
JCD, Shibir clash in Sathkira College

Arafat, Rabin off to US to attend signing ceremony Palestinian autonomy accord today

WASHINGTON, Sept 12: PLO leader Yasser Arafat, packing a pistol on his hip, and Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin, vowing to defend Jerusalem, flew to Washington today to endorse a momentous Middle East peace agreement, report Reuters, AP.

Only hours before Rabin left, Muslim militants shot dead three Israeli soldiers in the occupied Gaza Strip, where two Arabs died earlier in protests over a pact aimed at ending the centuries-old conflict between Arabs and Jews.

The Qassam military wing of the Islamic resistance movement Hamas, which has vowed

to fight the agreement, claimed responsibility for the attack on the soldiers.

The violence took place in one of the areas where the agreement would establish Palestinian self-rule. The pact, forged in secret talks and announced last week, also calls for self-rule in the West Bank city of Jericho.

Streets around the White House will be blocked and the top of the Washington monument may be closed tomorrow as security is tightened for the signing of a breakthrough peace accord.

The ceremony will be hosted by President Bill Clinton on the south lawn of the White House at 11 am (1500 GMT 2100 BST) tomorrow.

Secretary of State Warren Christopher said the agreement would be signed at the 'ministerial' level, not by Arafat or Rabin. Israeli Foreign Minister Shimon Peres will sign for Israel and Arafat's No 2 on the mission, Abu Mazen, will probably sign for the PLO.

An aide said Arafat, who left his PLO headquarters wearing his olive-green military fatigues, would don civilian clothes for the ceremony, which will be at-

JS session begins Opposition slates delay regarding pending bills

The first sitting of the Jatiya Sangsad (JS) on its eleventh session yesterday witnessed a lively debate on four bills which have been pending decisions of concerned parliamentary bodies since 1991.

The bills relating to the separation of the judiciary from the executive, repeal of the Indemnity Ordinance 1975, setting up of an independent Parliament secretariat and holding of national-level elections under a caretaker government, were referred to four separate parliamentary bodies for reports on the issues.

The committees comprised members belonging to both

Treasury and Opposition benches.

During the debate yesterday, the Opposition members accused the government of lacking the political will to decide on the issues. They blamed Law Minister Mirza Gohar Hafez in particular for his reluctance to resolve the problems.

The Law Minister, on the other hand, denied the allegations and told the House that in most cases the Opposition members were responsible for the delay.

The debate began when Awami League (AL) MP Shudhangshu Shekhar Halder

SRO regarding machinery import NBR, businessmen refer matter to PM

Any final decision regarding the recent SRO of the National Board of Revenue imposing new conditionalities for duty-free import of capital machinery for the country's export-oriented industries would be taken by the Prime Minister herself.

The dispute between the business community and the NBR regarding the new terms and conditions was referred to the Prime Minister yesterday following a frank dialogue between the two sides at the office of the Prime Minister's Principal Secretary.

"The decision must be a political one," a senior official of the Finance Ministry said on condition of anonymity. "We imposed the conditions with a view to checking leakage from industries enjoying incentives as 'export-oriented'. The decision was also designed to protect the domestic industries."

But businessmen representing different chambers and associations attending the meeting reiterated that the new conditionalities would render more industries sick.

The NBR recently, through a statutory regulatory order, (SRO) notified that export-oriented industries will have to pay a 2.5 per cent duty in cash while importing capital machinery, which is refundable if the industry goes into production within a year of the import.

Moreover, industries will also have to provide a five per cent bank guarantee against capital machinery imports, which will also be refunded once the industries start export within three years.

The businessmen at yesterday's meeting said the industries will have to pay a huge amount of money as interest on

Kurds kidnap 6 Bangladeshis in Turkey

DIYARBAKIR (Turkey), Sept 12: Kurdish rebels holding seven Westerners hostage in southeastern Turkey have abducted two Iraqis and six Bangladeshis, a local official said Sunday, reports AP.

The death toll in four days of fighting rose to 54 when 17 rebels and a police officer died in overnight clashes, officials said.

The Kurdistan Workers' Party, or PKK, is waging a guerrilla war for self-rule. More than 7,000 people have died since the fighting began in 1984.

