COLOMBO, Oct 7: Government troops killed more than 350 Tamil guerillas and lost 118 of their own men during a major offensive last week in northern Shri Lanka, the military said here today, reports

The military offensive, launched September 28 in the Jaffna peninsula, concluded on Monday following the army's capture of Kilali, a coastal stronghold of the rebel Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eclam (LTTE).

More than 350 LTTE gueril las, including 74 senior cadres and 118 security personnel. died in the offensive, according to a statement issued here by the Defence Coordinating Committee.

Another soldier was missing in action and presumed dead, officials said.

Hundreds of troops withdrew from Kilali and returned to the Elephant Pass Army Garrison, located at the mouth of the peninsula, from where the major operation was launched under cover of an indefinite cur-

The withdrawal has run into criticism in newspapers here. but the defence committee, including the service chiefs, said the operation was a "limited one" aimed at restricting LTTE movements between the peninsula and mainland.

The LTTE operated a ferry

from Kilali, via the Jaffna Lagoon, for thousands of civilians and to smuggle arms and ammunition between their bases in the rebel-controlled peninsula and the mainland.

During the advance to Kilali. at least seven LTTE camps, a huge boatyard, two boat-landing points and more than 120 fiberglass dinghies were destroyed, officials said.

The LTTE is fighting for a separate state in the northeast for Shri Lanka's minority Tamils, who are concentrated in the region. Thousands have been killed in the LTTE-led independence struggle.

Yeltsin suspends proceedings of constitutional court

MOSCOW, Oct 7: President Boris Yeltsin suspended today the proceedings of Russia's constitutional court "until the adoption of a new constitution." reports AFP.

A decree issued here said the suspension had been decided because "the incomplete nature of the court" following the resignation of several judges meant that it was unable to carry out its task.

Reuter says: Russian Security Ministry officials today arrested Viktor Appilov, one of the leaders of a hardline armed uprising against President Boris Yeltsin, a ministerial spokesman said.

He said Anpilov, head of the working Russia Communist Group, was held at a country house near the city of Tula, South of Moscow. Anpilov, who offered no resistance, was not armed but was wearing a flak

Meghna-Gumti bridge to be opened to traffic in Nov '94

The Meghna-Gumti Bridge at Daudkandi will be opened to traffic in November, next year, 15 months ahead the schedule, reports UNB.

The 1.4 kilometre bridge will be the longest road bridge in the country when it will be open to vehicular movement.

At the end of September 30 this year, more than 72 per cent of the physical works have been completed. It constitutes about 4 per cent higher than that of the revised work schedule and 16.5 per cent higher than that of the original schedule.

The bridge is being constructed at a cost of Tk 312.94 crore of which Tk 55.94 crore is being borne by Bangladesh government while Tk 257.00 crore is project aid.

Abu Dhabi puts 13 BCCI men on trial tomorrow

ABU DHABI, Oct 7: Abu Dhabi, home of the majority owners of the failed Bank of Credit and Commerce International will put 13 top BCCI executives on trial on Saturday in the largest court case to stem from the bank's collapse in 1991, reports Reuter.

The defendants include BCCI founder and Chairman Agha Hassan Abedi, a flamboyant Pakistani entrepreneur who persuaded the ruling Al-Nahayan family of Abu Dhabi to invest heavily in what was once one of the world's fastest growing banks.

The charges against the 13 former executives include dissipating funds, forging documents, concealing the bank's deficits and losses and approving false loans. Abu Dhabi's Justice Ministry announced the trial date in July.

Abedi, who founded BCCI as a 2.5 million operation in 1972 and expanded it into a 20 billion business empire spanning 60 countries, has fled to Pakistan.

He will be tried in his absence with former treasury head Syed Zlauddin Ali Akbar, who was sentenced to six years jail in Britain last week for misusing more than 1.2 billion.

Ten of the other 11 of the defendants, among them former chief executive Mohammad Saleh Nagyi, have been held in Abu Dhabi since 1991, when the bank was forced to close allegations of massive

Ironically, the Communications Ministry decision, if implemented, would affect the careers of the graduate engineers while the diploma holders would still have a chance to secure their present posts through departmental examina-

Sources in the Communications Ministry said the BRTA Chairman had already submitted a three-page recommendation to the Communications Secretary on September 27 requesting the latter to rescind the decision for fresh recruit-

According to the text of the recommendation, the engineers had played a vital role in the sound motor vehicles management and revenue collection by the BRTA during the last 44 months.

The BRTA had collected revenue of Tk 47 crore against an originally estimate of Tk 42 crore in 1991-92 fiscal and Tk 52 crore against a target of Tk 47 crore in the 1992-93 fiscal. BRTA Chairman M Badru-

zzaman believes the ADs who are about to lose their jobs following the ministry's decision had an important role in collecting the money and their absence would affect the realisation of a collection target of Tk 52 crore in the current fiscal. "The fresh recruits would

need to earn a certain degree of experience. The time needed for this training would affect the BRTA's efficiency regarding both vehicle management and revenue collection," the Chairman's recommendations said.

The Chairman also suggested that the cases of the ten engineers could be referred to a concerned committee under the Establishment Ministry. The government had consti-

tuted à high-level committee. headed by an Additional Secretary of the Establishment Ministry, in January last to recommend ways for 'easily' regularising the jobs of the doctors, engineers and officers who had been appointed on an ad hoc basis under different ministries.

UNITED NATIONS, Oct 7: The UN General Assembly will lift economic sanctions against South Africa on Friday, but delay ending its oil embargo until blacks help start governing in a transitional council, a UN spokeswoman said Thursday, reports AP.

The 184-nation General Assembly recognises that the transition to democracy is un-der way and will vote on Friday to lift restrictions against South Africa on trade, investment, finance, travel and transportation, said Cynthia Henry spokeswoman for assembly President Samuel R. Insanally.

The vote would come two weeks after African National Congress President Nelson Mandela urged the General Assembly to lift economic sanctions and encouraged international investment in South Africa. Mandela called for lifting the restrictions because of progress in creating a nonracial, multiparty democracy in South Africa.

The image of Bangladesh, Milam observed, is increasingly getting better because of its ability to sustain democracy and make rapid strides in the economic sphere.

And despite the new industrial policy, procedures need to be simplified to make it a one-stop operation for venture capital.
