BARISAL

Tk 50,000 sanctioned for mass education

Sept 12: Government has sanctioned Taka 50,000 for mass education in Barisal paurashava areas during the currency fiscal year, reports BSS.

According to an official source, President Abdul Rahman Biswas donated Taka 50,000 from his personal fund for mass education programmes in paurashava areas of the district. In all there are 29 education centres in this district, an education office source said.

C'NAWABGANJ

Project on aman cultivation

Sept 12: About 12 lakh acres of the land have been brought under aman cultivation in Barendra Project area of Chapainawabganj, Rajshahi and Naogaon districts in the current season, says UNB.

According to Barendra Multipurpose Development Authority sources, extensive measures have been taken up to provide irrigation facilities for the Barendra area to make the programme a success.

Over 4100 deep tubewells and 6000 shallow tubewells have already been brought into extend irrigation facilities in the farm land, the sources said.

BARGUNA

Spread of cattle diseases

Sept 12: Cattle diseases have broken out in an alarming proportion in different parts of the district hampering cultivation, reports UNB.

At least 500 cattlehead died of the diseases and over 15000 were attacked by the diseases named 'khura' and 'golfula', unofficial sources said.

Khura cripples the cattle making them unable to walk and eat grasses due to infection in the jaw and hooves.

Local people alleged that most of the cattlehead died due to wrong treatment by unqualified doctors and field assistants at the thana livestock hospitals.

Since the outbreak of the diseases, no attempt for vaccination of the cattle including buffalo was initiated by the Livestock Department, they also alleged.

The field staff of Livestock Department said due to the reluctance of the people they cannot take up any programme of vaccination. On the other hand, farmers alleged that field assistants are inclined to vaccinate the cattle or poultry birds without payment.

M'BAZAR

Catching of fish fry rampant

Sept 12: Catching of fish fry is going on unabated in all the six thanas of the district affecting the fish production severely, reports UNB.

Local people alleged that current nets used for the purpose, are being sold openly in town and thana markets at a cheaper rate despite government prohibition.

The government has strictly prohibited catching of fish fry below nine inches.

Local people feared that fish scarcity would intensify further if rampant catching of fish fry are not stopped immediately.

Another report adds: At least 500 patients were treated free of cost in a day-long medical camp held in Ekarna bazar in Sadar thana of the district last week.

RAJSHAHI

Indian goods worth Tk 35 lakh seized

Sept 12: The members of 20 Rifle battalion seized a huge quantity of Indian goods worth Taka about 35 lakh in the first ten days of the current month from Rajshahi, Natore and Pabna districts, reports BSS.

The seized goods included tortois, sarces, blouse pieces, bed sheets cattle heads, sugar, salt, phenidyl syrups, heroin, insecticides, glasses and medicines.

One person was arrested and 62 cases were registered during the period.

One allegedly killed by miscreants

Sept 12: One Shahn, a student of second year HSC class of Kushtia Islamic College, was allegedly killed by miscreants on Thursday night, reports BSS.

The miscreants are reported to have attacked him as he was seated at a tea stall at Mazampur railgate in front of the traffic police stand. He was rushed to the general hospital in a critical condition. He breathed his last at midnight.

A case has been registered with the Kushtia thana.

Pitiable shape of road hampers communication

Sept 12: The Narail-Kalia road is now in a pitiable condition hampering bus communications with the district headquarters, says UNB.

Hundreds of potholes and ditches have developed at several points of the 20 kilometre long road making bus journey hazardous. Movement of other vehicles including truck has become risky.

One commits suicide

Sept 12: One young girl allegedly committed suicide at Barakochi village of Sadar thana in the district by taking poison, police said recently, reports UNB.

The dead was identified as Jesmin Ara Begum (16), daughter of Mohammad Tota Mollah of the village. Family sources said she took poison following a family quarrel on August 23.

Jesmin was rushed to the Sadar hospital in critical condition where she succumbed after a few hours. The body was sent to morgue for autopsy.

Notes From Sirajganj

SIRAJGANJ, Sept 12: Diarrhoea and blood dysentery claimed four more lives during last 24 hours when the overall flood situation in the district further improved, reports UNB.

The dead were identified as Abdul Wahab (7) of village Gushia in Chowhali thana, Sulekha (6) of village Baiyentiya in Shahajadpur thana, Abdur Aziz (15) of Kutbandhi Katatala village and Rohinussesa (45) of village Tenglahata in Kazipur thana.

Official sources, however, confirmed death of one and 500 others attacked by the water-borne diseases during the period in Kazipur, Belkuchi, Chowhali, Shahajadpur and Sadar thanas.

With the latest deaths, the toll rose to eight in the areas affected by erosion and flood in last five days. Unofficial count however estimated the toll to be 14.

Meanwhile, 237 families in 29 villages of the affected thanas were rendered homeless by erosion of the river Jamuna during the last few days.

The erosion victims have taken shelter at different flood embankments.

7 missing in boat capsized

Seven people, including a woman, were reported missing after a mechanised ferry boat capsized midstream Jamuna near Shilma in Sadar thana on Wednesday.

Witnesses said the boat with 42 passengers on board started for Sirajganj from Mesra ghāt in Sadar thana at about 7 pm. It was overturned by heavy waves.

Other passengers swam ashore while rest of the seven were missing.

Police, however, did not confirm the accident.

10 injured in storm

Ten people, including a woman, were injured when a storm accompanied by heavy downpour lashed two thanas of the district early Tuesday.

Witnesses said the storm, with a velocity of 45 km per hour, also damaged 150 dwelling houses and uprooted trees in Kazipur and Sadar thana at about 2 am.

15 hurt in rival groups clash

At least 15 people including three women were injured in a clash between rival groups of villagers in Rayganj thana of the district Tuesday.

Witnesses said the clash erupted following an altercation between the two groups led by Manjurul Islam and Zaen Bepari over stealing a goat.

Another 1000 homeless due to Jamuna erosion

JAMALPUR, Sept 12: Continued erosion of the river Jamuna rendered 1,000 people homeless in Dewanganj thana during the last three days, reports UNB.

The worst affected villages are Char Madar and Pullakandi in Bahadurabad union of the thana where erosion has taken a serious turn.

The homeless people brought out a procession and gheraoed the office of the TNO on September 5 and submitted a memorandum demanding their immediate rehabilitation and measures to check erosion.

A case was filed with the sadar thana in this connection.

Another report from Brahmanbaria says: Young housewife was allegedly killed by the members of her in-laws family for dowry money in Devagram village in Akhaura thana recently, police said here Friday.

Ujjal Miah (25) of Katanbazar village in Comilla district on August 27 said that his wife, Parvin Begum (19) had committed suicide.

But the villagers alleged Ujjal and his family members used to torture Parvin to bring the outstanding dowry money amounting to 10,000 out of