The government recently has mounted an offensive. Turkey's chief of general staff, Dogan Gures, vowed in a statement to the national newspaper Sabah on Sunday to "finish off the PKK by next spring."

The guerrillas have staged bombings at resorts in western Turkey and abducted foreign travellers to undermine the tourism industry.

Industries minister resigns

Industries Minister Shamsul Islam Khan resigned yesterday on health grounds, said a government announcement.

He tendered the resignation to Prime Minister Begum Khaleda Zia, which was later accepted by the President.

Planning Minister A M Zahiruddin Khan has been given the Industries Ministry portfolio.

When contacted last night, sources close to Shamsul Islam Khan told this correspondent that his resignation was purely on health ground and there was no political reason behind it. "He has been suffering from heart ailment and diabetes and is not in a position to discharge duties as a minister," the sources added.

Shamsul Islam Khan, an industrialist, was elected to Parliament from a Manikganj constituency.

This is the second resignation from Begum Khaleda Zia's cabinet.

State Minister for Establishment Nurul Huda resigned last May.

SEC to protect investors, develop securities market

The newly-formed Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) is gearing up its operations focused on protecting the investors and developing the securities market.

Formed under the Securities and Exchange Commission Act, 1993, approved by Parliament on June 8 last, the SEC effectively takes over all functions of the erstwhile Controller of Capital Issues.

The Finance Ministry has already appointed Sultanuzzaman Khan, a former civil servant, as the chairman and also nominated two of the ex-officio members of the commission. The SEC, meanwhile, has advertised for the position of two full-time members.

Headed by a Joint Secretary of the Finance Ministry, a six-member committee has also

been set up to frame rules and regulations for the registration of brokers and others involved in share trading.

All persons dealing in the trading of shares are required to acquire registration from the commission within six months of its establishment.

The Asian Development Bank (ADB) is also considering a \$58,500 US dollars technical assistance project proposal for the SEC, which is likely to be approved by December next.

Under the act, the Commission has been given broad mandatory regulatory powers to look after the overall activities of the capital market.

According to the act: "It shall be the responsibility and duty of the commission to ensure the proper issuance of securities, to protect the interest of the in-

vestors, and to promote the development of and to regulate the capital and securities market."

The commission has been authorised to prohibit fraudulent and unfair trading practices, including insider trading in securities, and to regulate the take-over of companies through substantial acquisition of shares or stock and also to regulate the business of the Stock Exchanges or other securities markets.

Regulating the securities market, the SEC Chairman points out, should be seen more in a positive sense rather than in a restrictive and controlling sense.

"The SEC should create an enabling atmosphere as well as remove impediments on way to enhancing investment in the

Palestinian flags go up in Gaza

GAZA CITY (Occupied Gaza Strip), Sept 12: Palestinian flags blossomed across Gaza City today for the first time since Israel seized the strip in 1967, as autonomy celebrations began early, reports AFP.

"I am 25 years old and I was born with the Israeli occupation," said Nabil Mohammad, a vegetable seller who was dancing in the street.

"It's the first time in my life that I've seen my country's flag go up," he enthused.

As news spread of PLO chairman Yasser Arafat's departure for Washington to sign the historic autonomy agreement with Israel at the White House on Monday, this hotbed of resistance witnessed scenes of joy few could remember.

The Israeli authorities have for the first time granted permission to fly the green, red, black and white flags in the occupied territories to mark the historic occasion.

Row over boundaries may delay city corp polls

Preparations for holding elections to the country's four city corporations have hit snags following disagreement over fresh delimitation of territorial units — the wards — under the corporations, Election Commission (EC) sources said.

Meanwhile, the Commission has postponed publishing gazettes on fresh demarcation of 177 wards under the four corporations after it failed to settle disputes on their boundaries.

An election commission source said it has started consultation with the Ministry of Local Government on the issue, but the ministry is yet to give any specific guidelines as to how the disputes could be resolved, the source added.

The problem surfaced when the number of wards in certain city areas were reduced following the EC's attempt to remove disparities in the size of popu-

lation in different wards — mainly under the Dhaka City Corporation.

