Abdus Sattar Hamiduzzaman's charcoal drawing. showed the back of a woman, with her hair in wild disarray, her clothes crumpled and her jewellery destroyed, twisted and torn. The ink and pencil sketch

was done in brown, with faint hints of red. Raafigun Nabi's water colour depicted a woman mourning her dead man, which could have been either her husband or her son. The strokes were mature and effective and depict-

ed a story with emotion. Hashem Khan's collage and water colour delineated a leaping young freedom fighter and a collection of huddled men. The pieces of paper in the collage were put together with finesse against a grey background which was framed in

Ibrahim's oil on paper showed people lost huddled and fleeing. This was done with strokes of white against a black background, touched with pink and beige. The sense of hopelessness of the homeless people was conveyed with an impact.

The mixed media by Nazli Laila Mansur brought in corpses, juxtaposed with idyllic scenes of the countryside. In the forefront was a boy engrossed in playing with a wooden toy soldier.

The ink sketch by Abdus Shakoor showed a dying outstretched figure with a grieving wife and child. Faces of people caught up in the horror were included in the backdrop.

The multicoloured collage by Hashi Chakra-

sketch of the countryside. A poisonous snake, an owl and a clock with extended hands went along with the carefully placed patches of red, purple, green and black.

The water colour by Farida Zaman showed a beast, a bird and a moon in grey with a woman's nude figure in black grey and beige.

The mixed media by Naima Haque had abstract forms of beige and brown placed on sketches of barbed wire and decapitated bodies.

Dilara Begum Jolly brought in surrealistic images of Razaakars and corpses in his water colour, using soft greens, pinks and blues.

Md Eunus's work showed monstrous hairy hands with bloody nails destroying the image of a peaceful delineation of the Bangladesh country-

The drawing by Debdas Chakraborty depicted crying and howling women, with their clothes in disarray. In the forefront was the face of an angry young freedom fighter scowling behind barbed wires. Tiny sketches of flowers and birds, symbolising hope were interspersed in the composition.

The pen and ink sketch by Samrjitroy Choudhury showed a horrified and lost woman surrounded with bayonets. Faces of of freedom fighters lined the forefront, while the flag of Bangladesh was sketched into the background.

The exhibition was a good pictorial depiction of the Liberation struggle and was accompanied by a sale of books on the same subject.




## Petrobangla contractors slate decision

A budget expenditure amounting to Taka 24 lakh 97 thousand has been approved in the meeting for the year 1993-94 for zakat found projects.



The fee for each course per month is Tk. 3,500/-; no separate addmission fee for the courses.

The admission for Spring Semester and also for Intensive English and Mathematics courses (October-December, '93) will begin immediately after the announcement of the tesu results.
