Momentous step for ME peace

WASHINGTON, Sept 13: Enemies without mercy for generations, Israel and the Palestine Liberation Organization signed an accord Monday promising self-government for Palestinians. The White House ceremony marked a momentous step toward peace for the Middle East, reports AP.

Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin and PLO Chairman Yasser Arafat stood with President Clinton in brilliant sunshine as aides signed the agreement. After the signing, Arafat extended his hand to Rabin, and after a moment's hesitation, Rabin clasped it.

An invited audience of 3,000 watched on the South Lawn as the deal was sealed. Half a world away, Palestinians flocked festively to the streets of the Biblical city of Jericho to celebrate the pen strokes that would deliver self-rule.

Clinton escorted Rabin and Arafat from the White House to the podium where the signing took place. The Israeli leader was unsmiling, Arafat, in his military tunic and keffiyeh, beamed and waved to the crowd.

Israeli Foreign Minister Shimon Peres, who signed the pact with PLO chief of external relations, Mahmoud Abbas said, "We are sincere. We mean business... Let us all turn from bullets to shovels, from guns to shovels."

"May there be no more victims on either side," he said.

Rabin told the Palestinians, "We who have fought against you, say to you in a loud and clear voice, enough of blood and tears, enough."

Arafat said that the Israelis "the difficult decision we reached together was one that required great and exceptional courage. We will need more courage and determination to build peace and coexistence between us."

Abbas said the accord reflects the PLO's decision "to turn a new page in its relations with Israel."

"We have come to this point because we believe that peaceful coexistence and cooperation are the only means of reaching an

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A historic handshake

WASHINGTON, Sept 13: PLO chairman Yasser Arafat and Israeli leader Yitzhak Rabin ended decades of enmity with a handshake today at the signing of a peace accord giving self-rule to Palestinians in Israeli-occupied lands, reports Reuter.

The Palestinian and Israeli leaders grasped hands politely just after their deputies signed the historic document at a ceremony on the White House's South lawn. Their gesture brought a cheer of approval from the audience.

Arafat extended his hand first, and President Bill Clinton, who was standing between the two men, touched Rabin on the back — almost seeming to encourage him to make the handshake.

Many observers had wondered whether Rabin, 71, and Arafat, 64, would feel able to bury the hatchet with a handshake at the ceremony. Just two weeks ago it was unthinkable that the two men could ever appear together, much less touch one another.

Rabin had shown no great enthusiasm when a television interviewer asked him on Sunday whether he would shake Arafat's hand. "If it will be needed," Rabin said.

Arabs celebrate accord

JERICHO (West Bank), Sept 13: Arabs in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip erupted in joy today after their leader Yasser Arafat sealed a historic peace accord with Israel in Washington, reports Reuter.

Tens of thousands of Arabs surged through the streets beating drums and waving Palestinian flags after watching on live television Arafat and Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin shake hands on the White House lawn.

More than 50,000 people flooded the streets of Gaza City, some talking and laughing to the Israeli soldiers they have been striving to drive out for the past six years of their uprising.

In the West Bank town of Jericho a huge roar went up as Arafat held out his hand to Rabin, a man who has twice conquered Arab land in the wars that have ravaged the Middle East since the 1948 creation of Israel.

In Arab East Jerusalem, thousands danced while others rode horses, beat drums and played music.

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TIMETABLE FOR PEACE

WASHINGTON, Sept 13: Israel and the PLO's historic declaration of principles on Palestinian self-rule signed in Washington today envisages a 10-month timetable leading up to elections for a Palestinian council, reports Reuter. The council will run the West Bank and Gaza Strip for an interim period of five years, during which Israel and the Palestinians will negotiate a permanent peace settlement. Israel and the Palestinians will also immediately start negotiating details of the withdrawal of Israeli troops from the Gaza Strip and the West Bank town of Jericho.

The declaration officially enters into force October 13 and the timetable then unfolds as follows:

Immediately:

— Authority transferred from Israeli military government and civil administration to "authorised Palestinians" in five spheres: Education and Culture, Health, Social Welfare, Direct Taxation, and Tourism. The Palestinians will have authority in the West Bank and Gaza but it is not clear what authority they will have in East Jerusalem.

— Palestinians start building police force. Core will be Palestine Liberation Organisation fighters from outside West Bank and Gaza.

— Joint Israeli-Palestinian liaison committee formed.