According to EC sources, the authorities found the existing boundaries of the wards faulty. Explaining, they said, under the present order, the ward demarcations were not in proportion to the total population of the city. Pointing out that there were wards where the population is several times higher than other areas, an official viewed

Pak Army asked to supervise polls 4 more bombs explode in India: 2 killed

ISLAMABAD, Sept 12: Pakistan's Election Commission on Sunday ordered the Army to provide security for a general election next month and halt polling malpractices, authorising officers to hold summary trials of suspected offenders, reports Reuters.

The Army has said it would mobilise 150,000 troops as well 10,000 Navy and 15,000 Air Force personnel — almost half the Armed Forces — to prevent vote-rigging in the October 6 poll and Provincial Assembly elections three days later.

As an additional safeguard, the Election Commission will authorise the officers of the Armed forces detailed on election duty to exercise the necessary powers under the law to deal with electoral malpractices," the official APP news agency said.

Election officials said earlier these powers would include

magisterial powers to hold summary trials of suspected offenders and to punish those convicted.

The elections are a result of an Army-brokered deal that forced the simultaneous resignations of President Ghulam Ishaq Khan and his former protégé turned bitter rival, Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif.

Opposition leader Benazir Bhutto has called for a new election and alleged rigging of the 1990 polls that swept Sharif to power three months after she was sacked as Prime Minister by Ishaq Khan. She also urged army supervision of the estimated 33,000 polling stations on election day.

Bhutto had alleged that in 1990 then President Ishaq Khan, aided by the Army, organised the rigging of that election in which her party won 45 of the 217 national assembly seats.

NEW DELHI, Sept 12: At least four bombs exploded across India Sunday, killing two people, injuring three others and damaging a strategic road bridge, news reports said, reports AP.

The explosions in southern and northeastern India came a day after car bombs killed eight people in New Delhi.

A bomb went off in a railroad reservation office in the southern Indian city of Secunderabad Sunday, killing two railway officials and injuring two others, United News of India reported.

Secunderabad, in Andhra Pradesh state, is about 1,300 kilometres south of New Delhi. It is an important centre of Islamic culture. The adjoining city of Hyderabad was the seat of a Muslim ruler, the last of whom was one of the world's richest men.

There was no immediate claim of responsibility.

The blast killed the chief reservation inspector and a clerk.

Press Trust of India reported three blasts in the northeastern Manipur state. The area, 1,200 kilometres northeast of New Delhi, is inhabited by over two dozens tribes, many of them have been converted to Christianity.

The blasts occurred in the towns of Thoubal, Island and capital Imphal. There was also no claim of responsibility. The blast at Thoubal blew up the Itham road bridge that links the strategic state with Burma.

The blasts in Secunderabad and Manipur came a day after a car bomb exploded in central New Delhi in an apparent attempt to assassinate a top politician. He escaped with minor injuries, but eight people were killed and 36 injured.

Grim statistics

Six of the country's medical colleges suffered eight months of unscheduled closure from November last to June 30 this year because of recurrent violence and political unrest from time to time, the Health Minister informed Parliament yesterday.

Replying to a question from Shamsul Huq of the Awami League, Chowdhury Kamal Hossain Yousuf said the Chittagong Medical College was closed for the longest period — two months and 16 days, from September 14 last year — followed by the Sylhet MAG Osmany Medical College which was closed for two months and 10 days from May 3 this year.

He said the Mymensingh Medical College was closed for 55 days due to three consecutive violent incidents in this year, March, while the Dhaka Medical College and Rangpur Medical College suffered from unscheduled closures of 22 days each.

The date for advance income tax payment for the 1st quarter of the current financial year is September 15, 1993.

The advance income tax payable by the concerned taxpayer is to be paid through I.T. Form No I T 31 (B) (amended) challan.

The taxpayers should pay the advance tax filling in the said challan form as usual by replacing the figure "74 (1)" with the figure "64" in as many places as it occurs in the form.

It may be mentioned that the financial limit of total income for payment of advance income tax for all classes of assessees is now Taka 1,00,000/-.

All assessees concerned are requested to pay their advance income tax for the 1st quarter of the current financial year relevant to the assessment year 1994-95 under this system by September 15, 1993. Simple interest @ 12% per annum will be leviable if the advance income tax is not paid or paid at a lesser amount than due.
