# 21,000 killed in 2 Maharashtra villages: Rains hamper rescue operation

# Quake death toll may cross 28,000

KHILARI, Oct 1: Funeral pyres flickered around dozens of villages Friday in southwestern India where a violent quake killed more than 21,000 people, many of the crushed by collapsing roofs as they slept, report AP, PTI, AFP.

With more bodies being extricated from the debris, the toll is likely to go up to 28,000, the

official sources said. Khilari and Umarga in Osmanabad district alone accounted for about 21,000

deaths. A BJP leader in the region said the death toll could rise as

high as 30,000. Indian authorities meanwhile launched massive rescue and relief efforts yesterday.

Nearly 5,600 troops had moved into the disaster zone, about 400 kilometers east of Bombay, with excavators and bulldozers and medical teams to rescue trapped residents and treat the wounded.

Doctors and relief materialranging from food to bedsheets and tents - were also pouring into the region as the enormity of the disaster stunned the na-

NEW DELHI, Oct 1: An and Gulbag, two districts in India's south and west late today adjacent to quake hit areas, reports AFP.

The quake, India's worst in half a century, measured at least 6 on the Richter scale as it ripped through southwest India at 3:56 a.m. Thursday (2226 GMT Wednesday).

Home Minister Shankarrao Chavan, who flew over the

quake zone, said every house in four or five villages that he saw had collapsed.

"People have lost everything. They don't even have pots and pans," he told reporters in New Delhi. "People are camped out in the fields without food or water."

The immediate fear was an epidemic from water contaminated by the putrefying bodies. "We are trying to organise drinking water, some kind of temporary housing," Chavan

A top Maharashtra government official in Bombay told AFP by telephone that more than 3,000 bodies had been cremated on a mass scale since late Thursday. There just be a lot of bodies under the debris. Just how may no one can say.'

Reporters criss-crossing the quake zone saw village after village reduced to piles of black stones bizarrely interspersed among yellow fields of sunflow-

# Russian crisis continues as both sides harden positions

MOSCOW, Oct 1: Hard-line lawmakers Friday rejected an agreement intended to ease the tense standoff around parliament, refusing to lay down their guns first as President Boris Yeltsin demanded, report AP,

Yeltsin demanded that rebel lawmakers, surrender their weapons prior to any deal that would lift the blockade of the building by security forces.

The Speaker of the Russian Parltament, Ruslan Khasbulatov, meanwhile said local administrations throughout Russia were rallying behind the parliament and called on the army to take a stand in the crisis to avert Russia's breakup.

"All negotiations — all must begin with the handover of arms," Yelstin said in an interview broadcast on Commonwealth of Independent States television news.

The Russian leader noted that the government had restored electricity to the parliament in line with an agreement reached during the night that,

he claimed, the parliament had failed to respect.

"We turned on the lights but they did not turn over their arms," Yeltsin said. "It is very difficult to negotiate with them." "Any gunshot, even acciden-

tal, could provoke bloodshed," Yeltsin warned. Alexander Rutskoi, the act-

ing "president" appointed by the rebel parliament, said the parliament's weapons would be turned over only if the blockade of the building were "totally lifted" immediately, the parliament's news service said. Rutskoi also demanded that

the troops manning the blockade around the building be withdrawn from Moscow and said the parliament's envoy to talks with the Kremlin had been instructed to adhere to this position, the report said.

These conditions were certain to be rejected by the Kremlin.

The hardening of positions on both sides concerning disarmament of the parliamentary guards came amid continuing

peace talks between Kremlin and parliamentary representatives brokered by the Russian orthodox church. But statements from officials

in both camps earlier suggested that those talks also were hung up on the issue of the weapons possessed by brigades of so-called "defenders" of the parliament building. There were signs however

that leaders of the rebel MPs were divided on how to approach negotiations, with the Kremlin after two top lawmakers who signed the overnight accord were later reproached for "overstepping their authority."

More than 100 deputies still in the parliament afterwards voted overwhelmingly against the overnight agreement and leading MPs said they regarded the weapons in the building as their key source of political

The Non-Government Organisations (NGO), from now on, will be known as Private Voluntary Development Organisations (PVDO), sources said.

A draft Definition, Statement of Purpose and Code of Ethics of the erstwhile NGOs suggested that the private voluntary organisations engaged in poverty alleviation and sustainable development in the country be called PVDOs because of their non-profit making nature, they

The non-government organisations range from clubs to commercial businesses, and the share-holders receive profits from these ventures, the draft pointed out, adding that the PVDOs were non-profit organisations set up privately at the initiatives of individuals.

The draft Definition, Statement of Purpose and Code of Ethics, prepared recently, aim at better organisation, selfregulation and attaining higher standards of professionalism PVDO sources said.

However, they pointed out the draft was yet to be finalised and was being scrutinised by different members of the Association of Development Agencies in Bangladesh (ADAB), the apex coordinating body of the PVDOs. A copy of the Draft Code of

Ethics, made available to The Daily Star, suggests the PVDOs build up solidarity and encourage democratic leadership amongst the poor with special emphasis on women. The PVDOs would seek to

collaborate and complement the development efforts initiated by the government and their relationship would stand on mutual openness and respect, it said. The Code suggested the

PVDOs be transparent in their use of funds for development so that the government could know those were well spent. "We seek to clearly show

what work is carried out with such funds, and to account for the receipt and the expenditure See Page 12 Col 1

sive earthquake in Maharashtra yesterday released energy equivalent to a hydrogen bomb explosion and was apparently caused by reactivation of a crack in the earth's crust, according to geologists here, reports PTI.

"This quake proved especially damaging because it was geologically shallow, allowing a great deal of earth movement to affect a highly populated area at the surface of the earth's crust", Christ Browitt of the Global Seismology Unit in the British Geological Survey said.

The shallow epicentre means that its violence reached the surface swiftly, without a chance to dissipate in the earth's crustal rocks, he said.

The death toll is also high not just because it struck a night, when almost all the victims were asleep, but also because the region is dominated by structures not designed to withstand seismic convulsions,

## AL bill won't go unchallenged, says Jamaat

Jamaat leader Maulana Matiur Rahman Nizami yesterday said his party will resist "constitutionally and lawfully" the opposition's plan to bring a bill in next session of Parliament seeking a ban on politics based on religion.

"The move will not go unchallenged .... All Islamic forces and religious people in the country will frustrate it", Nizami told UNB responding to Opposition Chief Whip Mohammad Nasim's recent remarks about the planned bill.

Nasim told a discussion meeting here Thursday that a bill will be moved in November session seeking a ban on politics by the Jamaat-e-Islami and other fundamentalist and communal forces.

The Opposition Chief Whip appealed to the ruling party MPs to support the proposed bill to be moved on behalf of the opposition.

Nasim, also the Organising Secretary of Awami League, made the appeal in the backdrop of reported consensus on September 20 between the treasury and opposition benches in See Page 12 Col 7

But he also insisted that Washington had to do more to improve bilateral ties. "So long as the US govern

ment strictly abides by the principles set forth in the three joint communiques between the two countries and works together with the Chinese side, development of normal Sino-US relations is possible," Li said.