— Israeli-Palestinian economic cooperation committee established to work on: Water, electricity, energy, finance, transport and communications including Gaza seaport, trade, industry, labour relations, training, environmental protection, and the media; An internationally-supported economic development programme for the West Bank and Gaza and a regional economic development programme.

— Jordan and Egypt invited to join continuing committee to decide on procedures for admission of Palestinians displaced from West Bank and Gaza in 1967 (estimated at about 800,000 people including dependents) and measures to prevent "disruption and disorder."

December 13, 1993:

— Israel and Palestinians sign agreement on Israeli withdrawal from Gaza Strip and Jericho area and detailed arrangements

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Campus violence discussed in JS

BNP, AL trade charges

The Treasury and Opposition benches yesterday accused each other for destabilising academic atmosphere of the educational institutions by sponsoring campus violence and harbouring terrorists.

The controversial issue surfaced twice in Parliament yesterday and Deputy Speaker Humayun Khan Panni, who presided over the sitting, told the House that the chair will announce a schedule today for a general discussion on the issue during the current session.

The issue generated heat, for the first time yesterday, following the Home Minister's reply to an Awami League (AL) sponsored question relating to the violent incident that took place at the Jahangirnagar University on July 29.

The issue came up for a second time when the Deputy Speaker, in the course of disposing of the notices of the MPs,

Subject: Submission of income tax return for the assessment year 1993-94

The last date for filing of normal income tax return/return under self-assessment scheme, by all assessee other than companies, for the assessment year 1993-94 is 15th September, 1993. Apart from the existing assessee, all those persons whose total income exceeded Tk 50,000/- in the corresponding income year, are required to file their returns of income by the above mentioned date and pay taxes on the basis of the returns.

It may be mentioned here that through the Finance Act, 1993, the maximum rate of tax for individual assessee has been reduced from 30% to 25%. Moreover, individual tax rates have been rescheduled into 4 slabs in such a manner that tax-payers of all the slabs will now pay tax at comparatively reduced rates. In view of this, the Government expects that all persons not yet enlisted as tax-payers but having taxable income during the relevant income year, will submit their tax returns voluntarily and pay taxes according to law.

Income tax return forms are available from Head Post Offices of all the districts. Assessee filing a return under self-assessment scheme may use the normal income tax return forms superscribing the expression "SELF-ASSESSMENT" on top of these forms. Some important features of the self-assessment scheme for the assessment year 1993-94 are as under:

a. All assessee, other than a limited company registered under the Companies Act, 1913, or a director holding shares exceeding 5% of the paid up capital of a company will be eligible to submit returns under this scheme.

b. Under this scheme there is provision to accept initial capital upto Taka 2 lakhs for the new tax-payers engaged in business without any question. But capital upto Taka 3 lakhs will also be accepted without any question if such tax-payers invest their initial capital in small or cottage industries.

c. There will be no maximum limit of total income for filing returns under self-assessment scheme.

d. A return will not be eligible for self-assessment if it shows loss or lesser income than the income last assessed or if assessment on the basis of such return results in refund.

e. It is compulsory for every assessee, being an individual, to submit the statement of assets and liabilities, in the prescribed form, along with the return.

f. Tax payable on the total income shown in the return shall not be less than Tk. 1,500/- and the tax is to be paid on or before the date on which the return is filed.

All assessee concerned are requested to submit their income tax returns within the stipulated time failing which they will be liable to penal action as per law.

Government expects that assessee will disclose their correct income and file income tax returns in time.

and the NBR at the MCCI auditorium.

About a hundred entrepreneurs attended the meeting which was presided over by the President of the MCCI, Latifur Rahman. Chairman Dr Akbar Ali Khan along with other senior officials represented the NBR.

He pointed out that in order to help the enterprises win competitive contests the government must formulate policies quickly, make changes whenever necessary, and implement those policies effectively.

Regarding tax holidays the MCCI chief said the NBR was arbitrarily rejecting many applications asking for tax holidays although the applicants fulfilled the required conditions of the government.

Emphasising the need for a competent and honest civil ser-

vice, Rahman said Bangladesh could not afford to ignore again and again the realities of global competition and the need to help different enterprises win competitive contests.

He pointed out that the sole objective of having tariff value was to prevent under-invoicing and not to increase tax revenue, and quoted Finance Minister Saifur Rahman as having said that if an importer can prove his cost, through a recognised inspection agency, that his purchase price was lower than the tariff
