girl child, and ensure that they were well integrated within the development activities of various social development agencies and thereby ensuring a broad-based social participation in the process of elimination of social injustice to and economic exploitation of the girl child, the document said.

City languishes under wet spell

Several low-lying areas in and around the capital were inundated as heavy rainfall continued for the third consecutive day yesterday, disrupting normal life in the city and elsewhere in the country.

A statement issued here by the Croat democratic community (HDZ) party of Mate Boban said the proclamation of the 'Herzeg-Bosna Croat Republic' was made at a central council meeting of the party, in Livno, 100 kilometres west of Sarajevo.

The republic succeeds the 'Herzeg-Bosna Croat community earlier proclaimed by the Bosnian Croats who under a Geneva draft peace package would end up with 17 per cent of the former Yugoslav republic.

Meanwhile, Bosnian Serb leader Radovan Karadzic has warned that the Bosnian Muslims could lose even the territory the hold if they reject the Geneva partition plan for Bosnia-Herzegovina. In a statement appearing to-

day in the Serbian daily Dnevnik, Karadzic said that if the Muslim rejected the plan, which would give them 30 per cent of the territory in the former Yugoslav republic, "The Serbs will keep not only the 54 per cent of territory assigned to them in the plan, but also all the areas now under their con-

Karadzic said the Muslims now controlled barely 10 per cent of Bosnia-Herzegovina, and they would 'risk losing everything if they rejected the plan.

The Geneva talks were now over for the Serbs, Karadzic said adding that he believed they were also over for the

However, Bosnia's Muslim president Alija Izetbegovic was "still waiting for US support," Karadzic said, and if US President Bill Clinton encouraged him not to sign the peace accord 'the much-awaited peace will not come. Another report says, Bosnian

Croats have given in to UN demands and agreed to allow about a week's worth of food to reach Muslims in the ravaged city of Mostar. Disputes, however, held up the convoy.

The problems arose after Croats demanded the return of the bodies of fighters killed in Mostar before they will allow the UN vehicles to pass. The 19-truck convoy - car-
